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Jury guilty of manslaughter

PAINTSVILLE — A murder trial against a woman who police said admitting to shooting and killing her ex-boyfriend started Monday in Johnson County and has now concluded.

A jury found Donna Wheeler guilty of manslaughter in the death of her former boyfriend, James T. Sparks, in April of last year.

Originally charged with murder, the jury found her guilty of manslaughter this week.

Police testified that Wheeler admitted to authorities that she shot and killed Sparks in the spring of last year.

Police responded in April of last year to Wheeler's home at Barber Branch after receiving a 911 call that shots had been fired at the residence. When they arrived, they reported that Wheeler was standing in the open door of the home and that Sparks was already dead outside the house near the front porch.

Sentencing has not yet been handed down for Wheeler, but the jury has recommended 14 and a half years in the verdict.

KSP to crack down for holiday weekend

FRANKFORT — Officials with trucky State Police say aggressive driving, failure to use seat belts and driving while impaired are the top three dangers faced by motorists on Kentucky highways during the upcoming Memorial Day weekend.

"The Memorial Day weekend is traditionally the beginning of the

summer driving season," says KSP Spokesman Lt. David Jude. "Traffic on the state roadways is expected to increase significantly during this time period."

State police officers plan to intensify its traffic safety and patrol efforts beginning at 6 p.m. on Friday, May 27 through 11:59 p.m. on Monday, May 30.

Last year, there were 1,238 crashes in Kentucky during the

Memorial Day weekend. Eight people lost their lives and 432 were injured.

"As of May 25, 2011, a total of 233 people have lost their lives on Kentucky's roadways in 2011," says Jude. "Of the 173 motor vehicle deaths, 156 were not wearing seat belts and 33 were the result of crashes involving the suspected use of alcohol."

As part of the "Click It Or

Ticket" campaign, which started May 23 and continues through June 5, troopers will be working overtime during the Memorial Day holiday. Operations will include increased saturation patrols and traffic safety checkpoints in high crash, high traffic locations, radar and laser devices and coordinated enforcement activities with local police and sheriff's departments for maximum coverage, officials added.

Very little to hear at school public hearing

MARTIN — The Floyd County Board of Education held a public meeting Tuesday at May Valley Elementary to give members of the community a chance to ask questions and make comments about the proposed merger of Allen Central and South Floyd High School, but none of those in attendance said a word about the plan.

Tim Eaton, with the Kentucky School Board Association, served as moderator for the hearing and encouraged the few community members in attendance to voice

their concerns or ask questions, but nobody approached the microphone. Eaton also said that comments and questions could be handed to him on paper, but that didn't spur those in attendance to participate.

According to the Floyd County Schools District Facilities Plan, which was approved earlier this month by the Local Planning Committee, Allen Central High School will be renovated to become a permanent Area Technology Center/District Transportation and Maintenance Department, and South Floyd High School would become the new home for students from

McDowell Elementary and Osborne Elementary. Copies of the plan were made available to the public at the hearing.

The new high school is estimated to cost over \$24 million and have a 750-student capacity. The site for the 112,853 square-foot high school is yet to be determined. A new alternative school is also part of the plan at an estimated cost of over \$5 million. The plan is subject to approval by the Kentucky Board of Education with a tentative date set for June.

According to Supt. Henry Webb, the plan could take up to 10 years to complete and is dependent on funding.

2-year-old drowns

Judge rules against state in price-gouging action

FRANKFORT — Attorney General Jack Conway responded in a statement Thursday voicing his disappointment in a ruling denying his request for an injunction against Marathon Oil to keep its prices at or below what it charged before a declared state of emergency in response to severe weather. "We are disappointed in today's ruling by the judge that denied our request for an injunction — an injunction that would have required Marathon Oil to keep its prices at or below what it charged before the

declared state of emergency," Conway said. "Despite the judge's ruling, I am pleased that gas prices have gone down a little bit since we sought the injunction."

Conway filed a motion for temporary injunction in Franklin Circuit Court on May 13, alleging the company illegally raised the wholesale price of gas and other motor fuels in markets across Kentucky during a time of emergency. Leading up to the motion, Conway said numerous citizens across the state called and emailed his office to report the "drastic changes in gas prices that reached more than \$4 a gallon at the

pump in many communities."

