## Judge's office blames others for FEMA audit

After a Wednesday report about this year's Floyd County government audit, which uncovered several areas of concern within the county's handling of federally-funded disaster repair projects, officials in the judge-executive's office are saying they're not responsible.

A report by state Auditor Adam Edelen's office, released Tuesday, found the fiscal court had "failed to maintain supporting documentation for costs

incurred on 55 small projects and one large project had spent \$97,727 more on one project than was allotted by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, and had failed to keep its FEMA money separate from other county accounts.

As a result of the improperly maintained files related to the 2009 disaster, the auditor's report says that the total cost of all the projects — over \$1.1 million — has been questioned by FEMA, putting the county at risk of losing FEMA funding in

the event of future disasters.

"He tried to tell the magistrates and [road foreman Mikel Jarrell]," said Lois Marshall, wife of Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall and an administrative assistant in his office.

According to Lois Marshall, Jarrell and FEMA agent Katha Newsome are the overseers and persons responsible for the FEMA accounting.

"He (the judge-executive) does not follow up with these projects," said Marshall. "That is solely

the FEMA agents' responsibility."

When asked for clarification, Marshall said that the judge-executive does not "have to follow up with the projects by law."

Lois Marshall says that whenever her husband has inquired about the FEMA projects during meetings, District 2 Magistrate Hattie Owens and Jarrell "jump up and defend the projects." According to Marshall, Owens was the FEMA agent on the 2009 projects which were questioned in the audit.

When asked about the

more than \$1.1 million in questioned costs related to the 2009 disaster projects Marshall said, "When all of those projects are closed out, most of it will probably be accounted for," Marshall added that there were contractors working on those projects that the judge-executive didn't know about.

"People don't understand," said Marshall. "They just look at the top person and say the buck stops with him." Marshall says the county has had a history of outstanding FEMA projects, and that

when her husband took office in 2006, there were still open FEMA project disasters from 2002.

"We want the FEMA cleared up," said Marshall. "We want it over with, we want their standards met, and we want it behind us."

Judge-Executive Marshall did not return calls seeking comment before press time.

County Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall filed the following response to the questions

## City to rent bikes at park

PRESTONSBURG — The city is continuing its push to become more bicycle friendly this week, as plans got underway for bicycle rentals at Archer Park.

Richie Scholcraft, park director for the city of Prestonsburg, says the current plan is to offer bicycles for rent for \$2 an hour or \$10 a day. Scholcraft said riders would only be allowed to ride within the confines of Archer Park.

In order to rent one of the bicycles, riders will need to present a valid driver's license.

The bicycle rentals are part of recent grant funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission.

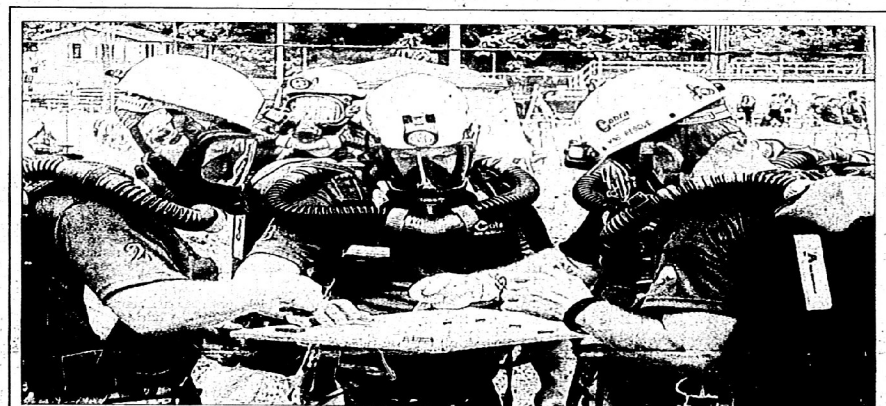
The project includes signage to go up around the city promoting the city as a "bike-friendly city" and renovations completing the Garfield Trail, allowing smoother riding for cyclists, as well as benches and picnic tables for cyclists and hikers.

According to Mike Vance, a dedication of the improved Garfield Trail is scheduled to take place on Friday, July 27.

The funding also provided for a city-staged bicycle safety class for kids age 9-12 at Archer Park. Maytown Center Director Dan Chauncy, who has been active in leading mountain biking excursions for area youth, was on hand to give a half-dozen kids lessons on riding safely. The kids also received free bicycle helmets as part of the demonstration.

