# Jannouse beating trial begins next week

PRESTONSBURG — Jury selection concluded Monday in Floyd County Circuit Court for the trial of five former prisoners accused of beating a fellow

inmate in 2008 while lodged together in the Floyd County Detention Center.

The trial will be delayed until next week, due to the Jenny Wiley Festival-shortened work week and a required furlough day at the Floyd County Courthouse.

According to court officials, opening statements will begin Tuesday.

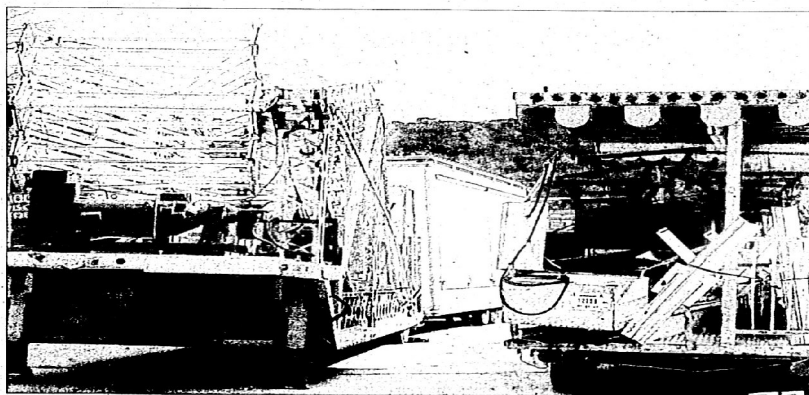
On Aug. 10, 2008, Terry Fisher, then a prisoner at the Floyd County Detention Center, was reportedly found near death in his cell, after alleg-

edly being assaulted by other inmates.

Ivan Gunnels Jr., 31, of Eastern; Christopher N. Newsome, 38, of Harold; Kevin Woods, 26, of Allen; Matthew Ritchie, 28, of Garrett; and Stephen Jervis, 50, of Prestonsburg, are

each charged with one count of complicity to first-degree assault in the beating of Terry Fisher.

One defendant originally named in the charges, Michael Rowland, died before he could be brought to trial.

## Jenny Wiley Festival gets into high gear

PRESTONSBURG — The Jenny Wiley Festival gets in full swing beginning tonight, with four days of events gradually building to Saturday's parade.

Vendors will begin setting up shop today, opening for business at 5 p.m. Then, at 6 p.m., there will be a trio of events competing for attention, including a performance by Dance Etc. at Prestonsburg High School, a martial arts demonstration on the downtown stage, and a cornhole tournament under the crafts tent at the Sally Gate Parking Lot.

At 7 p.m., the evening will conclude with a talent show on the downtown stage.

The carnival opens at noon

Thursday, with rides interspersed throughout the downtown area. At 6 p.m., activities will take a more somber note, as a candle-light vigil is held to raise awareness of domestic violence. The vigil will be followed at 7 p.m. with a "Gospel under the Stars" concert, featuring Marlena Vanhoose, the Blanton Sisters, Redeemed, Ron Ramey and the Eastridge Boys, featuring David Taylor and Richie Rose.

Friday will begin with full bellies, as the Rotary Club holds its annual pancake breakfast at First Baptist Church Irene Cole Memorial, from 7 to 10 a.m.

Friday evening will feature the sounds of banjos and fiddles in the air, as the "Bluegrass Extravaganza" takes place, featuring Ralph Stanley II, the Moron

Brothers and Five Miles from Nowhere.

Saturday will be chockful of activities, beginning with a car and bike show at Big Sandy Community and Technical College. Registration will begin at 8 a.m., with the show starting at 9 a.m. There will be entertainment on the downtown stage from noon until 2 p.m. At 1:30 p.m., lineup will begin for the parade, which will begin at 3 p.m.

Following the parade, music will again begin at the downtown stage, leading up to Saturday night's country music concert. At 6 p.m., Jeff Bates will present a two-hour acoustic show. At 8:30 p.m., Nashville recording artist Trent Tomlinson will take the stage to put an end to this year's festival.

## City council OKs same tax rate

PRESTONSBURG — If your tax bill from the city of Prestonsburg looks a lot like last year's, that would be because nothing has changed.

