Hi-speed chase ends after two crashes

Prestonsburg police officer dragged as suspect attempted to get away

PRESTONSBURG — Prestonsburg Police are reporting that one of their officers was dragged down the road after making a routine police stop Tuesday afternoon, before engaging the suspect in a high-speed pursuit. Police say that the pursuit involved two separate car crashes before it came to an end in Pike County.

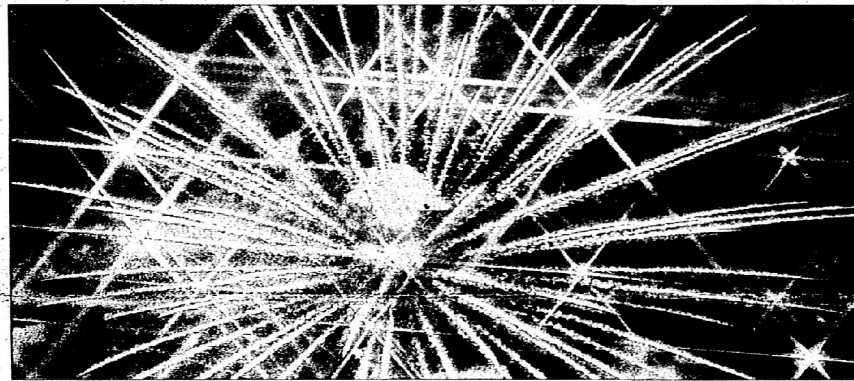
According to Prestonsburg Police Assistant Chief Brian Hall, an officer had stopped a vehicle driven by Christopher Hall, near the on ramp of U.S. 23's south bound lane near Prestonsburg. Hall says the suspect provided the officer with a false name. At this time,

another officer arrived on scene. When the initial officer returned to the vehicle to question the subject about the false name, the suspect allegedly grabbed the officer's arm and started driving down the road. What followed, police say, was a high-speed pursuit reaching speeds in excess of 100 miles per hour, that led police

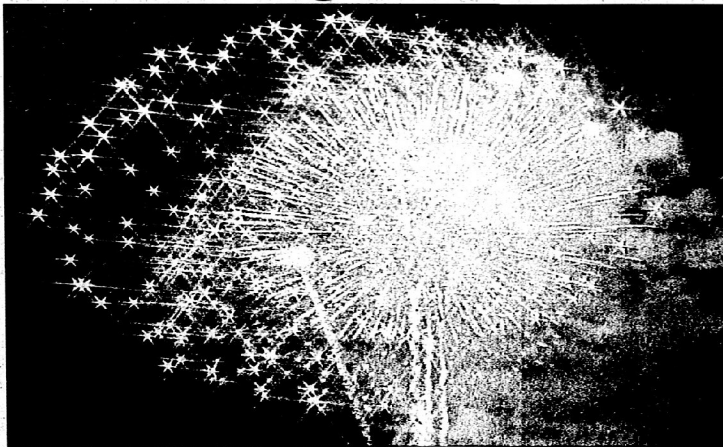
into Pike County. In Pike County, the suspect allegedly collided with another vehicle that, according to Hall, was occupied by "a family." The suspect continued, before finally crashing near Pikeville High School. Hall said both the suspect and the family were treated for their injuries at Pikeville Medical Center.

On Thursday, Hall, who is reportedly still receiving treatment at Pikeville Medical Center, was scheduled to be arraigned on two counts of first-degree wanton endangerment, first-degree fleeing or evading police, resisting arrest, theft of identity, giving officer false name, reckless driving, driving on DUI-suspended license,

second-degree disorderly conduct, and first-degree assault. The investigation is ongoing. Time staff will continue to follow this story and update it as new information becomes available. Prestonsburg Police were assisted by Kentucky State Police, Kentucky Motor Vehicle Enforcement and Pikeville Police.

New board tackles Allen VFD finances

ALLEN — Allen Volunteer Fire Department is picking up the pieces and moving forward, after questions were raised three months ago about questionable spending.

The Allen Volunteer Fire Department has undergone some significant changes following a Floyd County Times story in April which examined a series of invoices containing several items of questionable spending.

All total: The Times received copies of 13 invoices dated Feb. 2 to March 16, totaling \$175,267.94. The invoices were all tied to Lawson Contracting Inc., a corporation located in Garrett and owned by Darren Lawson.