Chauncy emphasized the importance of teaching children proper cycling by pointing out that 300,000 kids wind up in emergency rooms each year due to bike accidents.

Scholcraft says more bicycle safety classes will be held at the park in the near future.

## Mine rescue teams put skills to test

PIKEVILLE — Over 500 miners and several hundred others gathered this week at Bob Amos Park to take part in a training exercise they hope to never use in real life.

The gathering was for the fifth annual installment of the Mine Rescue Competition and Training competition, sponsored by Kentucky Employers' Mutual Insurance. During the event, mine rescue teams from across eight states took part in a competition to rescue miners from a simulated mine disaster.

The purpose of the event was twofold — to satisfy annual training requirements all mine rescue teams must meet and, more importantly, to give teams a chance to hone their skills, in the event they need to use them in an actual emergency.

"They're essentially training for situations they may have never faced before ..." said KEMI communication manager Ryan Worthen. "But if these guys come out here and prepare for these situations, they're less like to make a mistake and get injured in real life."

The event began Monday with a golf scramble, followed Tuesday by bench, first aid and pre-shift competitions. But it was clear that the main event was the mine rescue competition, which took place

Wednesday and Thursday.

Representatives of the federal Mine Safety and Health Administration and state Office of Mine Safety and Licensure served as judges. Freddie Lewis, executive director of OMSL, had nothing but praise for those taking part.

"The mine rescue team members are probably some of the most unselfish people in the United States," Lewis said. "These guys are ready to get up at 3 a.m. and leave their wives and children at home to go to a coal mine fire. And they might not know anyone in that mine, but they are willing and ready to sacrifice their lives, family and everything to rescue a fellow coal miner."

## Family seeks coverage of autism treatment

PIKEVILLE — A McDowell family is taking on the state's largest health insurance provider in federal court, alleging the insurer is failing to provide coverage for approved and necessary autism treatment.

Mitchell and Debbie Crum are suing Anthem Health Plans of Kentucky, saying the insurer has denied to pay for their child's treatment at the Highlands Center for Autism.

According to the Crums' complaint, applied behavior analysis is "the most common and recognized method of treating autism," citing as evidence ABA's acceptance by Medicaid, the Office of Personnel Management and Kentucky Law. ABA is also the method used by Highlands to treat its patients. However, the Crums say Anthem has denied coverage, saying ABA is "being educational in nature, not medically necessary."

The Crums contend ABA is medically necessary, and cite state law that defines ABA as "habilitative or rehabilitative care."

The Crums also note that Anthem's health plans renewed after January 2011 expressly cover ABA as a treatment for autism, but say Anthem has continued to refuse coverage of the treatment, telling them "the therapy is educational in nature" and the services are not provided by licensed providers.

The Crums are also seeking to have their complaint certified as a class-action lawsuit, which would bring others who have similarly been denied coverage into the lawsuit with them.

The Crums' attorney, Robert R. Sparks, of the Covington firm Parry, Deering, Futscher & Sparks, said Thursday he has no way of knowing how large the resulting class of plaintiffs would ultimately be, but he says there are many cases dealing with failure to pay for ABA care of autism patients, and Anthem is not the only insurer denying claims.

"There are a lot of cases against a lot of insurers," Sparks said. "It seems to go through a progression of denials."

The suit, filed this week, is expected to take "years instead of months" to litigate, Sparks said.

U.S. District Judge Karen K. Caswell has been assigned to preside over the case.

Anthem has not yet filed a response to the Crums' complaint.

## Drug offenses lead county crime statistics

Drug and narcotic offenses continue to headline the court system in Floyd County, according to the Kentucky State Police 2011 crime statistics which were released Thursday.

"Crime affects the lives of all Kentuckians," Gov. Steve Beshear said in a

statement attached to the report. "This 2011 crime in Kentucky report presents a statewide overview of serious crimes that have occurred within our commonwealth."

According to the statistics, 337 drug/narcotic offenses were reported in Floyd County in 2011, while only 169 were cleared. The largest number

of offenses reported in the county were handled by Kentucky State Police, with 148. Prestonsburg City Police had 95 reports of drug offenses.

According to the statistics, Floyd County also had the following numbers of reported crimes: Arson 3, Assault 249, Bribery 4, Burglary 180, Counterfeiting 28, Destruction of

property 78, embezzlement 0, extortion 0, fraud offenses 31, gambling 0, homicide 5, kidnapping 5, larceny/theft offenses 233, motor vehicle theft 47, pornography 10, prostitution 0, robbery 26, sex offenses forcible 22, sex offenses non-forcible 2, stolen property 26, weapons laws violations 12.

