Vaccination urged as whooping cough returns

An often overlooked ailment has begun showing signs of a comeback in recent years as more and more cases of whooping cough are being reported in Kentucky and across the country. According to the Center for Disease Control, whooping cough, also known as pertussis, is an extremely contagious serious illness, particularly in infants who are too young to be fully vaccinated. "There are more cases than we have seen in years," Floyd County Health Department Director Thursa Sloan said.

Sloan said the illness has not been a problem in Floyd County so far, but adds, "it has been a real problem in pockets of Kentucky." Sloan recommends everyone should make sure their TDAP (tetanus, diphtheria, pertussis) booster shots are up to date. "Everyone should go and get the shots. It's out there." According to the CDC, pertussis can be a serious illness in infants, children and adults, adding that the disease begins as a common cold with runny nose or congestion, sneezing and the potential for a mild fever, but within a matter of a couple weeks, severe coughing can begin. Whooping cough, is often described as a series of coughing fits which continues for weeks, causing violent and rapid coughing, over and over, until the air is gone from the lungs, forcing a hard inhalation with a loud "whooping" sound. In infants, the cough can be minimal or not even there, but there may instead be life-threatening pauses in breathing (apnea). Vaccinations is the key to avoiding the illness. The CDC says that to insure maximum protection infants and children should be vaccinated five times. The first three shots are given at 2, 4 and 6 months of age, while the fourth shot is given at 15 through 18 months of age, and a fifth shot is given when a child enters school, at 4 through 6 years of age. It is recommended that women who are pregnant and were not previously vaccinated get one dose of Tdap during the third trimester or late second trimester — or immediately postpartum, before leaving the hospital or birthing center. According to the medical professionals with the CDC, a vaccination of Tdap during pregnancy allows maternal pertussis antibodies to transfer to the newborn, which should provide protection against pertussis in early life, before the baby starts getting DTaP vaccines. Tdap will also protect the mother at time of delivery, making her less likely to transmit pertussis to her infant. According to CDC statistics during the first half of 2012, there have been noticeable increases in the number of pertussis cases or pertussis outbreaks reported in most states. As of August 11, 46 states and Washington, D.C. have reported increases in disease, compared with the same time period in 2011.

Times owner merges with three other companies

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. — The corporate owner of The Floyd County Times is merging with three other newspaper companies to more than double its size. Versa Capital Management, a private equity investment firm, announced Tuesday night the creation of Civitas Media, a new community news media company. Civitas Media, for "community" or "citizen," combines four media entities owned by Versa — Heartland Publications, which owns The Times along with 17 daily and 28 other weekly papers across Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, Ohio, Oklahoma, South Carolina, Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia; Freedom Central, which owns four daily newspapers in Illinois, Ohio and Missouri; Impressions Media, which operates the Wilkes-Barre Times Leader and other local publications in the northeastern Pennsylv-

ania area; and Ohio Community Media, which owns 13 daily and 30 weekly publications across the state of Ohio. "We have assembled an excellent group of community news publishers over the past 15 months and combining them together under the Civitas umbrella is a logical and value-enhancing result," stated Versa's CEO Gregory L. Segall. "Community-based media has remained profitable and largely avoided the level of financial pressure experienced by large daily metros in recent years. They are the principal source of information and news content as well as the primary advertising vehicles for their communities, whether in print or online, and we see a more stable and resilient future for this sector." Civitas, which now employs 1,650 people at 99 locations across 12 states in the Midwest, Mid-Atlantic