Since then, both Fire Chief Roy Compton and Assistant Chief Larry Castle have resigned, and a new tax board has been created.

On Thursday, new tax board Chairman Ella Clay said the board is beginning to get things under control. "We think we finally have our finances straightened out."

Clay said money is tight, and the department will not receive any more tax money until December. "We're not spending on anything that is not a necessity," said Clay.

According to Clay, State Auditor Adam Edelen is reviewing the station's past spending. Stephenie Stitzer, communications director with Edelen's office, said that the auditor's office received a citizen complaint about questionable spending earlier this spring, and in June requested more information from the board.

According to Stitzer the investigation is very preliminary at this point.

Lawson Contracting billed Allen Volunteer Fire Department, and was paid for a number of services, including \$12,000 for poured concrete, \$8,000 for the installation of 150 feet of guardrail, \$3,000 to remove and replace a water heater, and then an additional \$2,500 to re-plumb and rewire the water heater.

The Times reached out to Darren Lawson in April to ask him about invoices. Lawson told The Times he believed someone was out to destroy his business and he was planning to seek legal action.

The next scheduled Tax Board meeting for Allen Volunteer Fire Department is August 7, at 7 p.m.

Teen killed in hit-and-run

MELVIN — A teenager was killed in a hit-and-run accident, while riding a miniature motorcycle on the highway.

Kentucky State Police reported receiving a call concerning a wreck on Route 122, at Melvin. According to police, Alex Mullins, 18, of Melvin, was driving a miniature sport motorcycle on the highway, when he was struck by a vehicle that then fled the scene.

Mullins was transported to Holston Valley Medical Center, in Kingsport, Tenn., where he was pronounced dead.

Police continued investigating the accident and later found a 2004 Saturn SUV, which they determined had been the other vehicle involved.

Officers then concluded that Chester D. Hunter, 26, of Melvin, was driving the vehicle at the time of the wreck.

Hunter has been charged with first-degree driving under the influence, leaving the scene of an accident, failure to render aid and several traffic offenses.

KSP Det. Jason Dials is handling the investigation of the crash.

ALLEN — Say what you want about Ruben A. Stephens, of Allen. He certainly cannot be accused of failing to stick to something.

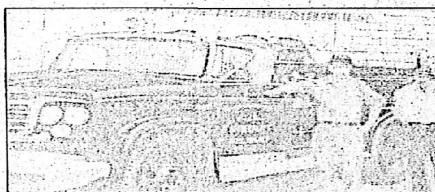
Stephens, 82, not only helped found Allen Volunteer Fire Department, back in 1961. He is a 50-year member of the department, serving as chief for 10 years and assistant chief for many more.

A World War II veteran who enlisted in the Army Air Corps when only 16, he

returned home from the war to work 35 years in the coal mines. In August 1967, he not only survived a violent mine explosion, he continued working to help return the bodies of the victims.

He has also been a member of the Masons for 37 years, becoming a 32nd degree Scottish Rite Mason, while driving a van to transport sick children from Eastern Kentucky to Shriener's Children's Hospital, in Lexington.

Last week, Stephens returned home from the war to work 35 years in the coal mines. In August 1967, he not only survived a violent mine explosion, he continued working to help return the bodies of the victims.

Lessons Andy Griffith could teach us all

It is hard to write something about the passing of Andy Griffith that hasn't already been said.

Television pundits, fans and columnists the world over have spoken endlessly about the lessons to be learned from "The Andy Griffith Show" and the fictional Sheriff Andy Taylor, and no one can argue those lessons aren't good, positive, wholesome values we should all embrace.

Not as many have talked about Griffith, the real-life man. The famed actor came from humble beginnings — many might even say he grew up in an impoverished home. Through a combination of talent, hard work, and dogged pursuit of a dream, he became an international star.

His climb to the status of icon is well-chronicled, from early success as a comedian to starring in what is arguably the most popular American television show of all time ("The Andy Griffith Show").

Griffith also experienced his share of controversy. He was said to be, at times, cantankerous and difficult to work with. He most assuredly was able to hold a grudge, particularly against those he perceived as having wronged him or his family during his youthful days in Mount Airy. And he made himself a target of wrath for many when he did a television spot seemingly endorsing President Obama's Health Care Reform.