With 417 reported of

fenses, Floyd County ranks among the highest in the state for acts of driving under the influence.

The statistics note that there are also currently 95 registered sex offenders living in Floyd County.

A crime is committed in Floyd County every six hours and 6 minutes, according to the KSP statistics.

That is here today to participate, judge, and support our great mine rescue teams in this state.

However, hanging like a cloud over the event was a noticeable absence. Due to the loss of around 1,000 coal mining jobs in recent weeks, several teams were not there to compete because their members no longer had jobs. "It's very sad to see this, because we lost nine teams that were scheduled to com-

pete, but due to layoffs are no longer together," Lewis said. In all, 46 teams from Kentucky, West Virginia, Virginia, Tennessee, Indiana, Illinois, Pennsylvania and Alabama took part in the competition, down from the 55 that had previously been scheduled. But there was also posi-

tive news out of the event — the financial impact the competition had on the local economy. Because many of the 500 miners and others travelled great distances to get to the event, many had to stay in local hotels and left their money behind by purchasing food, gas and entertainment in the region. "Every hotel from here to Prestonsburg is booked solid for several days," Worthen said. "Restaurants have a one- or two-hour wait. Gas stations are extremely busy."

## Our View Under control, or let heads roll

The release of the county's audit this week painted a disturbing picture of the handling of federally-funded disaster repair projects.

The audit detailed in great length a host of problems, from missing and incomplete records to overspending on projects. Most troubling was the discovery that the Federal Emergency Management Agency is now questioning the county's spending and record-keeping practices in regard to those projects, putting Floyd County at risk of being denied funding for future disasters.

This is simply unacceptable. Given its current fiscal troubles, Floyd County would have to pass up the stand the financial toll of the inevitable next flood with FEMA assistance, much less without it.

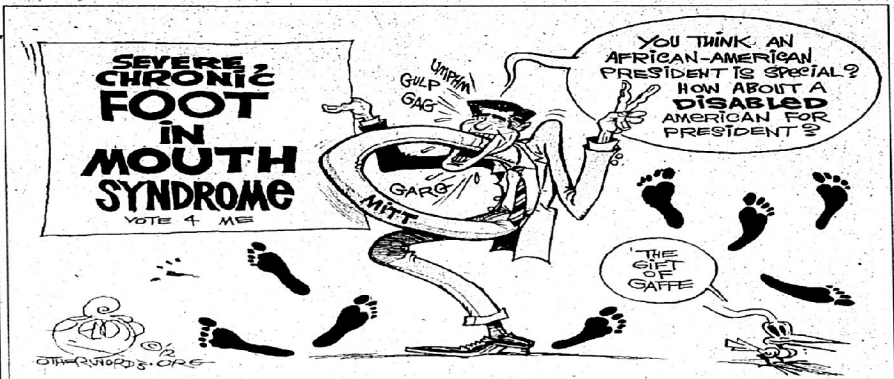
Taking a deeper look into the cause of the problems detailed in the audit, it appears many departments of county government are operating as their own little fiefdoms, free of any control or oversight.

We urge County Judge-Executive R.D. "Doc" Marshall to take county government firmly in hand. He was elected to lead the county because the county wanted him to lead. He, alone, has the executive power needed to get county finances under control, and the county can ill afford for him to abdicate that responsibility. He, alone, has the political capital that comes from being elected by the entire county, and he needs to expend some of that capital to force those under him to choose between doing things the right way or hitting the highway.

Marshall is, by all accounts, a nice guy, both personally and professionally. However, it is becoming apparent that he is going to have to display something of a mean streak, in order to bring county government in line.

We make this statement not to throw our lot in with Marshall in the unending saga of squabbles on the fiscal court, nor to point the finger at him, but rather because it is simply what *must* be done, for the sake of all Floyd Countians. Losing future FEMA funding would be a disaster unto itself.

## Beyond the Beltway Pennsylvania's high-profile pedophile scandals

In one of those strange coincidences that make life read like a cheap novel, Jerry Sandusky and Monsignor William Lynn were convicted at almost the same moment by two Pennsylvania juries of charges growing out of sex scandals involving the molestation of underage youngsters.

