## Deadline draws near for Questcare

PRESTONSBURG — An embattled Eastern Kentucky ambulance company may be facing suspension as the time limit to meet state requirements nears.

Officials with the Kentucky Board of Emergency Medical Services (KBEMS) say that a three-member panel was convened July 5 to hear the case of Questcare Ambulance Services and make recommendations after several viola-

tions were found, including a lack of air conditioning in more than a dozen of its ambulances.

On Thursday, Kristi Middleton, public information officer, said Questcare had until August 2 to make the recommended changes.

"They have to demonstrate that their service meets all the requirements by August 2," Middleton said.

According to Middleton, all but six of the 21 ambulances listed on Questcare's license have been, and re-

main, parked due to maintenance issues.

Middleton could not confirm reports that an inspection of Questcare's entire fleet would be conducted next week. Officials with Questcare declined to comment for this story.

KBEMS officials say a preliminary hearing was held in early June after several complaints were made about the company's ambulances.

Questcare serves Floyd, Pike and Johnson counties.

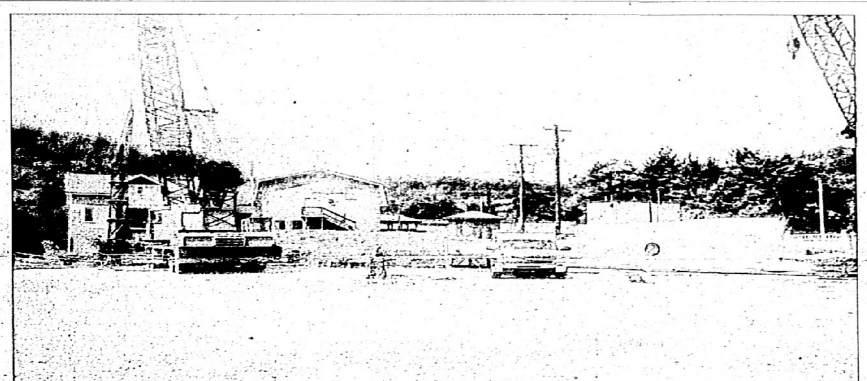

## City's sewer project nears completion

PRESTONSBURG — A project to help update and improve Prestonsburg's city sewer and storm drainage is nearing completion, as the city utilities work to complete a new and improved lift station.

Currently crews are working on the lift station and the upgrades at the treatment plant which will complete the project that began several years ago. "This will be the final piece of the project," said Prestonsburg Utilities information officer David Ellis.

According to Ellis, the project brought about by a mandate from the state which called for the separa-

tion of sewer and storm lines. "We have been under a consent agreement with the state," said Ellis. "Once we complete this final part, it will release us from that agreement."

The new lift station currently going in across from Giovanni's on North Lake Drive will handle most of the city's sanitary sewer flow from the north and west. According to Ellis, the new sanitary sewer pump station replaces one that was put in place in 1963.

Prestonsburg Utilities has already completed projects to separate the sewer from the storm drain lines, which has helped the city with back water during heavy rains, and foul odors from stagnant sewer lines.

"There is no odor in town, anymore," says Ellis. "What odor there is comes from the plant."

Ellis says he believes once they complete the pump station in the next few months, Prestonsburg will be one of the first cities in the state to be compliant with the new mandate.

The Prestonsburg sewer project dates back more than five years when the city government became inundated with complaints about sewer smells wafting up through the storm drains. Construction on the project began in earnest in 2008 when the city began tearing up streets to replace the old sewer lines and disconnect them from the storm drains.

## State exploring safety options for U.S. 23

**WATERGAP** — The state Department of Highways is continuing to look for ways to improve a stretch of U.S. 23 that has been plagued by motor vehicle crashes.

Sam Hale, branch manager for planning at Highway District 12, in Pikeville, said Thursday that the state is still in the "preliminary stages" of looking for ways to improve safety along the highway, between Town Branch Road and Route 80. At the current time, everything is still on the table.

"We don't even know all the options, yet," Hale said.

Some of the options could include constructing a frontage road, erecting a barrier wall or installing a traffic light at the Town Branch intersection. The department is looking to hire a consultant next month to help identify what options are possible in the area.

Hale said speeding, congestion and poor access are mostly to blame for accidents along the stretch of road.

But while no options have yet been ruled out, District 12 information officer Sara George said some options are more likely than others.

George said a stoplight at Town Branch would likely not

have much impact, because the state's studies have shown that the crashes are occurring at all points along the highway, not just at Town Branch. Similarly, she said a barrier wall would probably not address the issue because every accident in the area has involved traffic in the northbound lanes, adjacent to where vehicles are entering and exiting the road.

Hale said the state would use the consultant to identify what options would address the problem and that the public would be kept in the loop. He said there would be public hearings about the project before the state begins moving forward.