Nevada company alleges coal investment fraud

PIKEVILLE — A lawsuit filed in U.S. District Court accuses an Eastern Kentucky coal company and three Letcher County residents with defrauding a Nevada investment firm. NVZ Capital filed a complaint Sept. 5 against Triton Energy Coal, Robert Gentry, Bryan Lee Wagner and Ashley Wagner, accusing them of fraud in their efforts to convince the company to invest \$250,000 in a coal mining operation. According to the complaint, filed by Robert R. Waters, Cheryl E. Winn and J. Michael Wells, of the Waters Law Group, of Louisville, Bryan Lee Wagner approached NVZ Capital in March with an offer to invest the money into leasing "a large tract of top-quality coal producing property," which

would be matched by defendants. NVZ wired the money to an account held by Triton Energy April 16. NVZ says it sought updates about the project over the next two months, but according to the complaint, Bryan Lee Wagner at first only gave "superficial responses" to the company's request for information, then stopped communicating with NVZ altogether. "Throughout July 2012, NVZ attempted to contact Bryan Lee Wagner many times through telephone, instant messaging, email, letter correspondence and personal visits to both his home and purported work sites in an attempt to meet with him about the status of the project," the complaint says. "Throughout July 2012, Defendant Bryan Lee Wagner hid himself from NVZ officials and re-

Pikeville bankruptcy court to move

PIKEVILLE — The federal government will close the offices of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Pikeville, following a cost-savings plan announced Tuesday by the Judicial Conference of the United States. But bankruptcy proceedings will not be going far. Instead, they'll be headed just down the street. The closure is one of six nationwide, which will save the government about \$1 million a year, according to a statement released by the U.S. Administrative Office of the Courts. All of the facilities being closed have courtrooms but no full-time resident judges. AOC currently maintains two sites in Pikeville, the U.S. District Court, which is located in the federal building

on Main Street, and U.S. Bankruptcy Court, which leases space inside the BB&T building a couple blocks away. The closure would only affect the bankruptcy court, while the U.S. District Courthouse would remain open, he said. Jerry Truitt, clerk of the Eastern District of Kentucky Bankruptcy Court, said future bankruptcy proceedings will be held in the U.S. District Courthouse. Truitt said the court's lease at the BB&T Building has already expired and the court is currently maintaining its offices there on a month-to-month basis. He said he expects the court to complete its move by the end of the year. "We are not closing," Truitt said. "We are still going to be in Pikeville ... If you're going to bankruptcy court

right now, you're going to 138 Main Street. After the first of the year, you'll go to 108 Main Street, less than three blocks away." "The reason we are doing this at these six facilities is because there was some under-utilization ...," AOC spokesman David Sellers said. "The judiciary is having to look at cutting costs, without adversely impacting the delivery of justice." The Pikeville closure would save the government \$140,000 in lease payments, Sellers said. Truitt said the move would also save up to \$10,000 a year more in other fees related to upkeep of the offices. Other sites slated for closure include courthouses in Wilkesboro, N.C., Beaufort, S.C., Meridian, Miss., Amarillo, Texas, and Gadsden, Ala.

fused to respond to communication or provide any answers to the location of

the money invested."

The complaint further states that efforts to get updates from Gentry and Ashley Wagner were met with a similar response, saying that both defendants initially spoke to representatives of the company, but refused to give them any information, then cut off communication.

"Based on the clear behavioral pattern of Hobert Gentry, Ashley Wagner and Bryan Lee Wagner, it has become apparent to NVZ that these defendants, operating in concert with each other and operating through Triton Energy Coal Inc., have defrauded NVZ of ... \$250,000," the complaint alleges.

NVZ alleges the defendants committed fraud, misrepresentation, conversion and civil conspiracy, and seeks to be reimbursed the \$250,000, as well as awarded punitive damages and attorneys' fees.

We won the War on Poverty, then lost the peace

When President Lyndon B. Johnson declared a war on poverty in January 1964, the poverty rate was over 19 percent. By 1972 it had fallen to less than 12 percent, and it stayed there for most of the 1970s.

Anyone who says we lost the war on poverty is flat out ignoring these numbers. We won the war on poverty. What we lost was the peace.

During the war on poverty, the nation's official poverty rate fell dramatically. Since the end of the war on poverty, America's official poverty rate has been stable or rising. Even worse, real poverty is even higher than the official rate suggests.