At one point, gas prices jumped some 30 cents overnight.

"I pursued this case to protect the best interests of consumers across the Commonwealth, who are hurting right now," Conway added in his statement Thursday. "Today's ruling is limited to this particular injunction, and the judge was clear that it does not affect the ongoing and underlying price-gouging case against Marathon. I believe Marathon has engaged in price gouging, and we plan to aggressively pursue that case."

Letcher woman facing SSI fraud charge

PIKEVILLE — A Letcher County woman could soon be formally charged with fraudulently securing Supplemental Security Income, after a filing by the United States Attorney in U.S. District Court in Pikeville. Oma Faye Shepherd could face up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine if she is charged and convict-

ed. U.S. Attorney's office filed information with the court on Thursday and a notice of an intent to charge Shepherd.

According to the filing, "On or about a day in September 1994, the exact date unknown, and continuing through July 2007, in Letcher County, in the Eastern District of Kentucky, and elsewhere, Oma Faye Shepherd, having knowledge of a circum-

stance and the occurrence of an event affecting her continued right to benefits under Title XVI of the Social Security Act, as amended, that is, with who she resided, that individual's income, their shared expenses, and additional resources made available to her, knowingly and willfully concealed and failed to disclose such circumstances and event with intent to fraudulently secure Supplemental Security Income."

There is a lot to be hopeful for around this time of year, as the greenery of eastern Kentucky fully unfolds and the natural beauty of the region is on display.

Something that makes us even more hopeful is a continuing effort to educate local students on the importance of reforesting reclaimed surface mine sites where the topsoil and natural vegetation were stripped and dumped in valley fills in order to mine the coal underneath the ground. We saw a part of this effort last week on a James River Coal site near Vicco as nearly a hundred students took part in an event to plant saplings and learn about pollinator habitats.

Though there continues to be a lively debate on the merits of mountaintop removal mining between its opponents and supporters, something we all should be able to agree upon is the fact that the earth needs to be adequately repaired once the mining has ceased. That begins with ensuring native hardwood and coniferous species are replaced.

There are numerous benefits to reforestation, including the improved health of the soil and wildlife habitat, which in turn ensures that we're going to be leaving future generations with a sustainable and healthy environment.

We find it hopeful that officials are at least beginning to make an effort to teach younger generations with a hands-on approach that protecting and maintaining our forests is important not only for our present, but for their future. Coal won't always be here, and while Mother Nature will eventually reclaim the land for herself, we should be ensuring that when coal leaves we have something here with the potential to create something new.

We can't afford to wait for Nature to take its course. In this arena we need to become proactive.

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Flood-damaged counties to get dump assistance

FRANKFORT — Governor Steve Beshear announced Thursday that approximately \$780,000 is being awarded in emergency grants to help 26 flood-damaged counties clean up solid waste generated by flooding. "As flood waters recede

and clean up begins, sanitary disposal of damaged property can become a tremendous burden on counties and their citizens," Gov. Beshear said. "These emergency funds will assist those affected by the floods in properly disposing of flood-damaged

items." Participating counties may elect a grant of up to \$30,000, depending on their assessment of the cost to deal with the solid waste generated by flooding in their counties. All grantees must provide a 25-percent

match to their grant amount. Counties may collect the municipal solid waste from residents, or may establish one or more collection points to which residents can deliver such solid waste for disposal by the county. State funding for the ille-

gal open dump grant program comes from a \$1.75 environmental remediation fee for each ton of garbage disposed of at Kentucky municipal solid waste disposal facilities. The "tipping fee," authorized by the 2002 General Assembly under House Bill 174, is collected quarterly and placed in the Kentucky Pride Fund to help combat illegal dumping and finance the closure of old landfills. The Kentucky Pride Fund

is the first legislated and ongoing source of state funding for dump cleanup. Illegal open dump cleanup has been conducted in Kentucky for several years, primarily using county and federal money. This is the third round of emergency grants awarded outside of the normal annual grant cycle to assist counties in eliminating solid waste dumps created by a natural disaster.

