ELK HORN LANDS ARE TRANSFERRED:

A Two-Year Program and Re-Organization Underway at Present

Striving for a more efficient working basis, under the reorganization of the Elkhorn Coal Corporation ,and a complete change from old methods to new and modern means of mining, was stated this week as reason for mechanizing the Wayland

It was also started that, while have one tippple to serve both Garrett and Wayland, a decrease anticipated. Mechanizing equipment the tipple, etc., are part of plans that will take about two years to complete.

These changes are in line with organization changes affected by Federal Judge Robert R. Nevin in federal court at Cincinnati recently, who authorized C. W. Watson trustee of Elkhorn Coal Corporation to transfer to the reorganized concern approximately 53,acres of Kentucky and West Virginia mining lands valued at \$1,-500,000. These properties are said to be located around Wayland and Garrett.

More than 90,000, of the 200,-000 acres owned by the company in two states, of land and mineral rights are in Floyd county. The Floyd holdings are valued in excess of \$1,000,000.
