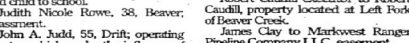

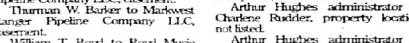

Kentucky and embarked on the process of creating a pharmacy program two years ago. Midway has renovated a 36,000-square-foot facility in Paintsville and has begun the process of recruiting faculty and students. The agreement between the two schools paves the way for an innovative educational program. It enables Midway College to fulfill the intent of its major donors to train pharmacists in Paintsville and serve the educational needs of the area, while allowing the University of Charleston to expand its footprint and grow its already strong academic program.

From day one, the mission has been to prepare pharmacists to meet the needs of rural West Virginia and the Appalachian region, said Dr. Edwin Welch, president of the University of

Charleston. "This potential expansion is a continuation of that interest. The University of Charleston has a long history of innovative solutions like working with the City of Charleston to provide preventive medication counseling to its employees, and collaborating with other colleges to utilize shared computing resources in the Independent College Enterprise (ICE). We are happy to bring that expertise to this opportunity in Kentucky."

The Paintsville school will be known as the Perry Center for Pharmacy Education at the University of Charleston School of Pharmacy. The school of pharmacy was the dream of the late Chad Perry and this collaborative project will achieve Mr. Perry's priorities.

"Midway College sees this as the most prudent means of bringing pharmacy education to the area and fulfilling all of

our goals," said Dr. William B. Drake, Jr., president of Midway College. "Building a school from the ground up takes great effort, time, money and innovation. This collaboration is innovative — we are matching our turkeye curriculum with UC's existing curriculum to move along the process of realizing the dream of opening a school of pharmacy in Paintsville less expensively for all involved. This gets us to where we want to be, sooner rather than later."

Midway's current faculty and staff will be interviewed by the University of Charleston for positions needed at the Paintsville site, assuming a final agreement is reached, and Midway's current accepted pharmacy students will be encouraged to apply to UC to be considered for admission into the University of Charleston program.

Blackburn was arrested and transported to the Floyd County Detention Center. He was released the same day on a \$5,000 surety bond.

On Tuesday, a bench warrant was issued after he allegedly failed to meet the terms of his probation.

During Wednesday's hearing, Blackburn's probation was reinstated and he was released on pretrial monitoring, which includes a pill count, levels testing and strict drug testing by the courts to be certain that no abuse of his

legally prescribed medicine is occurring.

Blackburn was elected to the position of Floyd County Surveyor in 2010, following a nailbiter race between five candidates. Blackburn defeated among others, incumbent Teresa Hall, and took 29 percent of the votes. Despite his position as County Surveyor, Blackburn's name does not appear on the list of 22 people in Floyd County who currently hold a surveyor's license by the Kentucky Board of Engineers and Land Surveyors.

at the time by Det. Steve Little, with the Prestonsburg Police Department, Fisher was allegedly jostled to the beatings over the course of three days. Fisher had pleaded guilty before being detained at the detention center to abusing a minor.

The grand jury charges that the men committed the offense when they "intentionally caused serious physical injury to Terry Fisher by beating, stomping, and/or kicking him with (their) hands and/or

feet."

In the federal suit filed against the Floyd County Detention Center in U.S. District Court in Pikeville, Tina Green, niece of Terry Fisher, says her uncle "suffered broken ribs, a broken back, fractures of his skull and facial bones, and other injuries too numerous to mention," adding that when he was later taken to the hospital, where he was placed on a ventilator, he had a shoeprint on the side of his head and was "in a near-vegetative state."

The last action taken in the lawsuit was a teleconference, which took place in December. An April federal court filing said that one defendant who faced a first-degree assault charge, Michael Rowland, had died since charges had been filed. Currently, only two of the defendants, Kevin Woods and Matthew Richie, are still in the custody of the Floyd County Detention Center.

First-degree assault is a Class B felony punishable by 10 to 20 years in prison.

Chris Hoffman, chief operating officer for Highlands, says hiring a cardiologist of Shapiro's caliber is big news for Eastern Kentucky, where it is often difficult to attract professionals.

"It's tough to get someone who is that credentialed," Hoffman said.

Hoffman also noted that it was important for the hospital to hire Shapiro, given the region's health needs.

"In this area, the number-one problem is heart disease," Hoffman said.

Shapiro is currently in the process of relocating to the area, but will begin seeing patients at the Highlands Heart and Vascular Center, on the third floor of the Highlands

Medical Office Building, in Prestonsburg. The center is set to open Jan. 23.

Services offered will include cardiac cath, cardiac CT, echocardiography, stress testing, EKG, holter monitoring, nuclear imaging, and peripheral arterial disease management among many others. Appointments are available by calling (606) 889-6210.

Guest View Solyndra and the real risk to taxpayers

The bankruptcy of Solyndra, a solar company that received a federal loan guarantee, has made the front page because of charges of cronyism. But among the biggest risks to taxpayers, who underwrite federal loan guarantees, isn't renewable energy. It is nuclear power.