"We'll definitely have public involvement," Hale said. Currently, the project is still in the design phase, and then there will be a need for the state to obtain rights-of-way and relocate utilities. In recent days, utility workers have been in the area to identify where their lines are. "I don't think you're looking at construction until at least 2015," Hale said.

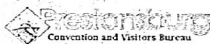
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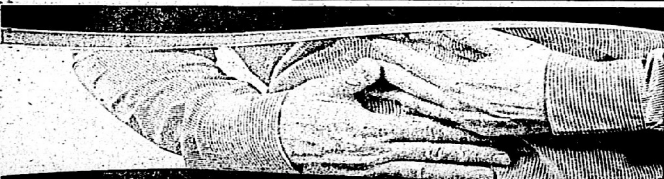


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# Emmy nominations puts Appalachia in spotlight again

A recent dramatic miniseries related to the bloodiest feud in Eastern Kentucky history earned more honors this week as the "Hatfields & McCoy's" was nominated for a primetime Emmy Award.

The miniseries, which aired on the History channel told the story of the feud between William "Devil Anse" Hatfield and Randall McCoy, a feud which would leave in its wake a string of bloody murders in both men's families.

The series was nominated for best television miniseries or movie along with

"American Horror Story," "Game Change," "Hemingway & Gellhorn," "Luther," and "Sherlock: A Scandal in Belgravia." The nominees were announced Thursday in Los Angeles by the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences.

The Hatfields and McCoy's miniseries has generated an increase in tourism to the region from people interested to learn more about the feud. While the setting for the series was rural eastern Kentucky and West Virginia, the miniseries was actually shot in Transylvania, Romania.

The series did feature some homegrown talent in the form of Robert Boyd

Holbrook, of Prestonsburg, who is an American fashion model, actor, and artist. Holbrook played the role of William "Cap" Hatfield.

In 1979, descendants of the Hatfields and McCoy's came together for a taping of the popular TV game show Family Feud, which is believed to have been inspired by the original feud.

In 2000, the families united for a joint family reunion that brought together 5,000 people.

The 64th annual Primetime Emmy Awards will air live on ABC Sept. 23 at the Nokia Theatre in Los Angeles. The show will be hosted by Jimmy Kimmel.

# UMWA: black lung ban 'potential death sentence for thousands'

WASHINGTON, D.C. — The head of the United Mine Workers says a plan by House Republicans to strip funding from the Mine Safety and Health Administration's plans to tighten regulations on coal dust will result in thousands of deaths.

MSHA has been in the process of implementing new rules which would ultimately cut in half the allowable level of coal dust in mines. The proposal, published in October but not yet in effect, would be rendered toothless, after Republicans inserted language into the Department of Labor's budget, prohibiting MSHA using federal funds "to continue the development of or to promulgate, administer, enforce, or otherwise implement" the rule.

UMWA President Cecil Roberts said the ban, which arose during the House Appropriations Committee's consideration of the Labor budget, will place more miners at risk for contracting black lung.

"The language proposed by Republicans in the U.S. House of Representatives that will eliminate funding for future efforts to reduce miners' exposure to coal dust, including the development of critical new technology that will provide real-time monitoring of dust exposure, amounts to nothing more than a potential death sentence for thousands of American miners," Roberts said.

Pointing at recent reports that black lung is on the rise, striking younger workers with more severe

cases, Roberts said the decision to cut funding from regulatory efforts is puzzling.

"It's difficult to understand the motivation behind this effort," Roberts said. "Recent studies by the federal government under Democratic and Republican administrations have clearly demonstrated that black lung is on the rise, which can only happen when there is too much respirable coal dust in mine atmospheres. We know that the only way to end this disease is to reduce miners' exposure to that dust."

Beyond being a health issue, Roberts said coal dust is also a safety issue. "I would also point out that respirable coal dust is also highly explosive," Roberts said. "Indeed, allowing this dust to build up is exactly one of the causes of the massive explosion at the Upper Big Branch mine."

But Rep. Hal Rogers, who chairs the Appropriations Committee, told the media this week that Republicans are trying to remove obstacles that have crippled the coal industry.

"This legislation re-

flects our strong commitment to reduce over-regulation and unnecessary, ineffective spending that feeds the nation's deficits and hampers economic growth," Rogers said. "A careful look was given to all programs and agencies in the bill, with the budget knife aimed at excess spending and underperforming programs, but also with the goal of making wise investments in programs that help the American people the most."

## Our View Black lung cuts callous and cruel

Last week, we learned that cases of black lung are on the rise, which came as a surprise to many, who thought the disease would one day fade into history, a relic of a bygone era.

Instead, changes in coal mining have resulted in miners working longer hours and employing methods that produce more dust. Now, doctors are seeing miners contract more severe cases of the disease earlier.

And that news makes it all the more outrageous that Republicans on the House Appropriations Committee, led by none other than Fifth District Rep. Hal Rogers, would choose to make a stand against a proposed regulation that would decrease the amount of dust to which miners are exposed.

