





The storage should be such that a 50-degree temperature can be held with at least two milk cows. ease. This means that the walls, the ceiling and the floor should be tightly able to afford good milk, fruits, meat built. In "professional" houses, this is and eggs have less illness. the construction. The walls are made of 2 by 4's, sheeted on both sides, then covered with paper, and the inside finished with matched lumber, and the 175 acres. outside with clear sheeting, with stripped joints, or with weatherboarding.

The ceiling is composed of sheeting nailed to the rafters, a layer of paper, and covered with matched lumber. The floor construction is the same, but tongue-and-groove No. 1 flooring is used over the paper and the sheeting. Besides, a small stove is provided, to be-fired in emergency.

A "warm" room so built in a house cellar, for example, can be held at just the temperature, regardless of the rest. Likewise, so can a room partitioned off in an outbuilding, whose construction is too flimsy.

Dryness of air is assured by providing ventilation, the admittance of outside air, and the passing off of moisture the stored vegetables emit, Advantage is taken of the fact that moist air rises. Thus, vents are placed at the highest point in the ceiling, whose combined area in square inches is that of the floor, in square feet. Air intake is effected by vents in the floor or at the floorline, located next to the heating stove, to remove the chill, when ventiliation is given in cold times. A thermometer should always be at

hand, and it should stand at 50 degrees. The humidity should be watched, when tere is any sign of condensed moisture on the ceiling, the first fire should be started and the vents opened and kept open, until the ceiling is dry again, and all signs of mustiness are gone. Then, all vents are closed. Such a "warm" room will prove a