But even in those less-than-flattering parts of his life, Griffith has much to teach us. He could be difficult, but mostly because he demanded a level of excellence for which some weren't willing to work. He did hold grudges, but as he aged he became soft-hearted toward many of those who had, in fact, wronged him, and he showed the humility and wisdom to put aside those hard feelings and re-establish connections.

As for the health care reform — for good or bad, Griffith stood up and spoke his mind, just as he has in several North Carolina gubernatorial races. Agree or disagree with his position, it is good to see a person state what he believes, regardless of the popularity of those beliefs.

Griffith also exhibited throughout his life an intense loyalty to his friends, whether those be from his childhood days or people he met along his climb to the top of his profession. He was quietly kind, often donating to charitable causes — many times he footed the bill for Christmas gifts for underprivileged families in the town of Manteo — and he worked hard to keep those donations private.

And he worked extremely hard at his craft, not for fame — Griffith shunned the limelight and aggressively guarded his privacy — but simply because he felt, as colleague and lifelong friend Ron Howard said Griffith taught him, if you're going to do something, you ought to do it well.

Not to cast a shadow over the fictional Andy Taylor, but if we look past him at the Andy Griffith, we will see many characteristics that we would do well to emulate.

Beyond the Beltway Save austerity measures for the next boom

There are two competing theories on how to pull us out of the economic slump we're in, but you'd hardly know it from the debate going on in Washington. Conservatives, who want us to cut spending to prosperity, keep drowning out those who think we should be pumping money into the economy by spending more on teachers, research, roads, bridges, and other public works. The small government, budget-cutting "austerity" advocates speak in strident, confident voices, while the proponents of more government spending — the people called "Keynesians" (after the 20th-century British economist, John Maynard Keynes) — speak in apologetic, barely audible tones, as though they're afraid of offending someone.

President Barack Obama is the latter. He sounds defensive when he puts forward one of his anemic "stimulus" plans and is always careful to balance expenditures with money from a tax increase for the rich. He's even gone so far as to bring out the stale comparison equating a government in debt with families that live beyond their means. There's only one solution for indebted households, and nations, conservatives say — belt-tightening.

And that's pretty much what Obama

said last year: We've run up too much debt, and now we have to start tightening our belts. It was a shot into every Keynesian's heart.

"No, no," I wanted to shout. "That's their argument, not yours." Fortunately, I didn't shout it. (When you start yelling at the television set, you're only one step away from wearing a tag with your name and address on it, so when you go out, you can find your way back home.)

New York Times columnist Paul Krugman is a Keynesian, but not of the shrinking-violet variety. He's a Nobel-Prize-winning economist who speaks in a loud, clear voice that irritates the heck out of conservatives. That is to say, he speaks sense.

But not "common sense." Common sense is on the budget-cutters' side. When your family has run up a lot of debt, cutting back on spending seems self-evidently the right thing to do. Why are governments different?

Krugman answers that as well and succinctly as anyone I've read. "An economy is not like an indebted family," he wrote a few weeks ago. "Our debt is mostly money we owe to each other, even more important, our income mostly comes from selling things to each other. Your spending is my income, and my spending is your income. So what happens if everyone simultaneously slashes spending in an attempt to pay down debt? The an-

swer is everyone's income falls ... and, as our incomes plunge, our debt problem gets worse, not better."

"When the private sector is frantically trying to pay down debt," he adds, "the public sector should do the opposite, spending when the private sector can't or won't. By all means let's balance our budget once the economy has recovered — but not now. The boom, not the slump, is the right time for austerity."

Sounds good to me, but they were still teaching Keynes when I was in school.

In Europe today, apparently not so much. But there's some indication that the hardliners are backing off from their most draconian prescriptions.

Not all conservatives are stupid, you know. The intelligent ones fear that more deficit spending in the face of a huge national debt will trigger inflation that, in the long run, will mean ruination. It's better to let the economy boom and rebuild it from the ground up, they say.

Personally, I prefer to delay whatever long-term medicine we might need, because it's entirely possible that we're able to make things better now without government austerity. As Keynes, a witty man, once said of economists who insisted on the long view: "In the long run, we are all dead."

Movies from the Black Lagoon — 'Mother's Day' remake of 1980s horror classic

A housewarming party gets all kinds of awkward, when a family of psychotic criminals arrives without an invitation, in this remake of the 1980s horror classic.