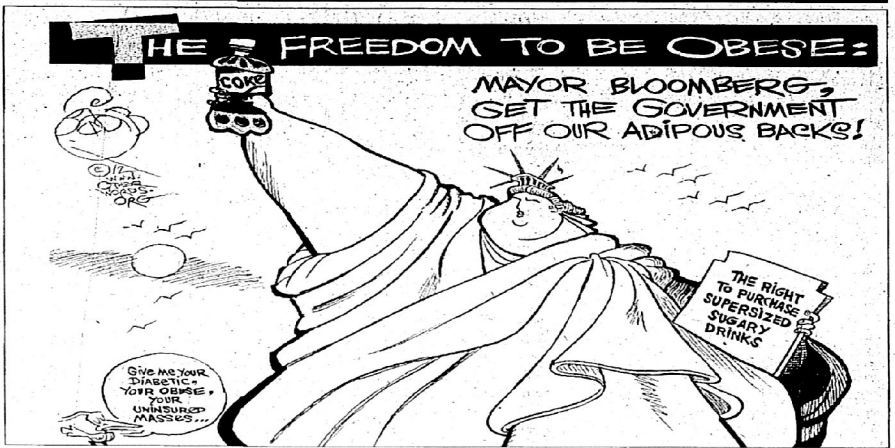
The committee this week inserted language in the Department of Labor's budget, forbidding the Mine Safety and Health Administration from using any federal funding to implement a new rule that would phase in lower limits to eventually cut the amount of dust to which miners are exposed in half. Rogers said the move was borne out of a "strong commitment to reduce over-regulation and unnecessary, ineffective spending."

The United Mine Workers of America had a different take, calling the move "a potential death sentence for thousands of American miners."

In this instance, we have to agree more with the UMWA. It is no surprise that Republicans would want to deregulate and cut spending, since that has been the cornerstone of their political philosophy for the past three decades. But gutting MSHA's ability to further reduce coal dust at a time when black lung is making a resurgence seem particularly callous and cruel.

There are times when reality should trump ideology, and for Republicans, this is one of those times. What sense does it make to "protect" an industry from government intrusion, if the end result jeopardizes the health of those who work in it?

## The war on soda pop

New York City, ever the leader in healthy living, is about to ban the sale of super-sized sodas and other sweetened drinks by its restaurants, movie theaters, and street carts.

As part of a continuing campaign against obesity, it's going to prohibit beverage containers bigger than 16 ounces. "Obesity is a nationwide problem, and all over the United States, public officials are wringing their hands saying, 'Oh, this is terrible,'" said Mayor Mike Bloomberg. "New York City is not about wringing your hands; it's about doing something."

Good luck with that, Mayor. On the one hand, the ban seems a little like passing a law against shoving beans up your nose. I mean, really. Do we have to make stupid actions illegal before people stop doing them?

Apparently so. Recent studies have found that as many as two-thirds of New Yorkers are overweight, with a third of them classified as obese. (And the numbers for the rest of the country are no better.) Part of the reason is that people are encouraged to buy heavily sweetened soda in containers the size of fire buckets.

Under the new law, if someone wants to wash down his or her double cheeseburger with 32 ounces of Pepsi or Coke's finest, they'll have to buy two 16-ounce

servings.

And if that doesn't sound like a big deal, it's because it isn't. But it will make people — and especially kids — think twice before doing something really dumb. After that, they're on their own.

On the other hand, as much as I hate to admit it, there's something almost un-American about forcing people to do the right thing. We're famous for embracing the freedom to do the wrong thing, as often as we please.

Conservatives are particularly vociferous about this. The ban on super-sized sweet beverages is another example of the "nanny state," they say, the government thinking that it knows best.

As one college student, with the clarity of mind typical of college students, told The New York Times in response to the proposed ban: "If people want to drink 24 ounces, it's their decision."

What's next, conservatives ask? Loud-speakers mounted in public parks so that the government can lead mass exercise drills? That's North Korea, not us.

On the third hand, how is forcing people to do the right thing un-American? We do that all of the time. We pass laws to make people wear seat belts and motorcycle helmets and strap small children into car seats. We prohibit them from buying drugs we think are harmful to them, we limit their freedom to smoke

in public and private spaces. We've even made suicide illegal in most places (although that seems to me a classic case of locking the barn door after the horse is way gone).

On the fourth hand, the problem with granting people the freedom to act in self-destructive ways is that the damage they do isn't just to themselves. The societal costs of obesity, for example, are enormous in terms of health care costs, insurance premiums, and lost productivity.

On the fifth hand, how much choice do we really have anyway? The advertising industry has become so adept at invading our minds and manipulating them to its ends that the concept of "free choice" has become a mockery.

