#### **McDowell** to have school on Satruday



### Family of four loses everything in fire

McDOWELL - There is no clear determination yet as to the cause of a fire that destroyed a McDowell couple's home Tuesday

Wally and Joyce Sexton's home along Adelene Drive in McDowell caught fire sometime late Tuesday night, while the couple and their two sons, 6 and 11, were away. Firefighters with the Left Beaver Rescue Squad, who were first at the

scene, said Wally Sexton and his two sons were visiting his father at the time the fire broke out, adding they received notification of the fire at 10:45 p.m.

When firefighters arrived approximately 10 minutes later, they said there was smoke all around the house, but no clear sign of fire at that time. Two of them entered the home to search for Sexton and his family members. When they found no one home, they

Foul play suspected

CATLETTSBURG — The body of a Prestonsburg man missing since May 1 was pulled from the Big Sandy River in Boyd County last week, and police suspect foul play in his death.

Brian Jacob Gayheart, 21, was last seen an the Goble-Roberts area. Coal dock workers reportedly found Gayheart's body in Boyd County on May 12.

According to reports, police believe Gayheart was killed in Goble-Roberts and his body was then put in the Big Sandy River.

Gayheart's body was discovered more than 70 miles from where he was last seen. The official cause of death has not been released and no arrests have been made, but police

# Pikeville College announces new RN-BSN program

PIKEVILLE — Building on the success of the Elizabeth Akers Elliott Nursing Program, Pikeville College is planning to expand its two-year associate degree in nursing (A.D.N.) program with the addition of an RN-BSN completion program beginning in August 2011.

The RN-BSN is intended for RNs who hold an associate degree or diploma in nursing and who now wish to eam their baccalaureate of science in nursing (BSN).

"Many of the RNs employed at hospitals, nursing home, or other health care agencies have expressed an interest in an RN-BSN completion program," said Pikeville College President Paul E. Patton. "This new program is among the exciting changes taking place at what will soon become the University of Pikeville. It also represents an important

region."

The RN-BSN prepares nurses for advanced patient care, leadership positions and graduate study for a master's or doctorate degree in nursing. The program is also designed to accommodate RNs who want to date KNs who want to advance their nursing educa-tion on a full- or part-time basis.

Pending final approval by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools (SACS) and the Kentucky Council on Postsecondary Education (CPE), the RN-BSN curriculum will be a blended or "hybrid" program of instruction. The RN-BSN courses will either be fully online or meet on campus once every three weeks and can be completed in three semesters of full-time study or five semesters of part-Pending final approval by

time study. In addition, the college has general education requirements that may be completed prior to, or concurrently with, RN-BSN courses. All requirements for the RN-BSN program must be completed within five years of admission.

"Because of work and family obligations, the RN cannot meet as often on campus as the traditional college student." said Mary Rado Simpson, PhD. RN, chair-person of Pikeville Cliege's Division of Nursing. "Our RN-BSN curriculum is based on best practices to include online coursework with team-building class-room interaction."

room interaction."
Forecasting trends at the national and state level demonstrate the need for nurses with a BSN degree, according to Simpson.
"The Institute of Medicine recommends that the number of BSN nurses be increased to 80 percent by 2020 to meet the demands of today's health care. The national average of BSN or higher degree nurses is 47

percent compared to 22 per-cent in Pike and surrounding counties." said Simpson. "Pikeville College's pro-posed RN-BSN program can offer advanced nursing eduorier advanced nursing edu-cation, accessible faculty, and a flexible curriculum close to home."