The original film was an ultra-low-budget effort that benefitted from gore effects and a spirited cast. It told the tale of three girlfriends who are attacked by a family of psychos. The women take it on the chin for most of the film, but eventually they strike back when their inspirational leader is murdered by the crazed killers.

The remake takes some of these elements but sets its sights higher by increasing the size of the cast and setting the story in a mid-western town that is being evacuated in the wake of a tornado warning.

The story begins with three brothers fleeing from a botched bank robbery that saw them lose the loot to the only crook who wasn't

a member of their family. Making matters worse is that the youngest sibling caught a bullet and their home base has been sold to another family that isn't very happy to find them crashing their house party. Those bankers may have messed up our economy, but at least their actions make a plot point like losing one's home instantly credible.

The guests are a motley crew, but they provide plenty of fodder, especially when Mom shows up, with younger sister in tow, and proves to be the mastermind behind this wild bunch. To make matters worse, she is also mighty mad since losing the home. Mom soon learns that her sons had been sending money to the old homestead, but the new owners claim to nothing about that. What follows is a long night of party games that even the Marquis De Sade would eschew.

The film splits into two stories from here on in, with Mom and her boys

breaking up the party, while the oldest son takes a ride through town with the lady of the house and everybody's debit card for some getaway money. While they hit the ATMs in town, the party goes to the dogs when Mother figures out that the man of the house is a good liar. This is a very bad development for the guests, as mom is not above using them as so much cannon fodder to get what she wants.

It all comes down to a brutal fight, as the guests figure out that they will have to get bloody if they want to survive the evening. The resulting battle is a lot of things, but mostly messy, as people are cut, burned and even peppered with nails before this party breaks up.

They get a lot of mileage out of the concept of motherhood here, as most of the ensuing violence is committed in her name. The film gets a huge boost from Rebecca De Mornay as the titular terror. She is remark-

ably controlled in the role and comes off as a more polite version of that other horror villain, "The Step Father."

The violence and torture sequences are painful to watch, thanks to director Darren Lynn Bauman ("Saw 3"). He proves to be the right director for this material and is deft at mixing moods, so that you will find yourself laughing at certain scenes, while cringing during others.

The only place they drop the ball here is the ending. The original film had a crazed yet satisfying conclusion that involved a female bigfoot-type creature, but this version opts for letting some bad guys off the hook, which totally violates the spirit of the original film and leaves you unsatisfied. Still it's all well executed, even if they can't wrap it up in a tight bow by the final credits.

There are less fistfuls (Connors was well into his 50s), but Mannix still tackles puzzling enigmas with his standard sock to the jaw. Guest stars include Sam Elliot, Frank Langella and Claude Akins.

"The Entity" — A young woman is repeatedly assaulted by a sexual predator in this adult horror drama. The story is based on a real case and it is delivered in a straightforward manner that doesn't shy away from the subject matter, but

which also manages to be more of a drama than a terror tale. (Aut direction by Sidney Furie ("The Boys in Company C") is well matched to the performances of Barbara Hershey, as the victim, and Ron Silver.

"Joshua" — Child-based horror movies tend to fizzle out as they don't reach their target audience (parents, who are too busy to watch horror movies about killer kids). This one works and charts the horrors that ensue when a second child comes along and disrupts the world of her older, and very nasty, sibling. This is more of an in-your-face yarn than the dramatic "We Need to Talk About Kevin," but it is well done. Sam Rockwell and Vera Farmiga star as the harried parents.

Arm Drop Drags is \$25. All drivers participating in the event must have a D.O.T.-approved helmet.

