



Forestalling a hot campaign for trustee in the various school sub-districts of Floyd county, the Board of Education has, after all, acted wisely by abolishing the sub-district and the elective method of choosing a trustee. The action came at a good time: in time to halt ill feeling and bitter

hatred that flares at every Floyd trustee election.

At a time when it had just become known that additional hatred was being engendered in one sub-district where, already, eight of the 24 regis- burg, Ky., to the highest and best tered voters were planning to run for the office. Of the other 16 in the district, three would have been inside the polling place as election officers.










CENTURY ago the Railroad Era was born. The young giant, America, began to stir in earnest, dimly foreseeing its future. Men of vision demanded "More canals. More turnpikes. And railroads-'if practical'." By 1838 great plans of internal improvement were afoot in what is now Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Ohio, and Indiana. A then small part of this activity was the building of "The Louisa Railroad," later to become the Chesapeake and Ohio.

Q Conceived originally as a spur line to serve a small territory northwest of Richmond, Virginia, that road ran its first ""brigade of cars" in December of 1838. It had not quite twenty-three miles of track-a distance it then could cover in somewhat less than three hours!

Q Those were the days when die-hards resisted railroad improvement, and even friends of progress expressed such opinions as,"Nothing can do more harm to the adoption of railroads than the promulgation of such nonsense as that we shall see locomotives travelling at the rate of twelve miles per hour."

Q A hundred years ago this railroad helped to raise the curtain of the future on the territory it now serves. With pioneering days long past, the mountains tunnelled and the rivers bridged, the day of Service is here. And it is on this key-note of service that the Chesapeake and Ohio continues the work it began a century ago.


WEEKSBURY P.-T. A. **IS RE-ORGANIZED**





In order to maintain this strength, Fechner said it would be necessary to enroll approximately 55,000 young men and war veterans between April 1 and April 20. More than 170.000 applications are on file. Fechner said it also was planned to shift, on March 31, approximately 100 camps to other locations for the summer.