The official federal government poverty line was developed in 1965 and adopted in 1969 as a dollar measure of how much it cost to live at a minimally acceptable standard of living in 1960s America.

Since its official adoption in 1969, the poverty line has been updated for inflation, but not for changes in the standard of living. It still represents a dollar measure of how much 1960s Americans thought it cost to live at a minimally acceptable standard of living.

As a result, when officials say that 15 percent of Americans live in poverty today, what they're really saying is that 15 percent of Americans today live in what would have been considered poverty in the late 1960s. The poverty line in 2011 for a family of four was \$23,021.

News flash: We're no longer living in the 1960s. At some point we have to start having higher standards for how poor people should live than we did half a century ago.

Can you imagine 1960s Americans using a poverty line that had been set at the end of World War I? How can we still be using a poverty line that was set during the Vietnam War? Life should be better today than it was in 1969, even for poor people.

Life for poor Americans sure was better in 1969 than it was in the 1920s.

And the fact is that even by 1960s standards we allow an embarrassing number of Americans to live in poverty.

More than one-third of all single-headed families are in poverty. One-fifth of all American children live below the poverty line.

The poverty rate for African-American children is nearly 40 percent. It has never fallen below 30 percent.

Had the poverty line been adjusted for improvements in the standard of living over the past 43 years, these figures would be even higher.

But the important question isn't how to measure poverty. It's how to end it.

We might look back to the 1960s again for the answer.

In his 1964 State of the Union address, President Johnson declared "unconditional war on poverty in America." The United States invested in public housing, roads, and public transportation.

The federal government created Head Start both to improve education and to put people to work investing in our kids.

The minimum wage was increased and expanded to cover nearly all workers.

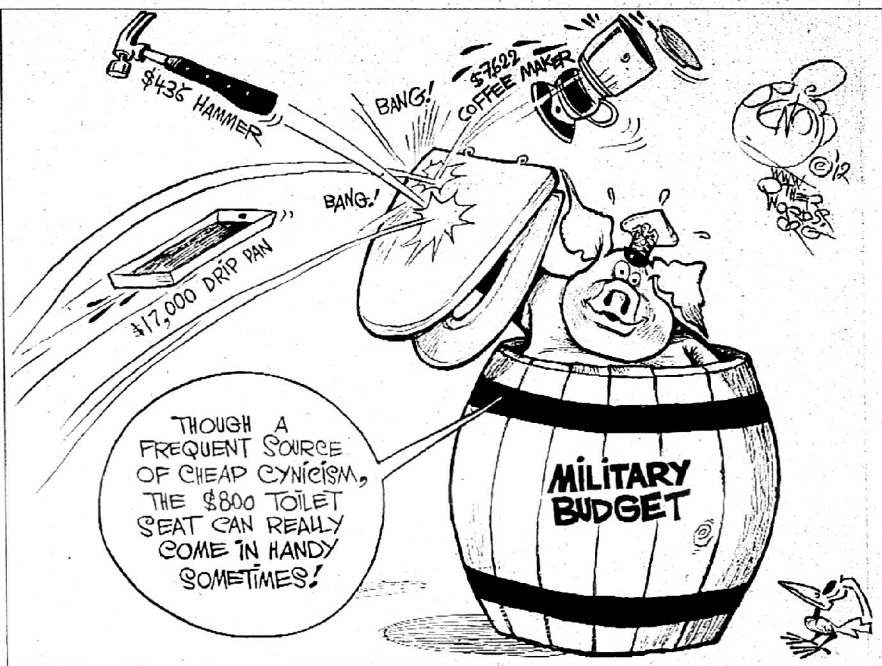
In short, Washington put people to work and ensured that working people made a respectable income.

The government did this while at the same time fighting a costly war in Vietnam, dealing with mass protests at home, and putting a man on the Moon.

Poverty rates fell to a low point in the 1970s, after the war on poverty ended in a victory.