From the time they are tykes, children are bombarded with messages that sweet is not merely good but the only good. Frosted cereal, syrupy drinks, and candy treats make up a good share of the foodstuffs advertised on kiddie shows. By the time most kids get through kindergarten, they are brainwashed.

New York is simply trying to give those brains a light rinse.

After all, who would really choose to be obese?

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



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# BSCTC plants community garden

A new project has taken root at Big Sandy Community and Technical College - a community garden.

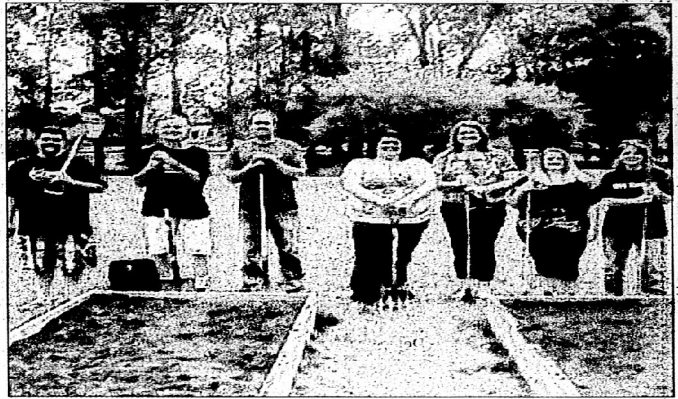
If you have driven by the BSCTC lately you may have seen a new addition - a new garden which has five 20-foot raised beds tended by several different groups. A team of college staff and students, some community members and the M&O staff of BSCTC built the raised beds in April. The college team is raising sweet potatoes in one and white half-runner beans in another. Prof. Thomas Vierheller is using the third bed for his fall botany class.

A fourth bed of bush cucumbers was planted by Kristi Kendall of KFTC and Allison Williams and a volunteer group from The Auxier Center of Hand in Hand Ministries. The fifth bed of peppers and zucchini is tended by the Community United Methodist Community Gardeners, Sherry Shepherd, Debbie Reid, Cheryl Sexton and Bonnie Hale and is a "community" effort.

Cheryl grew the pepper plants from seed. Sherry and Bonnie prepared the soil, planted the peppers and zucchini seeds and mulched around the plants to conserve moisture. Sherry devised a water system using lightweight cart with 5 gallon jugs of water. Debbie joined the effort to help keep the plants watered during the "heat wave". The women joined the project to grow fresh produce to donate to God's Food Pantry.

## P'burg picked to win Class 2A, District 8

**PRESTONSBURG** - The Cats' Praise 2012 Kentucky Football Yearbook has tabbed Prestonsburg as the favorite in Class 2A, District 8. The Blackcats are picked to finish ahead of defending champion Leslie County, Betsy Layne and Shelby Valley in the very competitive four-team district. The preseason football publication hit newsstands earlier in the week.

Prestonsburg, under the direction of veteran head coach John DeRossett, the winningest coach in the tradition-rich high school gridiron program's history, started preseason practice last week. The Blackcats were competing in

passing games on Wednesday evening at the newly-turfed Josh Francis Field.

Prestonsburg (5-0) faced adversity throughout the 2011 campaign. The Blackcats finished one game below .500 in 2011 after falling in four of their last five outings. Injuries wound up plaguing Prestonsburg last season. A healthy cast is expected to allow the Blackcats to regain the district's top spot.

After capturing the district title, Leslie County concluded the season 9-3. Betsy Layne compiled a 7-4 overall record. The fourth team in the district, Shelby Valley, finished 5-6. Graduation didn't spare the Blackcats. Prestonsburg lost quarterback Adam Crisp (2,332 yards, 26 TDs), longtime offensive leader Joseph Ja-

merson and leading rusher Kain Collins (555 yards) to graduation. The Blackcats return second-leading rusher Bryson Williams (447 yards), a senior who led the team in receiving with 795 yards.

Sophomore Jarred Jarrell (551 yards receiving) and junior Grant Anderson also return for the Prestonsburg offense. Jarrell is a leading candidate to take over at quarterback for the Blackcats.

Senior tight end/linebacker Adam Griffith is another key player back for the Prestonsburg football team.

Up front, senior Kinsey VanDine (6-3, 290) is back to anchor both sides of the Prestonsburg line.

### Adkins declines offer to coach Paintsville

**CAMPBELLSVILLE** - A legendary player for Paintsville High School won't be returning to coach the Tigers. Keith Adkins, a fixture in Paintsville High School's athletics history, has turned down an offer to coach his alma mater and will remain as head coach of the Campbellsville University men's basketball team, CU Athletics Director Rusty Hollingsworth announced Wednesday morning.

With the decision, Campbellsville University also retains Adkins' wife, Vanessa, who is a three-time Mid-South Conference Chessleading Coach of the Year, whom he has led CU to four MSC titles in six years.