The Elizabeth Akers Elliott nursing program at Pikeville College has a long

tradition of educating nurses to serve the health care needs of the region. Established in 1983, the program was a col-laboration between the col-lege, the late William E. The program was named in memory of Mr. Elliott's wife, Elizabeth Akers Elliott, to honor her life-long dream to become a nurse. The program graduated its first nursing class of 20 students in 1985 and has graduated an average of 22 students each year thereafter. In 1996, the college established an LPN-to-RN program of study that allowed LPNs to complete their two-year nursing degree in one year. Currently, 36 nursing students are admitted to the ALNs, program each year in Allowed LPNs to complete their two-year mursing degree in one year. Guest View-Candidates need to answer questions

We were happy to learn this week that Georgia lawmakers have approved their own prescription pill monitoring system that could help prevent the flow of narcotics northward to Kentucky where drug abuse remains a major

on KASPER

In lieu of a national system, individual states are increasingly taking it upon themselves to institute some sort of monitoring system to track the prescription of powerful painkillers like OxyContin that are continually abused right here in eastern Kentucky and elsewhere. That's a good thing, but since we're now in the middle of election season we'll take the opportunity to ask some statewide candidates about their view on Kentucky's prescription monitoring system. known as KASPER, and its effectiveness.

Gov. Steve Beshear is running for re-election and told the Herald in April that a system where physicians are required to use KASPER is an issue he will look at. He said a mandate that KASPER be used makes sense, but stopped

short of saying he will pursue it.

So, the question for the remaining candidates: Do you think KASPER should be mandatory? We can tell you right now that we do. Requiring whenever a narcotic is prescribed can cut down on successful instances of doctor shopping, and it can aid law enforcement in the prosecution of physicians who over prescribe. Most importantly, though, it can save lives.

We can also tell you what readers of the Hazard Herald think as well. According to a poll on hazard-herald.com asking that very question, an overwhelming 82 percent of the respondents agreed with the notion that KASPER should be a mandatory tool for physicians to use.







engine, the AAMCO guy is absolutely right. If you clamp off the lines and then forget to remove the clamps when you're done, you prevent the transmission fluid from getting cooled. And within 100 miles, that can raise the temperature of the transmission enough to ruin it.

#### Diet takes backseat as gout treatment

DEAR DR. DONOHUE: DEAR DR. DONOHUE:
Do you have information on gout? I am 65, and my son-inlaw is 32. We both have it. It is so painful. My doctor was pretty vague. He asked me to go on the computer to find which foods I should or should not eat. I found that you can't eat meat and fish, but salmon and chicken are all right. Some yearershelps can't. right. Some vegetables can't be eaten. How about tomatoes

right. Some vegetables can't be caten. How about tomatoes and tomato products? Does one attack mean gout is forever? What is the medicine of choice? – C.B.

ANSWER: Gout comes about when the blood uricacid level rises. Uric acid seeps into joints to form needle-shaped crystals that cause joint swelling and unspeakable pain. Uric acid, in turn, is a hyproduct of cell chemistry. Its blood level rises because a person makes too much or passes too little into the urine.

A first gout attack most over the joint turns ed and the base of the big toe. The skin over the joint turns ed and sex-ceedingly painful. One of the best ways of diagnosing rout is to dray third from the

exceedingly painful. One of the best ways of diagnosing gout is to draw fluid from the affected joint and examine it with a microscope to see the needle-shaped uric-neid crys-tals. Gout can affect other joints: the knee, wrist, nalke and fingers. One attack of gout doesn't call for lifelong treatment.

Indocin (indomethacin) is the drug most often used for

the drug most often used for an acute gout attack.

Colchicine and cortisone also work well. Medicines for gout pre-vention are taken if a person westienes for gout prevention are taken if a person, has frequent attacks (two or three a year), has formed uricacid kidney stones, has kidney damage secondary to gout or passes large amounts of uricacid into the urine. of unic acid into the urine. Zyloprim (allopurinol) reduces uric acid production. Probenecid increases its climination into the urine. Uloric, a new gout drug, is for those not responding to these two. Diet was the sole means for gout treatment in the old days. Now, with effective medicines, it takes a back seat. You ought to eliminate organ meats — liver, kidney,

ANSWER: Distilling water involves boiling water and condensing the water vapor by cooling it. Components dissolved in the water are left behind. You can drink distilled water. You will miss out on the minerals contained in most water and on fluoride added to city water, but you can get these elements in other ways. If you chew too much sugar-containing gum, you promote cavities. Too much sugar-essign can cause diarrhea. Four sticks are not too much.


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