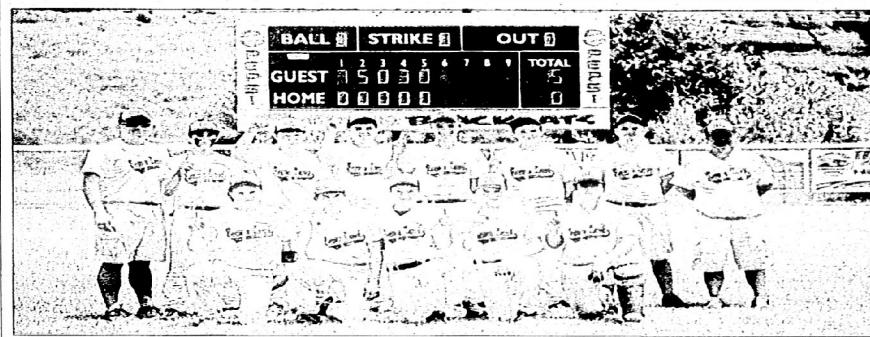

UK Baseball: Henderson signs new contract

LEXINGTON - University of Kentucky baseball coach Gary Henderson, who directed the Wildcats to a school-record 45-win season in 2012, has signed a new five-year contract, UK Athletics Director Mitch Barnhart announced Tuesday.

"I want to begin by thanking Mitch, Dr. Caplouto and Marc Hill for their overall commitment to our baseball program and for helping us establish Kentucky baseball as one of the nation's elite," Henderson said. "We have had some exciting moments during my nine years at UK and we still have a lot of things that we want to accomplish."

"I also want to thank our players and their families. They all bought in. We have a group of kids that have tremendous pride in the program, they like each other and they like to play. The complete and total absence of selfishness that our club demonstrated this past season will be vitally important to maintain as we move forward. We have great kids with supportive families and it is my responsibility, along with my staff, to make sure they clearly understand Kentucky baseball will not be sneaking up on anybody in 2013."

UK baseball assistant coaches Brad Bohannon and Brian Green have also been inked to new contracts. Bohannon serves as UK's recruiting coordinator and Green functions as the offensive coordinator and hitting coach.

"It was very important to me that we were able to keep Brad Bohannon, Brian Green and Keith Vorhoff on my staff," Henderson said. "My three assistants have tremendous passion, energy, intelligence and work ethic. The continuity of our staff has been a program strength and I appreciate Mitch's efforts to help with that continuity."

"I want to thank the Big Blue Nation," Henderson said. "Our fans came out and supported us in a big way this spring. We are going to do everything possible to give them another exciting, winning team to make it easy for them to continue coming out to the ballpark."

Henderson was named Southeastern Conference Coach of the Year after pacing the Wildcats to a record 45-win season in 2012, including the best finishes in the SEC and NCAA Tournaments in program history. UK finished third in the SEC regular season and set school records by leading the conference for eight of 10 weeks and winning seven of its conference weekend series.

The Wildcats ranked No. 1 for three weeks during the season and finished the campaign ranked for 13 consecutive weeks. Following the season, Kentucky had a school-record nine players selected in the 2012 MLB Draft, the second most in the nation and the most in the SEC, and the 2013 roster has sent an NCAA-leading eight players to the prestigious Cape Cod League.

Henderson has been at the core of the UK baseball surge onto the national scene since claiming the 2006 SEC Championship after a last-place finish in 2005. As the associate head coach, pitching coach and recruiting coordinator from 2004-08, Henderson guided the UK pitching staff to some of its best seasons in school annals and annually brought in highly ranked recruiting classes. After taking over as head coach in 2009, Henderson has totaled a 129-99 (.565) record, the second-best four-year coaching record in UK history.

"Gary Henderson is a good example of the type of coach we want to lead our athletics programs at Kentucky and he and his staff are very deserving of new contracts," Barnhart said. "He has helped build the program from the moment he arrived in Lexington and it was thrilling watching his team complete a historic campaign in 2012. We are convinced that the success our baseball program achieved last spring is just the beginning and it is an exciting time to be a UK baseball fan."

Henderson has consistently produced a bevy of talent in the UK program, highlighted by the record draft picks in 2012. Since Henderson arrived in Lexington, UK has had a total of 54 players drafted or sign a professional contract. In UK baseball history since the start of the draft in 1965, 153 players have been drafted or sign contracts, with 36 percent

of those players coming under the watch of Henderson. Since claiming the 2006 SEC Title, Henderson has had 51 players drafted or sign a contract, an average of 7.29 players per season. Before the 2006 season, UK averaged 2.17 players selected per MLB Draft.

In 2012, Henderson guided the Wildcats to its best campaign in the 107-year history of the program. UK set new school records in wins, strikeouts, innings pitched, saves, opponent batting average, games played, fielding percentage, winning streak and home wins. UK finished with the second-best team ERA in program history in 2012 and its 18 wins in league action marks the second-most in UK annals. With Henderson known for his disciplined approach to controlling the running game from the mound, UK allowed the fewest steals and picked off the most runners in the SEC.