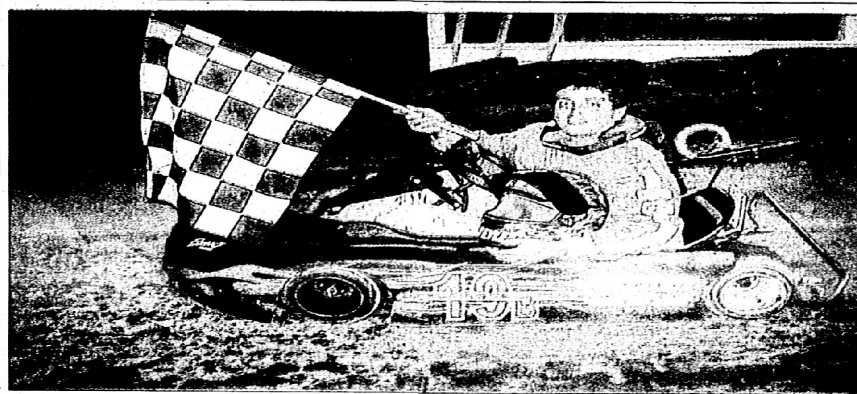
"I am pleased to announce that Keith and Vanessa have decided to stay in Campbellsville and continue to build on the success of their respective programs. I know this was a very tough and emotional decision for them and their family. They love Campbellsville University, but the chance to return home and coach at Keith's alma mater was very enticing to them," Hollingsworth said. "Campbellsville University won big today by keeping these two!"

Adkins is considered one of the Top 5 boys' basketball players to ever wear a Paintsville Tiger uniform. A three-sport star (basketball, baseball, golf) for the Tigers in the mid-to-late 1980s, he was named the Kentucky Male Athlete of the Year in 1988.

"I'd like to thank Paintsville High School and superintendent Coy Samons for extending me an opportunity to be their boys' basketball coach. It was a humbling offer, and one that was definitely attractive, mostly because it was home for me. It's where I played where my father coached for 35 years and to be perfectly honest, it was intriguing to say the least," Adkins said. "I don't think at this point in my career, I would or would have considered any high school position other than Paintsville High School ... It being a special place to me is the only reason it earned consideration."

From 1985 to 1988, Adkins helped lead Paintsville to three state tournament appearances, including a Final Four in his junior season in 1987. During the 1987-88 season, the 3-point line was implemented in basketball and Adkins took advantage of it, draining 48 percent of his 258 shots beyond the arc. He led the state in scoring with an average of

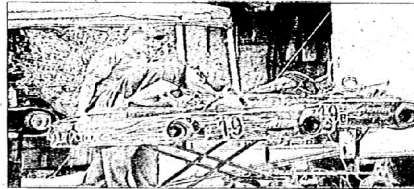

# Penalty for illegal uniform rules changes

INDIANAPOLIS — New requirements for passing the baton in the exchange zone, and the penalty for wearing an illegal uniform, highlight changes in high school track and field rules for next season. The National Federation of State High School Associations (NFHS) Track and Field Rules Committee approved 16 rules changes at its June 6-8 meeting in Indianapolis. All rules changes were subsequently approved by the NFHS Board of Directors. Rule 5-10-7 will now state

that the baton shall be handed from the incoming runner to the outgoing runner within the exchange zone. In addition, a new note will state that "the incoming and outgoing runners shall not simultaneously touch the baton outside of the 20-meter exchange zone." "This change will provide consistency in enforcement and will minimize a judgment call," said Becky Oakes, NFHS director of sports and staff liaison to the Track and Field Rules Committee. "The new language fits the current technique of exchange meth-

od in high school track." Beginning next season, a competitor wearing an illegal uniform will first be issued a warning and will be required to make the uniform legal prior to further competition. A subsequent violation during the competition would result in disqualification from the event. Previously, the competitor was automatically disqualified for an illegal uniform. "This adjustment of the penalty for an illegal uniform is more appropriate for the severity of the actual violation," Oakes said. "The rule has been loosely enforced during the regular season and more strictly enforced at state tournament time. The responsibility remains with the coach to have his or her athletes in legal uniforms for competition." Among the changes in rules for field events, the most significant perhaps is a revision in the pole vault. The standards or uprights shall be set

to position the crossbar from 18 inches beyond the vertical plane of the top of the stop-board, instead of the previous distance of 15.5 inches. The maximum distance remains 31.5 inches. "This change will help vaulters land more in the center of the pad, providing a better range of placement of the standards and positioning the crossbar for risk minimization," Oakes said. Two additional changes approved by the rules committee focus on reducing the risk of injury. Rules 3-19-2 and 6-2-16 will be revised to state that only legal implements used in throwing events will be allowed in warm-ups. Also, a new article in Rule 5-1 will recommend, when feasible, an obstacle-free zone on the inside and outside of the track at least 1 meter in width. Five other changes in throwing events were approved by the committee: Rule 6-2-2 requires the