The city council gave final approval to an ordinance Monday night, setting this year's tax rates. The ordinance calls for the rates to remain the same as last year — 23.3 cents per \$100 of assessed value for real property, and 41.33 cents per \$100 of assessed value for personal property.

Following a meeting two weeks ago, when the council first considered the rates, Mayor Jerry Fannin said when the city received its tax information from the state, both the rate and the amount of money the tax would bring in were identical from last year.

"Obviously, the assessment didn't change from last year," Fannin said. The ordinance received unanimous consent from the council. In other action at Monday's meeting, the council also approved a revised agreement to participate in a drug task force with Operation UNITE. According to the resolution, the task force will "facilitate the cooperation of all state and local law enforcement agencies the entire 29-county region."

## Forum: Business owners can't keep 'heads in the sand' about health reform

PRESTONSBURG — Business executives gathered Tuesday at May Lodge in Jenny Wiley State Resort Park to get a breakdown on how the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act will affect them personally, as well as their business.

The message of the day? Be prepared. BB&T spokesperson Daryl Carlson said what effect the new law has on a business will depend largely on whether or not that business takes a proactive approach in preparing for the changes.

The event was hosted and sponsored by BB&T bank and offered some insight into the decisions businesses and individuals will be faced as the act, labeled "Obamacare" by both those in favor and opposed to the new law, rolls into implementation over the next two years.

Jim Dingus, with BB&T, opened the session saying that the PPACA act has "changed the entire landscape of employer provided health care."

Carlson outlined how the PPACA is designed to decrease the number of uninsured Americans and reduce the overall costs of health care.

Carlson said there has been a lot of apprehension over the act and that people look at it and see either a trail, or the light at the end of the tunnel. "It may be a train, and it may be a light at the end of the tunnel. Frankly, I think it can be both," Carlson said.

Carlson said during the Supreme Court case, business owners and executives were content to hide their heads in the sand and hope that it just went away. Carlson said, speaking specifically to business owners and executives, in the wake of the decision, "If you continue to ignore it any longer, I promise you it's a train. If you pay attention to the provisions of the plan and how to deal with it, then it can be a light at the end of a tunnel."

Carlson highlighted the health care reform timeline, noting when different aspects of the PPACA will go into effect and how individuals and businesses can be ready for the changes. According to Carlson, while President Barack Obama is clearly supportive of the health care act, Romney has said he will repeal it if elected. But Carlson also added that Romney has stated he would keep the parts of the act he felt worked best for the American people.



## A legislative perspective

One of the most devastating aspects of the economic crisis that began gripping the country in 2007 was the effect it had on the housing market.

While Kentucky did not experience the widespread declines felt mainly by states along the coasts, we were far from unscathed. According to the state's Administrative Office of the Courts, there have been more than 80,000 foreclosures over the last five years, and tens of thousands more households are just getting by or are "underwater," meaning their mortgage is more than their home is now worth.

Those facing foreclosure are not the only ones affected, either. Experts say these homes can bring down surrounding property values by one or two percent, and the loss of taxes from these homes cuts into government and school budgets. At the same time, abandoned homes are more susceptible to vandalism and thefts of such things as copper wiring.

Earlier this summer, the Kentucky House of Representatives authorized a special task force to take a closer look at this issue and to see what the legislature can do to help. Its membership consists of 14 legislators who under-

stand the issue well and who serve on the House committees that will handle any proposed legislation that would help alleviate this situation.

For many affected homeowners, some relief is already underway. Last month, for example, the Attorney General's office announced that notices have gone out to more than 5,000 qualified families who lost their homes between January 2008 and December 2011. They will receive a combined \$10.7 million as part of a \$25 billion settlement Kentucky and most other states reached early this year with many of the country's largest banks, which had been accused of improper foreclosure procedures.

Qualified homeowners — those who had foreclosed loans or a short sale with Ally/GMAC, Bank of America, Citi Bank, JP Morgan Chase or Wells Fargo — should receive a notice by the middle of this month. If you think you qualify and have not gotten a notice, please call 1-866-430-8358 between 6 a.m. and 6 p.m. More information about the settlement can be found at the Attorney General's website: <http://ag.ky.gov/mortgage-settlement/>. The deadline to make a claim is Jan. 18, 2013.