Among the other statistical successes of 2012, include a 15-10 record vs. the top 25, and a school-record 10-4 record against top-10 foes. UK won a series against a No. 1 team (LSU) for the first time in UK history, posted a school-record 18-10 record in one or two-run games and finished the entire 2012 season with a No. 13 NCAA RPI according to WarrenNolan.com.

Latos named National League Pitcher of the Week

CINCINNATI - Cincinnati Reds starter Mat Latos has been named the National League Pitcher of the Week for the period ending July 1. The announcement was made earlier in the week on MLB Network. Latos was a perfect 2-0 in two complete games last week, leading the Majors with 18.0 innings pitched and ranking second in MLB and first in the National League with 20 strikeouts. The 24-year-old became the first Reds pitcher to re-

cord back-to-back complete games since 2006, when Aaron Harang notched victories on September 24th (at CHD) and September 29th (at PIT). Latos allowed just a single earned run in each of his starts, good for a 1.00 ERA (2 ER/18.0 IP) for the week, which reduced his season ERA from 5.20 (through June 18th) to 4.42. He earned his seventh victory (7-2) of the season on Sunday afternoon, two-hitting the N.L. West-leading Giants in his complete game, 2-1 win at AT&T Park. The

rightly fanned seven in his 9.0 innings of work and did not allow a walk en route to his second victory over San Francisco this season (also April 24th). Latos notched a career-high 13 strikeouts in his outing one week ago, June 25th, walking only two and scattering four hits in a 3-1 victory over Milwaukee at Great American Ball Park. He threw 80 of his 109 pitches for strikes, and during a span from the first through fifth innings, threw 26 consecutive strikes, marking the longest streak by a Reds hurler since re-

records have been kept, going back to 1988. The Broward (FL) Community College product also matched a career high with two hits. According to the Elias Sports Bureau, Latos only the third Reds pitcher since 1900 to collect at least two hits as a batter while recording 13-or-more strikeouts (Jim Maloney twice, 1963 vs. CHI and 1966 vs. NYM; and Ron Villone, 2000 vs. STL). This is Mat's first career weekly award.

Timeline of Andy Griffith's career

A star is born. Andy Griffith was born on June 1, 1926, although at times, because his family was so poor, he lived with relatives.

Boyhood home. In 1929 Griffith's father, Carl Lee Griffith, found steady work as a carpenter, allowing the family to purchase the East Haymore Street house that became his boyhood home. The house is now owned by a local hotel and available for overnight rentals.

Ready for the world. Griffith graduated from Mount Airy High School in 1944, then went on to the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. **First Professional Role.** In 1947 Griffith was cast in "The

Lost Colony" on Roanoke Island, a production celebrating its 75th anniversary in 2012. **A hit!** "What It Was, Was Football" is a comedic monologue by Griffith, released in 1953 by Colonial Records. It reached No. 9 on the single charts in 1954.

Prelude to stardom. "No Time for Sergeants" was a one-hour teleplay about a bumbling country boy trying to make it as a U.S. Marine broadcast in 1955. He later starred in a live version on Broadway, and again in a full-length movie by the same title. The movie served as the inspiration for an Andy Griffith Show spin-off, "Corner Pyle, U.S.M.C." It was while filming this movie that

Griffith first worked with Don Knotts.

Change of Pace. Griffith turned some heads with a 1957 dramatic role when he played the lead male role in the movie "A Face in the Crowd," starring opposite Patricia Neal. **Just before launch.** A year before "The Andy Griffith Show" debuted, he returned to his hometown in 1959, spending the day speaking to Mount Airy elementary, junior high, and senior high school students. He spoke from the stage of the Rockford Street School, where he starred in many Mount Airy operettas, and took time to chat with the students, sign autographs, and even be on the receiving end of

a kiss from high-schooler Betsey Smith McPhail.

Favorite. Griffith appeared in a 1960 episode of "Make Room for Daddy," starring Danny Thomas, in which Griffith played the role of a county sheriff and justice of the peace (as well as editor of the local paper).