three preliminary trials to be taken in fights of no less than five in the order in which the competitors are listed for competition. In Rule 6-2-3, with no action from the games committee, one more competitor than places scored will advance to the finals. In Rule 6-4-2, a range of 1/4 inch will be allowed in the rim thickness of the discus (.472 inches to .512 inches). In Rule 6-5-9, it is a foul if the competitor uses the "cartwheel" technique in the sifft put. In Rule 6-6-9, if the javelin breaks during the throw or in the air, it shall not count as a trial provided the throw is in accordance with the rules. A replacement throw shall be awarded. Among the most significant changes in Rule 7 (Jumping events), the committee approved the following revision to Rule 7-4-6 in the high jump: "In addition to the commonly

used four-sided flat crossbar ends, the use of a crossbar fitted with alternative ends (semicircular) is permitted." In addition, the rules committee added time limits for consecutive attempts in field events which had not been addressed previously. A complete listing of all rules changes approved by the committee is available on the NFHS Web site at [www.nfhs.org](http://www.nfhs.org). Click on "Athletics & Fine Arts Activities" on the home page, and select "Track and Field." Outdoor track and field is the second-most popular sport for boys, with 579,302 participants, and most popular sport for girls, with 475,263 participants, at the high school level, according to the 2011-12 NFHS Athletics Participation Survey. The sport ranks second in school sponsorship with 15,954 schools sponsoring the sport for boys and 16,030 sponsoring the sport for girls.

32 points per game, and set school records for most points in a game (53) and in a half (30) against Pikeville High. Following the season, he was named a First Team All-State selection and was a member of the Kentucky All-Star Team. His father, the late Charlie Adkins, was a legendary baseball coach at Paintsville, winning 805 games in 33 seasons as head coach before his retirement in 2005. The elder Adkins led the Paintsville baseball program to the state championship game in 1989 before winning it all in 1990. The Paintsville baseball field is named in his honor. He passed away from cancer in 2010. "Losing Dad two years

ago was difficult. I know he poured his heart and soul into Paintsville High School for 35 years, and it was humbling to even be offered an opportunity to coach at the same place he was so excellent as a coach," Adkins said. "After the past two years, it really hits home how important family is, and the opportunity to have a chance to spend more time with them would have been nice." The opportunity to move, and ultimate decision to stay, weighed heavily on family, Adkins said. It would have placed Adkins in the same community with his entire family and within an hour of Vanessa's family in Greenup County - creating opportunities for their four children to spend more time with their grandparents. "This has been one of the most exhausting decisions that Vanessa and I have ever

had to make together ... But ironically, it's one of the easiest decisions I've ever had to make. After a long discussion with Rusty Hollingsworth, a long conversation with Dr. (Michael V.) Carter and a lot of long conversations with people from here, it was easy to see where we needed to be as a family," Adkins said. "Paintsville will always be my hometown and where I'm from, but the bottom line is Campbellsville is the only home that we as a family have ever known. It was an easy decision to make staying here and continuing what we started." "I want to thank Rusty and Dr. Carter for making Vanessa and I feel wanted and needed, and I want to thank them for the roles that they play in my entire family's lives. This is a special place. I've been here for 15 years, and right now,

when it comes down to it, I can't see myself anywhere else." Keith Adkins joined the Campbellsville University men's basketball staff in 1997 as an assistant coach. This fall, he will enter his 13th season as head coach with a program best win percentage of .594. He is currently 23rd on the NAIA Top 25 active coaches' wins list with a 234-160 record, including six 20-win seasons and six NAIA Tournament appearances. He led the Tigers to their first-ever Mid-South Conference Tournament championship in 2006 and the program's first MSC regular season title in 2010. The Campbellsville men's basketball team is scheduled to open its season Monday, Oct. 29 with an exhibition at Western Kentucky University in Bowling Green.

## 'Kill Them All ...' and 'Land Raider'

The Wild West gets a facelift in these two oaters that were released at a key period in filmmaking as the singing 1960s morphed into the "anything goes" spirit of the 1970s.

The late-1960s saw a ton of changes, as the world dealt with changing attitudes towards war, individual rights and freedom. This turned out to be a boon for the movies, as directors applied new ideas to old formulas. The western genre reeled from the new permissiveness, but films that were made in this period didn't look like any of the cowboy dramas that preceded them. Here we have two examples of the new western.

"Kill Them All" was made in Spain by an Italian studio, so it's a "Spaghetti Western." Many of these flicks were

shot in Madrid, with the studio scenes done in Rome, and top-lined American actors. Here, you get Chuck Connors playing a character far removed from the western television series that shot him to stardom ("The Rifleman" and "Branded"). Connors is the leader of a band of outlaws who mesh well due to their varied skill sets. One is a master of knives, another is an ex-strongman, and the youngest member is just plain nuts.