Not that the two cases are mirror images of each other. Sandusky is a former football coach at Penn State University. Lynn is a former aide to the late Cardinal Anthony Bevilacqua and was secretary of the clergy in the Archdiocese of Philadelphia.

Sandusky was found guilty of molesting young boys dozens of times over the past 20 years. Lynn was found guilty of covering up sexual abuses committed by priests under his supervision.

Sandusky in all likelihood will spend the rest of his life in prison. Lynn faces a sentence of three and a half to seven years.

But these cases are parallel examples of two grand, exalted institutions fleeing their moral responsibilities in hopes of avoiding an embarrassing scandal. As the institutions covered up the sex abuses in their ranks, the lives of dozens of young innocents were sacrificed with hardly a thought.

What is it about the sexual molestation of children that institutions like the Catholic Church and Penn State don't understand? I'll lay it out for them:

It is not acceptable to allow adults to sexually molest children. If you find out it's going on, you stop it.

There. Does that sound controversial to you? Complex?

I suppose by now we should have become accustomed to the Catholic hierarchy's hypocrisy, but enabling pedophile priests to prey on helpless children — while cracking down on nuns who err on the side of compassion for the poor — is beyond contempt.

I applaud the conviction of Msgr. Lynn. It's a long overdue sign that the Church's habit of protecting pedophiles is as bankrupt legally as it is morally.

The Penn State case is still hard to digest, because of where it happened and whom it involved.

For decades Penn State football coach Joe Paterno was a virtual icon of probity in his profession. In a business whose moral climate can sometimes resemble a sewer he did things the right way. He didn't cheat, he held his players to a high standard of behavior, and he saw to it that they went to class and graduated. He accepted a pay lower than the market would have granted him and donated considerable sums of money to the school's library system, all the while becoming the winningest college coach in the sport's history.

All of this earned him a godlike status in the eyes of his fans and the media. They named their babies after him. "Joe Pa" became an indestructible symbol of integrity.

But when a young assistant came to

him and said that he'd seen Sandusky, Paterno's former right-hand man, having sexual intercourse with a boy in the school's shower room, Joe reacted with none of the shock and anger you might expect of a moral paragon. Instead, he merely passed the information on to higher authorities, showing no sense of urgency.

Those authorities — a vice-president and the athletic director — didn't take action on the report. Sandusky continued to use the university's facilities to entrap vulnerable youngsters and sexually abuse them, apparently without a word of protest from Paterno or anyone else.

Eventually the scandal became public. Paterno and the university's president lost their jobs and two of their colleagues were indicted. In a final grim footnote, Paterno died of cancer a short time later.

But by that time he was a ruined man, his lifetime of achievement rendered hollow.

I've never thought that molestation was the chief issue in either the Penn State or Catholic cases. Rather it was that these two august institutions covered up the scandal, in the church's case even transferring predatory priests, enabling them to continue to practice their pedophilia in a new venue.

Tell me again: What exactly were they protecting? The reputations of their institutions?

What reputations?

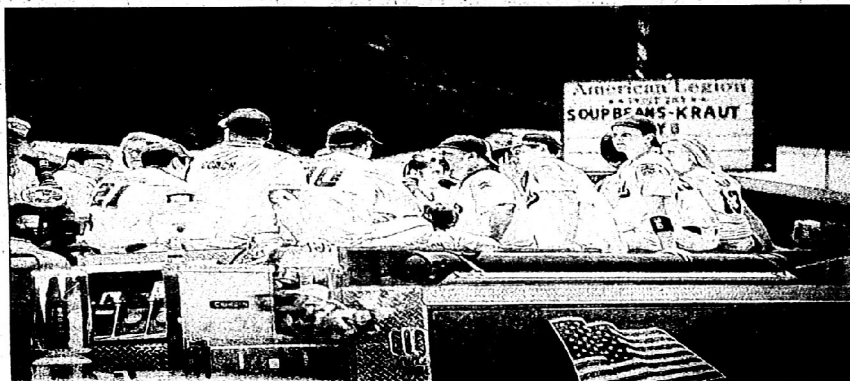

# McIntosh named to Lou Groza Award Watch List

**LEXINGTON** — University of Kentucky senior placekicker Craig McIntosh, who has made nearly 80 percent of his field goals the past two years, has been named to the Lou Groza Award Watch List, which annually honors the nation's best placekicker.

The Palm Beach County (Fla.) Sports Commission announced Wednesday.

