

meningitis was reported from practically all parts of Eastern Kentucky acute danger of the malady in this county remains remote, it was indicated Tuesday when it was learned that no other cases had developed on Prater Creek, Mud Creek and Abner Fork, the three communities of this county which have suffered from inroads of the disease, Such outbreaks come without warnout warning, however, and nane can fretell definitely the degree of danger that may exist.

Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the Floyd County Health Department Wednesday issued the following statement:

"The meningitis situation in this county, at present, is satisfactory. As far as I know, there is not a case in the county. The last case reported, two weeks ago, was the daughter of Noah Thacker, on Prater Creek, and she is convalescing nicely. However, due to the prevalence in adjoining counties, I feel that, if every precaution is not made, we will be due for our part of the epidemic.

Cases have been reported from every county adjoining us, and in some instances schools and other places where people congregate have been closed. I feel that no such drastic action is indicated in this county, at this time, but I do suggest that people refrain from visiting, especially into our adjoining counties and especially into communities from which cases have been reported; that parents keep their children away from picture shows and other places of amusement, and in case of sudden illness call your family physician at once.

The meningiss situation is most acute in Harlan and Bell counties in Southeastern Kentucky and in section. Jenkins, McRoberts and other Letcher county towns within cases, and strict quarantine has been established in these localities.

In Pike county, 14 miles from Pikeville, the disease broke out last week, and in Pikeville Sunday night one death occurred. The victim was Grundy Maynard, 60-year-old carpenter, who had been ill a week. Mrs. Jim O'Brien, Pikeville, is ill with the digease, but Pike health authorities said this week further spread of the disease is not antici-

Van Lear's Saturday night dance was switched to Prestonsburg because of meningitis outbreak there or nearby. One report said the town went under quarantine at 6 o'clock Saturday evening.

Public schools of Salversville were ordered closed Monday because of a meningitis outbreak during which within the past two weeks, three of five sufferers have died. A sevenyear-old child of John Conley on the outskirts of Salversville is ill and 10 days ago a 12-year-old child in the same family died.

Ellis Island Once Gay, and Named Oyster Island

continued to be New Amsterdam's favorite resort for picnics, oyster roasts, clam bakes, and fishing parties," says Edward Corsi, former United States commissioner of immigration at Ellis island in his valuable book "In the Shadow of Liberty: The Chronicle of Ellis Island." "It passed finally into the hands of Samuel Ellis, a farmer of Bergen county, New Jer-

"It later became the property of the state of New York (how, not clear) and in 1808, New York ceded the island to the federal government. It was then used as a powder magazine and arsenal and after various uses by the government, in 1890, it was designated as an immigrant station."

Mr. Corsi notes that during his administration-in 1932-"I was to witness the actual changing of the tide, the first in more than a hundred years, when more people had left our shores than were arriving. The changing tide of immigration was brought about by the depression."

In that year-1932-35,576 persons were admitted, while 103,295 left. In 1928 the figures were: admitted, 307,-255; left, 77,457.—Kansas City Star.

Nova Scotia Is Scottish

Nova Scotia, the land of Longfellow's "Evangeline" and popularly believed because of that poem to be largely French and English, is largely Scotch. The opening of Nova Scotia's parliament is accompanied by the skirl of bagpipes, and several newspapers are printed partly in Gaelic.