If 1960s America could eliminate most serious poverty in the United States, surely 2010s America could do the same. Our national income per person is now more than twice as high as it was in 1970. We have the money. We lack only the will.

Hemp should be legal

Sen. Rand Paul and Kentucky Agriculture Commissioner James Comer took the lead last month in the movement to legalize hemp, and frankly, we should be listening to them on this particular issue.

Firstly, hemp is not marijuana. Though it resembles marijuana, hemp does not contain high levels of THC, the substance that provides the "high" when marijuana is smoked or ingested. In other words, hemp is not a drug.

Hemp does, however, present great promise in terms of agriculture here in Kentucky, and especially in Eastern Kentucky where thousands of acres of land have been flattened and could provide suitable farmland

because of surface coal mining. In an economy where we desperately need jobs, hemp could provide jobs.

Hemp also provides several other benefits, as it can be made into paper, textiles and other commodities. Just think of the trees our nation could save with a healthy hemp crop raised each year. Hemp is also a drought-resistant plant, of which anyone living in western Kentucky or in the Midwest can see the benefits.

Hemp's only drawback remains its resemblance to marijuana, and for that reason alone, many law enforcement agencies contend it should never be legalized as hemp farmers could easily hide patches of

marijuana in their fields.

Frankly, that's pretty sparse reasoning, especially considering that any hemp growing operations would most certainly be heavily regulated by state or federal agencies. Additionally, while our law enforcement operations find and destroy thousands of marijuana plants each year, pot remains the state's biggest cash crop. Pot growers, it seems, aren't having that much trouble finding places to grow it.

The fact is that Kentucky could use the jobs that growing hemp would create, and the benefits of decriminalizing it far outweigh the sole drawback.

The Usual Eccentric A glimmer of military budget sanity

Here's a milestone of sorts. In July, for the first time since 1998, the House of Representatives voted to maintain the current military budget rather than increase Pentagon spending. It's the first step toward bringing the budget down.

Within the bill, which included more than \$600 billion for the military, the House embedded a few gestures toward fiscal sanity. Most important was the decision of 89 Republicans to join most Democrats in shaving a billion bucks off the budget that House Republican leaders had proposed. That's mostly a symbolic move in a budget of this size, but worth celebrating nevertheless.

Less publicized was a much smaller gesture. Congress voted to block Rep. Hal Rogers (R-KY), the chair of the House committee in charge of spending, from steering a contract to his district in Kentucky to buy \$17,000 drip pans for Black Hawk helicopters.

\$17,000 what? You know, pans that catch leaking transmission fluid. As The New York Times re-

ported in May, other Army helicopters do fine with a \$2,500 model. Congress ruled that the chair of the spending committee couldn't reward a frequent campaign contributor with a contract that somebody else could fulfill at 1/8th the cost to the taxpayer.

Rogers' drip pans deal would have cost about \$5 million over three years — chump change in the budget Congress was voting on. So why did they axe this particular sweet deal? Maybe they were a little worried that it would become the next \$800 toilet seat.

Back in the 1980s, this fixture on a Navy plane — we're not talking the price of a toilet mind you; just the seat — epitomized military waste. As a symbol the public could really visualize, its discovery expedited contracting reform. Other egregious examples emerged: a \$436 claw hammer that looked like the kind you could pick up at the hardware store for \$15, and a \$7,622 coffee maker before espresso bars became commonplace, to name a few.

A pan that catches transmission fluid might not trigger the same outrage as that pricey toilet seat.

But with the nation careening toward the edge of a fiscal cliff, the timing is right. As conservative lawmakers make speeches in the coming months about their belief that Pentagon spending must be preserved at the expense of everything else, the \$17,000 drip pan offers a handy rebuttal.

So Congress tried to head this particular program off before it got too much publicity. Of course, at the same time it rejected other modest, sane, cost-cutting gestures, such as nixing the Pentagon's \$72 million advertising budget for NASCAR races.