McIntosh has been a two-year starter and consistent performer at placekicker. A hometown product of Lexington, he has a career-long field goal of 50 yards, while his best career game came last season against Mississippi State when he made three field goals. McIntosh owns the second and third-longest consec-

utive field-goal streaks in school history with eight and seven, respectively. Last year, McIntosh led the team in scoring with 56 points, making 12-of-14 field goals and 21-of-22 extra points.

In 2010, McIntosh finished second on the team in scoring with 67 points, making 11-of-15 field goals and 34-of-35 extra points. During the year, McIntosh hit two career-long 50-yard field goals while also taking over kickoff duties late in the season.

Kickers on the Lou Groza Award Watch List were chosen based on statistics from the 2011 season and 2012 expectations. Ten conferences are represented among the 30 kickers, led by seven from the Big Ten. The SEC follows with six, along with

four each from the ACC and the Pac-12. The Big 12, Conference USA and Sun Belt each placed two representatives, while the Big East, MAC and Mountain West each had a kicker recognized. While the watch list highlights 30 of the best returning kickers in the country, the Groza Committee will be watching all FBS kickers during the season, and releasing a weekly "Stars of the Week" feature on [www.lougrozaward.com](http://www.lougrozaward.com).

Accomplishments are tabulated throughout the season. The winner will be announced on Thursday, Dec. 6 during the Home Depot ESPNU College Football Award

Show, broadcast live from Orlando, Fla. The 1st Annual Lou Groza Collegiate Place-Kicker Award, presented by the Orange Bowl Committee, recognizes the three finalists during an early week celebration in Palm Beach County, culminating with a gala awards banquet on Dec. 4, prior to joining ESPN in Orlando.

The Award is named for National Football League Hall of Fame kicker Lou "The Toe" Groza, who played 21 seasons with the Cleveland Browns. Groza won four NFL championships with Cleveland and was named NFL Player of the

Year in 1954. Although an All-Pro offensive lineman as well, Groza ushered

in the notion that there should be a place on an NFL roster for a kicker.

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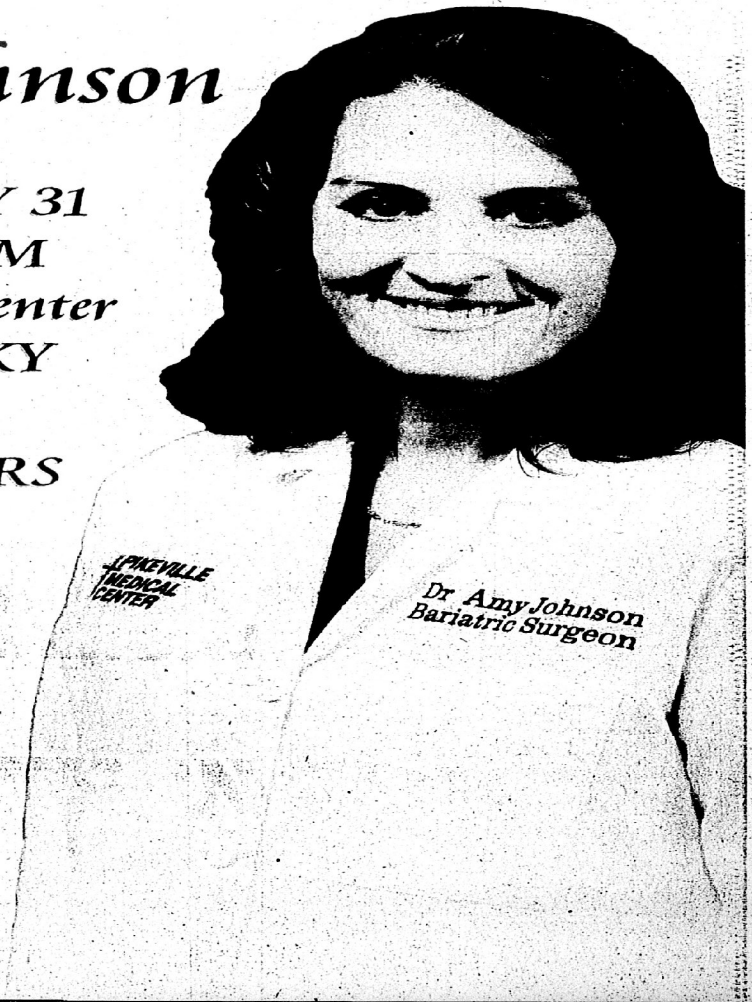
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