Life changing production. Later in 1960 Griffith and producer Sheldon Leonard turned the "Daddy" appearance into a de facto pilot for "The Andy Griffith Show," in which Griffith plays the lead character of Sheriff Andy Taylor, who also serves the town of Mayberry as Justice of the Peace. Of course, the show made Griffith an international star

and helped push Don Knotts into stardom and launched the career of actor, writer and director Ron Howard.

Moving on. In 1968, after a wildly successful run, Griffith informed CBS he would be leaving "The Andy Griffith Show" to pursue film and other opportunities.

Health Issues. In 1983, Griffith was struck by Guillain-Barre syndrome, which left him with leg paralysis and resulted in long-term treatment and rehabilitation before he could resume his acting career.

Return to the small screen. In 1986, Griffith achieved a true rarity in television, creating a second, iconic character in his show "Matlock," which

ran until 1995.

Return to Mount Airy. In 2002, Griffith and his wife, Cindy, were on hand for the dedication of a portion of U.S. 52, renamed the Andy Griffith Parkway.

Encore. Griffith came back to Mount Airy in 2004 for the dedication of the Andy and Opie statue during the city's annual celebration of Mayberry Days that year.

Last call. Griffith returned to the big screen in 2009, starring in the romantic comedy "Play the Game."

Passing of an icon. July 3, 2012, Griffith died at his home in Manteo. He was buried near his home later that day.

Classic TV icon Andy Griffith dies

Mount Airy native Andy Griffith, who went from hometown boy to film and television star and, ultimately, international icon, died Tuesday morning at his beachfront home in Manteo and, according to a statement from the Dare County Sheriff's Office, has been "laid to rest" on Roanoke Island.

He was 86. Emergency medical services were called to his Highway 64 home in Roanoke Island shortly after 7 a.m., and Dare County Sheriff Doug Doughitie said Griffith died at that time in his home. A cause of death has not been released.

By 11:30 a.m., the sheriff's office said he had been "laid to rest" on Roanoke Island.

The star, who is identified with the iconic hometown sheriff Andy Taylor in the fictional town of Mayberry, had been in declining health for more than a decade. He suffered a heart attack in 2000. At that time Griffith underwent quadruple bypass surgery.

Intensely private, Griffith kept out of the public spotlight when not on the stage, film, or on television. He was born in Mount Airy in 1926, where he cultivated an interest in music, singing and acting.

In 1947, three years after graduating from Mount Airy High School, Griffith was cast in the still-running production of "The Lost Colony" on Roanoke Island. He held several roles in the production, until finally earning the role of Sir Walter Raleigh.

Later Griffith made his

name as a comedian, with such classic routines as "What It Was Was Football" and "Romeo and Juliet," and then moved into movies, where he was cast in what became a break-out role in the 1957 film "A Face in the Crowd."

Griffith made additional film and television appearances before reaching fame starring as Sheriff Andy Taylor on "The Andy Griffith Show" from 1960 to 1968, and later portrayed a shrewd Southern lawyer in "Matlock."

"The Andy Griffith Show"

is still one of the most popular syndicated shows, regularly showing on cable television and as local programming in markets throughout the South. "Matlock," too, makes regular appearances on cable television.

Mayberry, where Griffith spun hometown wisdom with a healthy dose of comedy as Sheriff Taylor, was said to be based largely on his memories of growing up in Mount Airy, where Mayberry fixtures such as the Snappy Lunch (still in business) and the Blue Bird Diner operated. He even hinted this was the case in a Mount Airy appearance in 2002.

"People started saying that Mayberry was based on Mount Airy," he said at the time. "It sure sounds like it, doesn't it?"

Tanya Jones, executive director of the Surry Arts Council, issued this statement following notification of Griffith's death: "We are brokenhearted," she said. "Andy Griffith means the world to the arts

everywhere - not just here in Mount Airy. His contribution to us, the Surry Arts Council, and the town of Mount Airy cannot be measured."

Jones said the Mount Airy community was "blessed to have known him."

"We will cherish his art, his music, his talent, and of course, our beloved "Andy Griffith Show."

"Our prayers and love go out to Cindi. We know that Andy is at peace and that is what is important right now," she said of Griffith's wife.

Griffith was awarded a Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2005 by President George Bush, for "demonstrating the finest qualities of our country and for a lifetime of memorable performances that have brought joy to millions of Americans of all ages."

He received a Grammy award in 1997 for Best Southern, Country or Bluegrass