In addition to the \$10.7 million going directly to these homeowners, the settlement also provides an additional

\$48 million for consumer-protection programs and other housing assistance across the state.

Although not tied to housing, another program designed to help Kentuckians who may be having trouble financially was announced by Governor Beshear last week. In this case, it would establish a tax amnesty period to give those who owe back taxes to the state a chance to pay without penalties and with half of the interest. Notices have been mailed to 168,000 taxpayers who have back taxes owed between Dec. 2001 and the end of Sept. 2011; those under criminal investigation, understandably, do not qualify.

The amnesty program is only open this month and next, and those who don't take advantage of it will face much steeper penalties.

This is the third amnesty program the state has offered. The last one, in 2002, netted the state about \$40 million from 23,000 taxpayers, but the goal this year is \$60 million.

## House week in review

It is time again for open enrollment in the Kentucky Employees' Health Plan for state employees, public school employees, and other active employees who are eligible for state-sponsored health insurance.

This year's open enrollment is again a "passive" enrollment, meaning an enrollee doesn't need to do anything if he or she isn't making changes to their health insurance plan. For those who want to change their plan or contribute to a health care or dependent care Flexible Spending Account (FSA), active enrollment is necessary and takes place this Monday, Oct. 8 through Friday, Oct. 26.

Here is a brief primer on the 2013 plan options, which have not changed: The plan commonwealth. Standard PFO is the basic, value plan; the Commonwealth Maximum Choice plan includes a state funded Health Reimbursement Account (HRA) totaling \$1,000 for single coverage, \$1,500 for parent plus and couple coverage and \$2,000 for family coverage that can be used to reduce your deductible; the Commonwealth Capitol Choice plan provides a \$500 per family member allowance that can be used to pay many in-network services before payment toward your deductible; and the Commonwealth Optimum PFO, which is a traditional PFO plan featuring larger payroll deductions in exchange for lower out-of-pocket costs, along with fixed copays for certain services.

One bit of information to keep in mind as we enter open enrollment is that a change in FSA rules effective Jan. 1,

2013. The maximum contribution that can be made to a health care FSA annually has been reduced to \$2,500 under federal law. As a result, the state health plan is advising enrollees to set aside only that amount that the enrollee expects to use through Dec. 31 since the funds do not roll over to the next year. As the KEHP says, "Use it or lose it!"

Let's look at the monthly premiums for calendar year 2013 for the lowest cost plan for each plan option. The following premiums will be for non-smokers (Smokers will pay more; if you smoke, please see your plan materials to find your exact premium): The lowest cost premium for the Commonwealth Standard PFO option is offered at no cost to the employee, while premiums for the parent plus, couple, and family plans are lower than for the other plan options; the lowest cost premium for the Commonwealth Maximum Choice option is \$30.88; the lowest cost premium for the Commonwealth Capitol Choice option is \$37.28; and the lowest cost premium for the Commonwealth Optimum PFO option is \$62.76. Cross referencing for married employees in the same family is available under all four plan options.

Specific data about lifetime maximums, annual deductibles, out-of-pocket maximums, coinsurance, prescription coverage, dependent eligibility, and all benefits under each plan option can be found in plan materials provided to you by your agency or school HR office, or found online at [keh.ky.gov](http://keh.ky.gov).

So, let's do a wrap-up: If you are an active employee and need to make changes to your insurance plan, you should do so during this open enrollment period

with either a paper application found in the plan materials provided by your HR office, or online via the KHRIS Employee Self Service system. You should have already received a letter in the mail that explains how to enroll through KHRIS. If you do not need to make changes to your plan or contribute to an FSA, you do not need to do anything.

Please remember that if you are a retiree, you must contact your retirement system for an application, rates, contributions and information about online enrollment. Commonwealth Maximum Choice is not available for retirees.

If you are not sure whether or not you need to make changes to your plan, or if you need more information, there are plenty of places to find answers. Contact phone numbers and 2013 open enrollment assistance hours are listed in your plan materials and online at [keh.ky.gov](http://keh.ky.gov). You may also contact your agency's HR office for local, personalized assistance.

