RESOLUTION DEMANDS **FLOYD FOREMEN** ON WPA WORK

Continuance of the Works Progress Administration policy of employing foremen and superintendents on WPA projects from residents of other counties or states may result in the refusal of the Floyd fiscal court to

sponsor such projects. This stand was taken by the fiscal court in a resolution adopted by the court at its meeting last Thrsday afternoon. Condemning the hiring of superintendents and foremen from other counties for Floyd county work, the court asked the Works Progress Administration to "state its position on this question."

The resolution follows:

"It appearing to the Floyd County Fiscal Court that the representatives of the Works Projects Administration have for the past several months engaged in the practice of replacing nonrelief workers, to-wit: Foremen and Superintendents, residents of Floyd county, with foremen from other counties, on projects sponsored by this court, which practice this court condemns as unfair and unreasonable.

"It is the sense of this court that Floyd county has a large number of experienced and qualified citizens who are capable, ready, able and willing to carry on the program of the Works Chesapeake & Ohio Railway officials Projects Administration in this coun-

EXPENSIVE ADVICE

THE TIMES cannot but be impressed with the efforts of Governor Johnson to slash state governmental overhead by eliminating unnecessary jobs, weeding out "sleepers" on the payroll and demanding efficiency from state employes.

But it would have been more impressed, had that administration-controlled Legislature eliminated nine more unnecessary jobs-those of the state's nine advisory highway commissioners. Here was a chance to save, at one stroke, a sizeable sum of money annually by putting an end to paying high salaries for advice, log-rolling and political maneuvering in the several highway districts. But only a gesture was made in this direction. The advisory commissioners were retained-"in the interest of party harmony," or, to be more accurate, in the interest of party organization.

Now, if the Hatch bill does what is expected of it, and if it circumscribes the activities of such officials as it should, it may happen that the highway advisory board will not have such extraneous value and will be relegated to the discard where it belongs.

WHY NOT DEMAND PROOF?

Opponents of military conscription for the United States argue that it is unnecessary, that enough volunteers would rally to the colors to supply the country with an adequate defense force.

If they know whereof they speak, we do not need conscription. If they do not, they are playing the cheap and unpatriotic role of obstructionists

Why not, while this debate over the conscription bill is wearing itself and everybody out, find out how right or wrong they are? A call for volunteers would end that part of the argument in short order.