PSC approves Kentucky Power energy efficiency program

The Kentucky Public Service Commission (PSC) approved an expansion of residential energy conservation and efficiency programs for Kentucky Power Company Wednesday.

The expansion would allow the company to push programs for the installation of "high-efficiency" heating and cooling systems, said PSC spokesman Andrew Melnykovich.

The commission issued the order late Wednesday afternoon, which will

also allow revised surcharges believed to be a move that could result in lower bills for residential customers.

The expanded programs are intended to replace inefficient heating units with heat pumps, which can use less energy. They include incentives of up to \$400 for mobile home owners who make the switch, Melnykovich said.

A similar program, with a \$400 incentive as well, is available for owners of site-built homes who replace resistance heaters or old heat pumps with new units, while those who have bought new mobile homes could get up to \$500 for upgrading.

Power company officials say they hope to expand the programs to serve a total of 710 residential customers each year, about 200 more than those currently taking advantage of the incentives.

Melnykovich said Wednesday the charge for residential customers' electric bills would drop from 16 cents per kilowatt-hour to .08 cents per kilowatt-hour, with the program costing roughly \$2.5 million annually.

Man arrested after half-hour shooting spree

EASTERN — An East Point man originally jailed on a \$100,000 cash bond, who later saw that bond reduced to \$25,000, is facing charges of wanton endangerment, driving under the influence and other charges after police say he fired his gun for nearly 30 minutes while they were trying to apprehend him.

Lonell Murray, 49, of East Point, was arrested just before 3 a.m. on May 23 after police responded to a complaint from the man's mother-in-law, Joanna Meade.

Meade told police that Murray had been making

threats against her and told officers arriving at her home her son-in-law was outside her home firing a gun and would not stop.

"Once we stepped out of the vehicle and approached her residence (Murray) continued to fire his gun," officers wrote in their report filed after Murray's arrest. "We could not see or locate (Murray) for safety reasons. We believed he was on the other side of a small hill or his residence which we passed on the way into the residence."

With the gunshots a "few hundred feet" from where they were, the officers opted to instead to try to use their P.A. system in their cruiser to request that Murray stop shooting, the report said.

According to those records, the arresting officers said that from 2:22 a.m. until 2:49 a.m., they tried "every few minutes" to get Murray to stop shooting his weapon. After the nearly 30 minutes, they said he drove his vehicle to where they were, saying he had been "sitting on his porch shooting bats."

Officers said they could smell alcohol on Murray and later went to his home and took photographs of the spent rounds.

Murray was jailed first on a \$100,000 cash bond, but that amount was amended following a signed order from Judge James R. Allen the same day Murray was arrested.

Alex Griffith, the third-place batter in the Prestonsburg order, fin-






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MOVIES FROM THE BLACK LAGOON 'Trained to Kill: U.S.A.'

This film refuses to be a standard action yarn about war vets squaring off against a gang of hoods.

Instead, you get a well-measured study of a returning war hero, Olie Hand, and the charismatic hustler, Prophet, that he will eventually confront.

We meet Prophet first. He and a rat like henchman fun afoul of Olie's dad when they attempt to rob his house. They also fail to score points with his wholesome sister, who escapes into the desert before they can manhandle her. They miss running into Olie, who arrives from the airport and promptly states he has no interest in running down the thugs who menaced his father. It is apparent that he is disturbed, but the movie takes its time letting you know what drove him around the bend.

The arrival of war buddies hastens the process, and Olie eventually reveals that he was a Special Forces commando with a long list of confirmed kills that are weighing heavy on his conscience. Reentering society does not prove easy, and it doesn't help that his father has bragged to the whole town about Olie's war record.

Meanwhile, we also get closer to Prophet and realize he is one of those still waters that run awfully deep. He is tired of being beholden to the man and feels he is due a big payday. He orchestrates a plan to rob a vacationing family of their camper, but that scheme backfires when one of his henchmen kills the family's eccentric father.

Around the halfway point, Olie runs into some of the gang as they are roasting at a local gas station and pastes them with a little help from his army buddies. The news doesn't sit well with Prophet, who opts to rob the Hand family of dad's gun collection and use it to rob the local bank before exacting some revenge on the Hand family. To this end, he enlists the aid of a biker gang, while Olie figures things out and brings back his whole unit for a huge showdown that includes bullets, hand grenades and even some bazooka action.

