FLOYD CONTRIBUTES MORE THAN 4,000 TO CHANDLER LEAD

Democratic Landslide Recorded by Recent Vote; County Only Damp

CHILDERS, BAILEY WIN

Lieutenant-Governor A. B. votes, with perhaps a thousand or so votes to be added to his total when the count is completed.

His Floyd county majority was 4,707, with a total of 9,-393 votes to 4,686 for his opponent. He carried 41 of the 47 precincts in the county.

Though his Republican opponent, William Dingus, in the race for State Senator, polled a majority in 25 of the county's precincts, Joe P. Tackett carried Floyd county by a margin of 1,113 votes. Mr. Tackett polled 6,848 votes, to 5,735 for Mr. Dingus. Tackett's majority in Pike was 2,-080 and in Knott 2,015.