Speaking of local (or, at least, regional), benefit fairs will be held again throughout the open enrollment period at different locations across the state beginning on Monday, Oct. 8. Fair locations can be found in the plan materials or online at [keh.ky.gov](http://keh.ky.gov). For East Kentucky, a fair is scheduled for Tuesday, Oct. 9 at the GC Garland Administration Building on the London Elementary School campus in London from 2-6 p.m. A benefit fair will also be held in Lexington from 4-8 p.m. on Wednesday, Oct. 10 at the Dunbar High School cafeteria (that location will include a health fair). Enrollment kiosks and flu shots will be available at each fair location.

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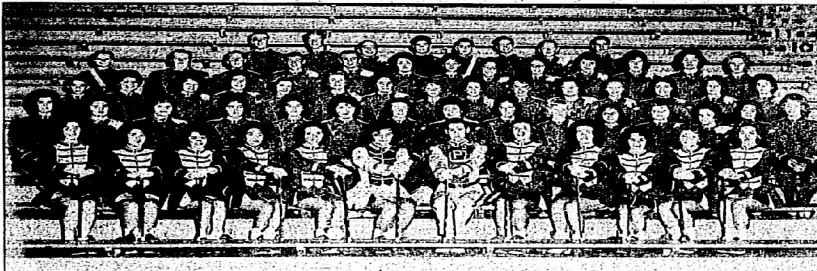
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## Prestonsburg majorettes reunion

## Former clerk to lead parade

The Jenny Wiley Festival gets going this week and this year will honor former County Clerk DuRan Moore as "the man who saved history."

In 1950, DuRan Moore was only 25 years old and was taking office as the state's youngest county clerk ever. Seven years later, Moore would put the records of Floyd County above his own possessions, as he paddled a canoe into the Old Floyd County Court House.

In 1949, while working at the First Guaranty Bank in Martin, DuRan Moore decided to make a bid for public office. When DuRan ran for office, he was told that securing victory meant having to beat one candidate in particular, to which

Moore responded, "I have to beat them all to win. If he comes in third, I don't want to come in second."

Moore says that he won his first and subsequent elections because of his work ethic. He had opposition every time he ran, but won each election, often with the most votes of any candidate in any race. Moore's campaign strategy would send him to every door in Floyd County, often into the night, to ask people to vote for him. His creed for public office was simply to make the County Court Clerk's office a friendly place, a "user-friendly" government office.

In 1957 as the waters of the Lewis Fork of the Big Sandy River rolled down the streets of Prestonsburg,

DuRan's first thoughts weren't of saving his own business, but of protecting the records lodged in the clerk's office, many of them dating to the county's establishment. While his own merchandise was floating out of his store and down the river, DuRan was busy moving the public records from the first floor to the top floor. Without his efforts, most if not all of the county's records would have been lost to disaster.

During the flood, DuRan also opened his doors to over 40 families with homes near Prestonsburg who were displaced by the storm.

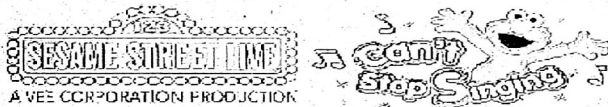
While in Prestonsburg, he was a member of Kiwanis and other civic organizations, and a strong advocate

of education. He went on to serve three terms in office until January 2, 1962 when he and his family moved to Lexington where he has had a successful career in business.

Moore continues to live in Lexington today. A wonderful raconteur with hundreds of stories, his first love remains Floyd County and her people, followed a close second by his love of mountain politics. At the age of 87, he continues to work in the insurance business and remains active with Kiwanis and the Democrat Party of Kentucky.

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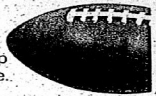

Preseason Class 2A, District 8 favorite Prestonsburg improved to 5-3 overall, and 2-0 in the district.

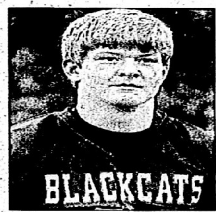
Shelby Valley, which suffered its second straight loss, slipped to 3-4 overall. The Wildcats opened district play 0-1.

Martin's Red, White and Blue Days will include a gospel sing on Thursday, and live entertainment, food, games, crafts and clothing on Friday. The city of Prestonsburg is losing more than \$20,000 per year, Councilman Billy Ray Collins said at Monday evening's regularly scheduled