The finale pits Olie against the biker, but he is so far gone at this point that nobody is safe. It is an effective and bloody conclusion that offers a lot of carnage in a short period of time and works even better than those flicks where you have an action sequence every 10 minutes.

This works well and actually pairs action with drama. The cast is a lot better than you'd expect, with Steve Sandor doing a fine job as Olie. This guy deserved the kind of career Sylvester Stallone has, but then again the part quality is pretty poor. Part of that is because it is squeezed into the "50 Action Movies Pack." Politeness on the road is not always a good thing

Dear Tom and Ray:
I read your column all the time and value your opinion (especially if you side with me). My husband (whom I call Bubba, if you are interested) frequently will stop to let someone else go first at intersections, when he is the one with the right of way. He feels he is being polite, but I, on the other hand, think it just creates confusion and slows

the flow of traffic. What do you guys think? Thanks for listening to my troubles! — Anita
TOM: Does Bubba only do this when the other driver is a cute young woman? Because if that's the case, we might have to side with him.
RAY: You're right, Anita. One of the keys to making this whole driving thing work is predictability. You need to be able to predict, for instance, that an oncoming driver is going to stay in

her own lane as she drives past you.
TOM: You need to be able to predict, with certainty, that the person making a left turn across your lane is going to wait until you pass. Not that you don't keep an eye on him just in case he's a moron or on the phone, but we rely on that predictability to prevent chaos and keep traffic moving.
RAY: So when Bubba violates the expectations of other drivers, even if he's just trying to be nice, he's increasing unpredictability. And that means someone else on the road may be surprised by what's happening. Which can cause an accident.
TOM: Here's an example: You're driving down the road, and someone's trying to exit a driveway. You decide to be nice, so you stop and wave the person out. That's thoughtful. But the person behind you has no idea that you might stop in the middle of the road for no apparent (to him) reason, and he smashes into the back of your car.
RAY: Well, legally, it's his fault for not noticing that you stopped. But you created an unnecessary, and unpredictable, hazard. The right thing to do would have been to drive by, and let the driveway dweller pull out when the road was clear of traffic.

RAY: But tell Bubba that when he has the right of way, he should take it so that he doesn't confuse other drivers. And if he wants to flirt with young women at intersections, tell him we suggest a nice, warm smile as he drives by. And the universal hand signal for "Call me later."



Reader with a rebuilt transmission has a case
Dear Tom and Ray:
My dad is older (87) but is still a good driver. However, his hearing is not very good. When he uses his turn signal for a gentle turn, and it doesn't shut off by itself, he can't hear it to turn it off. He just bought a 2010 Honda Element (his second one). What is the best way to make the signal louder so he can hear it? By the way, if this works, it would solve two problems: It would make the turn signal louder, and it would make my mother quieter. You see, right now she is the one who hollers at my dad to turn off the signal (smile). — Nancy
RAY: So, let's see if I have this right. He can't hear the turn-signal flasher. And he doesn't notice the blinking light on the dashboard. So he can't hear and can't see, but he's still a good driver. OK, gotcha.
TOM: One obvious concern is that if he can't hear the flasher and can't pick up the blinking light, he may be missing other things as well. And since hearing and seeing both are crucial to driving, you should take a fresh look, and make sure your dad's really aware of everything that's going on around him on the road.
RAY: If the issue really is just hearing, and hearing aids have not helped the problem, you can check with your dealer. The blinker noise is made by the actual flasher unit itself — completing and then breaking the circuit. In the old days, flasher units were pretty interchangeable. But now they're specific to individual cars. So only your Honda dealer would know

Nuts to you. I keep raw almonds in the fridge and will mix some almonds with dried apricots. Talk about your fiber count — yee haw! Plus the added bonus of all those nutrients. Great snack for kids and adults alike!
Cheese whiz. Not that icky stuff you squirt out on a cracker. But string cheese and cheddar cubes, for starters. Skip American cheese — it's not cheese but cheese "product." That should be enough to scare you away!
Next week, there will be more, so clip these out, put them on the fridge and don't forget to add this stuff to your grocery list!