This sagebrush version of "The A-Team" is called upon to steal gold from the Union army. On the sly, Chuck is told to get the gold but then kill his comrades and come back alone. He takes the job and his band manages to take the booty after an exciting sequence, but they blow it when they are forced to ditch the gold in a lake before being captured.

They spend the second half of the movie in a prison camp, where they are beaten and tortured. Eventually, they turn on each other and it all comes to a head during a poorly-planned escape that sees half of the band killed. It all leads to a showdown between two band members and Chuck. The finale is quite brutal, but check the title.

"Raiders" finds Telly Savalas and George Maharis as Mexican-Americans who fall out over a woman. Telly embraces the cattle business and becomes a land baron, who decides to stir up the Apaches and then buy up all the land at a bargain price from the frightened farmers in his community. Maharis winds up back home to visit his ailing father but gets drawn into the conflict and sides with the Indians.

This one climaxes with a grim scene that had never

graced a western. The scene involves a planned attack on an Indian village while the warriors are known to be away. It is a cowardly play that comes back to haunt the invaders. The film ends with an excellent sequence that sees Maharis and Savalas settling their differences in the street, until the angry Apaches show up en masse to lay down some payback.

These revisionist westerns are mature in content and not the family entertainment that the genre had been during the 1950s. Here, you get streets of mud and characters who sweat under the desert sun like normal people. The films are not afraid to deal in reality but they both are also adept at delivering the requisite action sequences that will be very familiar to all fans of the Old West. That said, they also don't shy away from formerly taboo subjects,

such as rape, greed and salty language. These films do the genre a great service, however — they let it grow up and tell stories that mean something, while still offering all of the gunplay and thrills of yester-

year's six-gun sagas.

"Get the Gringo" — Mel Gibson anchors this excellent crime drama that starts with a heist gone awry. He winds up jailed in a Mexican prison with no one to trust but a 10-year-old. This is Mel's best outing since "Payback" and could easily be a sequel to that film. He is smart to surround himself with veteran character actors which include Dean Norris ("Breaking Bad"), Bob Odenkirk ("Sawshank Redemption") and Peter Stormare ("Fargo").

"The Three Stooges" — The Farrelly Brothers deliver their best work since "Something About Mary" with this excellent appreciation of Larry, Moe and Curly. They split the film into three

half-hour shorts and then turn it over to their excellent Stooges. Sean Hayes ("Will and Grace") brings real oomph to Larry, but he is well-matched by Will Sasso, as the hyperactive Curly, and Chris Diamantopoulos, as the smackhappy Moe. The story, as such, involves saving their orphanage, but that is just a convenient excuse for various bouts of slapstick. "Lockout" — Luc Besson ("The Professional") produced this high-impact action/science fiction tale that takes place on an orbiting prison. The president's daughter is taken captive when her humanitarian mission coincides with a riot. It is up to a disgraced agent, with his own agenda, to rescue the girl and stop the riot. Lots of fights, chases and narrow escapes ensue. Tongue-in-cheek and fun, it's totally forgettable.

"Bonanza" — For me, this show always had the edge on "Gunsmoke." The Cartwright clan is back in

this 34-episode season that aired in 1961-62. The Cartwrights defend their homestead against all manner of bad guys and shady developers. Lorne Greene is the dad, Ben, and his sons are well established by Pernell

Roberts, Dan Blocker and Michael Landon. Guest stars this season include Robert Culp, Vic Morrow, James Coburn and Faith Domergue.

Next week brings Stephen Dorf in the thriller, "Brake."

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# It's best to shield cars from sun, if possible

Dear Tom and Ray:  
My husband and I recently purchased a hacienda in Tucson, Ariz., where we just arrived for the summer and will be spending all our future summers. At present, my beloved 1986 Buick Skylark, painted in John Deere green, is sitting in a fully exposed driveway with only the shade of a small cactus to protect it from the blazing sun. My German mother, whose advice I always follow, has suggested that we purchase a small gazebo to shade my Buick. My British husband, who has only just arrived in the states this January, has wondered whether a better course of action would be to get a "reflective covering thing" (his words). His first idea here may be the result of the fact that the Buick broke down on the way to our wedding, and he thinks it is on its last legs. Bottom line: gazebo, "reflective cover thing" or status quo? — Elizabeth

**TOM:** Or maybe your mother's just trying to get your husband to spend money because she's still miffed about the Treaty of Versailles?

**RAY:** Sun is hard on the car's paint, and on its interior — which can crack from the heat and the sun. If both exterior and interior are in good shape (which, frankly, I doubt, given that it's a 1986 Buick), then the best thing would be to put up some sort of sun-covering structure. That's probably what your mom means by a "gazebo." And a permanent structure is best.

**TOM:** But you can start with a temporary canopy. It can be as simple as four well-secured poles with a large tarp stretched between them. Or you can buy a temporary carport built just for that purpose. A lot of places sell tentlike structures specifically designed to protect a car from sun and rain — either just on top, or on the sides, too.