But nuclear power remains the most expensive and dangerous way to boil water to create electricity. The excessive time horizon needed to plan, design and build a unit makes it overly expensive and unable to compete with other energy resources, such as energy efficiency, wind or solar.

The Department of Energy declared its intent to conditionally issue a loan guarantee of \$8.33 billion to Georgia Power and its utility partners in February 2010. Why should taxpayers be concerned? Congress and the DOE are ignoring the sordid history of nuclear power plant construction and bailouts, recent developments in nuclear plant construction, and the low-balled cost of Georgia Power's proposed additions.

Now is no different than 30 years ago. The French, considered the nuclear experts in the West, are having the same difficulties of cost overruns and delays at its nuclear plant construction site in Finland. Progress Energy's proposed nuclear plant in Florida of the same design as the French and Georgia Power proposal, went from an estimated \$2.5-\$3.5 billion in 2006 to more than \$22 billion in 2010. And they've barely turned a spade of dirt.

Forbes magazine in 1985 called nuclear power the "worst managerial disaster in history." The Economist in 2001 declared nuclear power "too expensive to matter." Moody's in 2009 viewed "nuclear generation plants as a 'bet the farm' endeavor for most companies ..."

Georgia Power estimated \$14 billion for its Vogtle plant in 2006 and has not revised the estimate. Indeed, they are withholding new cost estimates as confidential information. It hopes to have its construction and operating permit by the end of 2011. A recent analysis of the plant estimated the mid-range cost of the units at \$10,775 per kilowatt. This would put the cost of the plant at \$24 billion. The DOE is recklessly forging ahead with support for the new nuclear units in Georgia without knowing the ultimate cost and exposure to taxpayers, yet being familiar with nuclear power's disastrous financial history.

Government warned us, too. In 2003, the Congressional Budget Office considered "the risk of default on [nuclear loan guarantees] to be very high - well above 50 percent." And this was before soaring costs and a devastating economic crisis.

Defining smart use of public funds to advance a safe, secure and clean energy future for the country is the right debate. The executive and legislative branch's continuing investment of taxpayer money in nuclear power should be the subject of investigations and public scrutiny.

These facts and a near, if not actual, depression have not deterred the DOE or Congress' enthusiasm for nuclear power in its bid to bail out the industry once again with public dollars.

Surging Shelby Valley continued to limit Allen Central throughout the second half. The Lady Kats carried a 63-34 lead out of the third quarter.

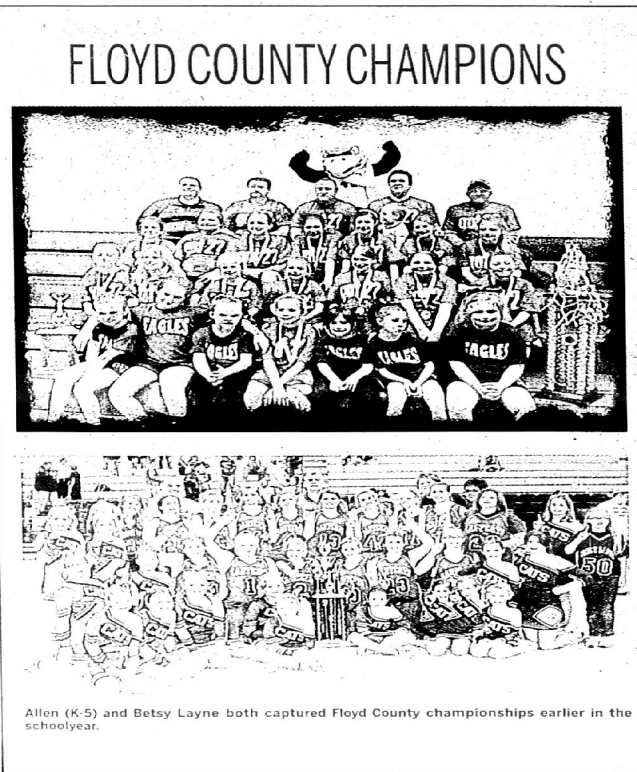
Sophomore guard Sarah Rife paced Allen Central with a game-high 23 points. Rife was the only Allen Central player to reach double figures

in the scoring column. Junior guard Hannah MacElhose and sophomore center/forward Krista Parsons added nine points apiece for Allen Central in the loss.

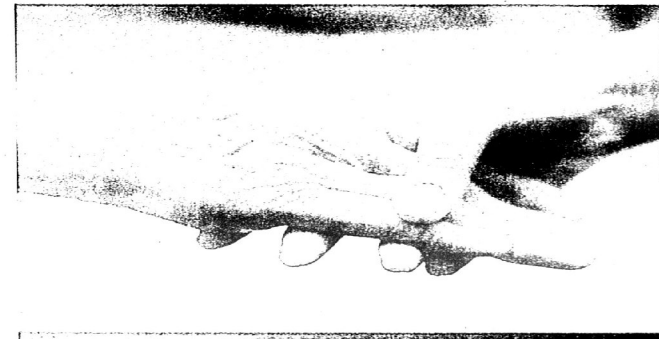
Alyssa Moore had six points, Brooklyn Martin three and Deshae Elliott two for the Lady Rebs.