We won't get too carried away with this glimmer of hope that a sane approach to military spending is around the corner. Still, '89 Republicans and most Democrats did say no to Rep. Rogers, the "Prince of Pork." And for the first time since before the 9/11 terrorist attacks, Congress voted to trim its leaders' aspirations for the overall military budget. It's a start.

With five minutes left, High-lands added its last score. The Blackcats put one last scoring drive together in the fourth quarter. Ryan Meade

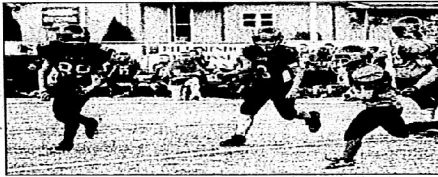

Movies from the Black Lagoon 'Dragon Eyes'

A tight-lipped stranger shows up in a New Orleans ghetto and sets about cleaning up the streets in this low-key action movie.

The story opens with a flashback to our hero, Tiano, lying in a bloody heap moaning that he has failed in what he set out to do. Usually, action films boast a hero who is nigh invulnerable and makes quips while removing an opponent's spleen. Not here.

Next, we are treated to a flashback where he gets the snuff kicked out of him by another prisoner. Just as you are about to write this action effort off, out pops Jean-Claude van Damme as an older prisoner who steps in and beats up the bad guy. Now that he is about 60, he does it with economic fashion and grace, less kicks (though they are still high enough to reach the thug's jaw).

Now we meet Tiano (version 3.0) as he enters a bad neighborhood, rents a cheap room and proceeds to throttle four drug dealers who mess with his ride. These guys work for Dash, the local drug honcho, and he is very forgiving. Every one appears to be getting drunk in seedy bars, so his management skills are questionable, unless he's working for Fannie Mae. Meanwhile, a rival drug dealer named Antoine hears about the fight and wants to hire Tiano.

The two gangs meet in a place that is a disreputable one, but their powwow is interrupted by local cop, Mr. V. He doesn't care who runs the drug trade, just as long as he gets his cut. He also enjoys micro-managing and decides to hire Tiano to run an operation that includes both gangs.

Now, Tiano reveals his true intentions. He makes both gangs move to the edge of the neighborhood so he can concentrate on cleaning it up. He also takes away their guns, which leaves the gang open to a takeover by rival Russian mobsters. Mr. V has no problems with the takeover, but he makes sure that the first order of business for the new regime is to take out Tiano. They fail.

Tiano now has the perfect situation. He recruits the two rival gangs to take on the Russians while the corrupt cops are on site and the resulting carnage is nasty, but he takes care of everybody and leaves the streets a lot cleaner, if you don't count the enormous pools of blood generated by this plan. Then again, isn't there an expression about omelets that would fit here?

There is a plan in a plan of work here, and we soon learn why Tiano has gone to all of this trouble. It is a sobering lesson in taking responsibility when you take a life. Van Damme's character is a big part of that lesson and his backstory is also good and makes clear why he puts his own life on the line to save a fellow convict.

This is great material and it all comes together under the direction of John Hyams. He is a second generation filmmaker. His dad, Peter, is a director who makes excellent genre films like "Capricorn One" and "Sudden Dawn," also featuring Mr. Van Damme.

Jean-Claude is pretty good here in all of the flashbacks to Tiano's prison stint. Their scenes play like the training sequences from a martial arts movie, with van Damme doing the teaching and Tiano catching a beating. Tiano handles the fights like an angel, damn age beautifully, probably because he is played by MMA Champion named Cung Lee. The corrupt cop can be a cliché but casting an actor like Peter Weller (Robocop) means that he will at least be interesting. The best thing about this film are the fights. Thanks to three editors who probably had a whole film made a brownish tint that makes it look like they only film scenes between 6 and 8 pm.

All in all a good effort, and probably the 100th action film to be adapted from John Dumas' novel. If you are one of those who you might also like a few of the other renmikes of this classic which include Sergio Leone's "A Fistful of Dollars" and Walter Hills' "Last Man Standing."
