### **School taking Greene back to cour**

PRESTONSBURG —
Four months after the state
was successful in ousting
the David School's founding
director over allegations of
questionable spending, the
school is taking him back to
count in a attempt to force court in an attempt to force him to repay the school for tax penalties and question-

able credit card expenditures.
Attorney Michael Endicott filed a motion on behalf of the David School seeking to force former director Danny Greene to comply with certain obligations.
According to an affidavit by Ned Pillersdorf, who serves as vice chairman of the schools board, "The initial allegations made by the Attorney General's Office, which

the Floyd Circuit found to be persuasive, only scratch the surface of the intentional and reckless mismanagement of the school. The affiant has become aware of three areas of concern in which the actions of former executive director Danny Greene continue to threaten the economic stability of The David School."

According to Pillersdorf, Greene subjected the school to a tax bill of \$33,919.33 by failing to pay withholding tax to the government, even after it had been deducted from employee paychecks, and fail-

it had been deducted from employee paychecks, and fail-ing to file required forms.

"During the same time frame while these mandatory obligations were not being paid, it appears that Danny Greene paid his own health insurance in the amount of approximately \$27,000 per year and paid other expenses that directly benefited him, his wife (Ann Greene) and others," Pillersdorf said in the affidavit.

Pillersdorf also calls into question school credit card ac-count with a bill of \$2,324.74, count with a bill of \$2,324.74, which he says appears to consist mostly of charges unrelated to the school.

"Most of the charges on

the Bank of America credit card do not appear to be school related, although they were incurred at a time that Danny Greene was operating the school," Pillersdorf says in the affidavit. "For example, there are charges to an adult sex store in Arlamsas, various rental car charges, and other charges unrelated to the operations of the David School."

Copies of credit card bills attached to the motion and affidavit show a single charge of \$32.35 to Adult World Factory Outlet, in Widener, Ark.

The funal item in the mo-

tion concerns a piece of property the school bought from Greene in 2005, at a price of \$157,000, consisting of two tracts of land. According to Pillersdorf, due to what appears to be an error, Greene and his wife only signed one of the other piece of land in question. The motion will be heard Friday morning in Floyd Circuit Court.



### Floyd Schools secure, officials say

PRESTONSBURG — The atrocity committed in Newtown, Conn., has left many unanswered questions about gun rights and mental illness, but the safety and security of the nation's schools as the country movies forward takes precedence in Floyd County.

In the wake of last week's school shooting, during which a gunman killed 20 6- and 7-year-old children, six adults and himself, parents of school-aged children are justifiably worried going forward about the safety and security of schools. During a previously scheduled principals meeting at Jenny Wiley State Resort Park, Floyd County Schools Superintendent. Henry Webb said security measures currently in place continue to make Floyd

County schools safe and secure.

On Monday, Webb released a statement on the school district's website offering prayers for those lost in Newtown, tips from psychological associations about how to discuss the tragedy with young children, and a short summary of the security measures already in the area were safe. Webb gave a short, direct answer: "Yes, absolutely."

According to Webb, during the meeting, principals and school officials were apprised to redouble their efforts in the diligent enforcement of current procedures and policies.

"We are reiterating that we have safety procedures in our district

we are reiterating that we have safety procedures in our district that we follow diligently, such as lockdown drills, such as every school in our district has intercom

systems or buzzer systems, where folks come through the door, and we have open communication with our first responders."

Webb said that it is important everyone be focused and on the same page. He says that the school system continues to look into what safer, but that currently they are not planning to make any changes, either structurally or by adding guards. "There is no conversation about physically changing the environment. That is not something at this point that is being discussed."

"One of the things you have to remember is that we have multiple facilities, with literally hundreds of doors. So, there's no prison bars, there's no metal doors, we're not looking at razor wire lence. They're



### Bill prohibits exchanging tamper-resistant opioids

FRANKFORT - Rep. Addia K. Wuchner, R-Florence (66th District) announced last week she is filling legislation for the 2013 Session of the Kentucky General Assembly that would prohibit the unauthorized substitution of an FDA-approved opioid product that incorporates tamper resistant technologies for one that is not.

tant technologies for one that is not.

"We have fought the scourge of prescription drug abuse across the Commonwealth for many years," said Representative Wuchner. "It is essential we take all steps necessary to reduce the number of Kentuckians who either, abuse prescription drugs or profit from that abuse, and it is my belief this legislation is one way we can combat this problem."

BR 11, which is called The STOPP (Stop Tampering of Prescription Pills in Kentucky) in

Kentucky Act 2013, is another tool in the tool box to combat prescription narcotic drug abuse that is taking a toll on Kentucky families, Wuchner said.

"This legislation would prohibit the unauthorized substitution of an FDA-approved opioid product that incorporates tamper-resistant technologies for one that does not," added Rep. Wuchner. "Tamper resistant formulations, or TRF's, make it much more difficult to crush, melt, or otherwise alter medication into a form that is easier to abuse."

"Studies show that addicts-tend to crush or otherwise break down time-released products into a form that can be snorted or injected for a more intense high," said Rep. Wuchner. "Prod-ucts incorporating TRF tech-nologies offer physicians the op-portunity to prescribe products

that can reduce the potential for misuse and abuse of opioids. It places no mandate on doctors and is completely voluntary."
Representative Wuchner announced the pre-filing for BR 11 during testimony to the 2012 Special Session House Bill 1 Implementation and Oversight Committee this afternoon in Frankfort. It is the second consecutive session that Representative Wuchner has filled legislation. House Bill 377 was filed for the 2012 Legislative Session, which unanimously passed the House Hoalth and Welfare Committee but was not called to the House floor for a vote.

"Most important, this legislation is about saving lives," added Rep. Wuchner. "Too many lives lost, too many futures destroyed and too many futures destroyed and too many futures defect on their young lives."