**RAY:** My second choice would be two window shades — one for the front windshield, and one for the rear. That will at least protect the interior and dashboard from some of the direct sun. Even better, combine those with tinted windows.

**TOM:** I'm not a big fan of car covers (or "reflective cover things" for cars that you drive every day, only because they're a mild pain in the butt to take on and off. And chances are, after a while, you'll just stop using it.)

**RAY:** A permanent carport definitely is the best solution, Elizabeth. But I'd actually recommend that you start with something temporary. Why? Because Tucson's a beautiful place, but after you spend a fur-

nacelike summer there, you might change your mind about the "and all future summers" part. So you may not want to spend the money on a full-scale construction project until you're sure you're going to return year after year, rather than flee and spend your summers in Juneau, Alaska.

**TOM:** But if you do for the temporary carport, be sure to write your name and address on it, so when it blows away from one of Tucson's summer monsoons, your neighbors can return it. Good luck, you guys.

**Coolant might not be the answer for hot-running engine**

Dear Tom and Ray:  
I am a rural mail carrier and have a question about engine coolants. As a mail carrier, I spend a tremendous amount of time on hot asphalt at very slow speeds, and often sitting still. Are there any engine coolants that are capable of making an engine run cooler? My engine runs a little hotter than I am comfortable with. It doesn't overheat, but it reaches higher temps than it does when traveling down the road at 55 mph. If no such coolant exists, are there any "tricks" that could be applied to get the desired result? — Josh

**TOM:** There's really nothing you can put in there to make it run cooler, Josh — unless you want to pack the radiator with blocks of dry ice.

**RAY:** It's more likely that your radiator has seen better days. So the first thing I'd suggest is having your radiator inspected and flow-tested. Make sure it's not corroded and that you're moving plenty of coolant through it.

**TOM:** You can have someone check your thermostat, too, to make sure it's opening correctly and isn't sticking. A sticky thermostat can make a car run hot in stop-and-go driving. So can a non-functioning cooling fan.

**RAY:** If all of that stuff checks out OK, your one other option is to install an auxiliary cooling fan.

**TOM:** Basically, that's an extra electric fan that mounts on the front side of the radiator (your regular cooling fan is on the back side). An auxiliary fan will give you a little extra cooling in stop-and-go driving, which is where you need it.

**RAY:** But other than that, there's no magic potion, Josh. Except maybe the acid bath they're going to use to clean out your corroded radiator. Good luck.

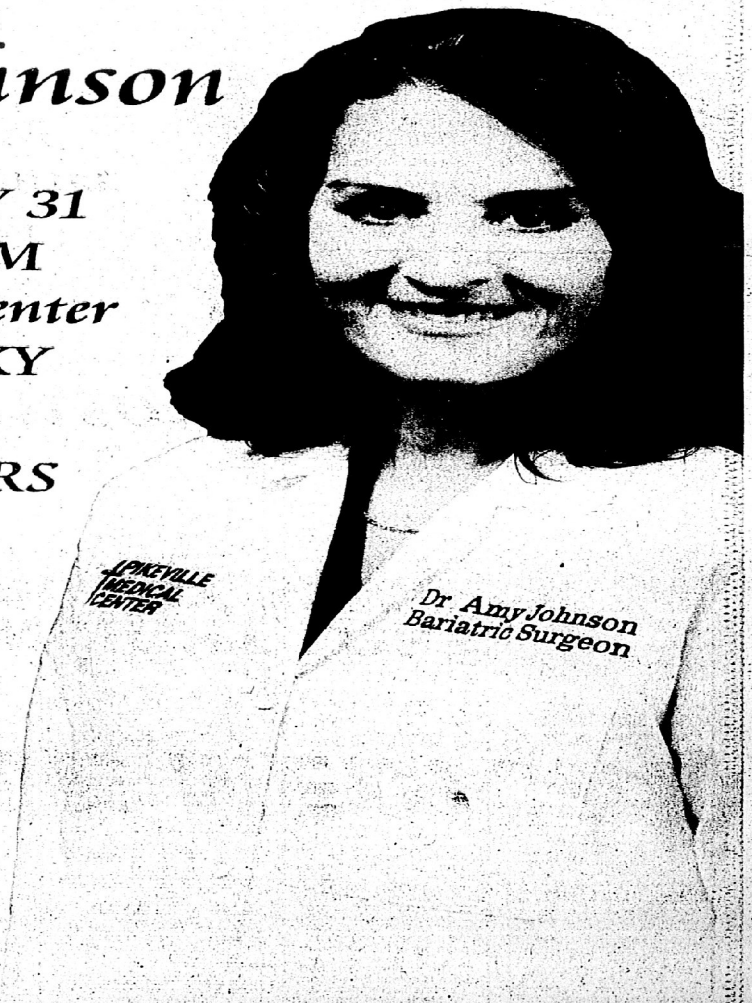
