PRESTONSBURG — Jury selection concluded Monday in Floyd County Circuit Court for the trial of five former prison-ers accused of beating a fellow

inmate in 2008 while lodged together in the Floyd County Detention Center.

The trial will be delayed until next week, due to the Jenny Wiley Festival-shortened work week and a required furlough day at the Floyd County Courthouse.


According to court officials, opening statements will begin Tuesday.
On Åug. 10, 2008, Terry Fisher, then a prisoner at the Floyd County Detention Center, was reportedly found near death in his cell, after alleg-

edly being assaulted by other inmates.

Ivan Gunnels Jr., 31, of Eastern; Christopher N. Newsome, 38, of Harold; Kevin Woods, 26, of Allen; Matthew Ritchie, 28, of Garrett; and Stephen Jervis, 50, of Prestonsburg, are

each charged with one count of complicity to first-degree assault in the beating of Terry Fisher.

One defendant originally named in the charges, Michael Rowland, died before he could be brought to trial.

City council OKs same tax rate

PRESTONSBURG — If your tax bill from the city of Pres-nsburg looks a lot like last year's, that would be because noth-

stand the issue well and who serve on the House committees that will handle any proposed legislation that would help alled the structure of th

In addition to the \$10.7 million go-ing directly to these homeowners, the settlement also provides an additional

\$48. million for consumer-protection programs and other housing assistance across the state.

Although not tied to housing, another program designed to help Kentuckians who may be having trouble financially was announced by Governor Beshear last week. In this case, it would establish a tax amnesty period to give those who owe back taxes to the state a chance to pay without penalties and with half of the interest. Notices have been mailed to 168,000 taxpayers who have back taxes owed between Dec. 2001 and the end of Sept. 2011, those under criminal investigation, understandably, do not qualify.

This is the third amnesty program is only open this month and next, and those who don't take advantage of it will face much steeper penalties.

This is the third amnesty program the state has offered. The last one, in 2002, netted the state about \$40 million from 23,000 taxpayers, but the goal this year is \$60 million.

It is time again for open enrollment in the Kentucky Employees' Health Plan for state employees, public school employees, and other active employees who are eligible for state-sponsored health insurance.

This year's open enrollment is again a "passive" enrollment, meaning an enrollee doesn't need to do anything if he or she isn't making changes to their health insurance plan. For those who want to change their plan or contribute to a health care or dependent care Flexible Spending Account (FSA), active enrollment is necessary and takes place this Monday, Oct. 36. through Friday, Oct. 26.

One bit of information to keep in mind as we enter open enrollment is a change in FSA rules effective Jan. 1.

2013. The maximum contribution that can be made to a health care FSA annually has been reduced to \$2,500 under federal law. 

In 1949, while working at the First Guaranty Bank in Martin, DuRan Moore decided to make a bid for public office. When DuRan ran for office he was told that securing victory meant having to beat one candi-date in particular, to which

Moore responded, "I have to beat them all to win. If he comes in third, I don't want to come in second."

Moore says that he won his first and subsequent elections because of his work ethic. He had opposition every time he ran, but won each election, often with the most votes of any candidate in any race. Moore's campaign strategy would send him to every door in Floyd County, often into the night, to ask people to vote for him. His creed for public office was simply to make the County Court Clerk's office a friendly place, a "user-friendly" government office.

In 1957 as the waters of the Big Sandy River rolled down the streets of Prestonsburg.

DuRan's first thoughts weren't of saving his own business, but of protecting the records lodged in the clerk's office, many of them dating to the county's establishment. While his own merchandise was floating out of his store and down the river, DuRan was busy moving the public records from the first floor to the top floor. Without his efforts, most if not all of the county's records would have been lost to disaster the disaster of the floating the floatin

storm.
While in Prestonsburg, he was a member of Kiwan-is and other civic organiza-tions, and a strong advocate

of education.He went on to serve three terms in office until January 2, 1962 when he and his family moved to Lexington where he has had a successful career in busi-

Lexington where he has had a successful career in business.

Moore continues to live in Lexington today. A wonderful moonteur with hundreds of stories, his first love remains Floyd County and her people, followed a close second by his love of mountain politics. At the age of 87, he continues to work in the insurance business and remains active with Kiwanis and the Democrat Party of Kentucky.


