COURT ENVISIONS SAVINGS ON INTEREST

The court voted, at Wednesday's meeting, to borrow from the State National Bank, Maysville, Ky., at 4 per cent interest \$50,000 with which to pay outstanding warrants which are bearing 6 per cent interest.

To secure payment of the loan, the court voted to pledge 1940-41 revenues for the General claim fund-the same revenues which eventually would have been used in payment of the warrants. At an earlier meeting, salary of W.

J. May, County Treasurer, was restored to the original \$360 a year. The court, a few months ago, raised Mr. May's salary to \$600 a year but in its September 22. recent order stated that it was not aware of the circumstances under which his salary was first fixed when competitive bids for the treasurership were submitted, Mr. May's bid being \$360 a year.

He is one of the finest athletes ever produced by Prestonsburg high school. He is a leader, a young man whose clean-living is an example for other youngsters to emulate. His courage and ability are unquestioned-he can dish it out and he can take it.

But he didn't weigh enough to get in on a certain Kentucky college's football squad and thus earn his tuition, board, etcetera.

The beef trust got him.

He had visions of making the team, of completing college in this way, even though he had no money. But, last week, a group of 200-pounders arrived from Pennsylvania-and these hopes went glimmering. He weighed only 170, or thereabouts.

So the poor coach, being a good business man in the Big Business of football, had to let this young man go-to try to peddle his 170 pounds against the

200 and more pounds that is prime beef on college campuses this time of year.

All of which wouldn't be so bad, if it were not for the fact that Texas steers and beef from other states are the ones who step in and horn Kentucky stock aside-horn them aside in the market provided and maintained by Kentucky taxpayers' money.

Character, spirit, ambition—these count as little or nothing in this business. The boy who can nearest approach both irresistible force and immovable object gets the call.

Kentucky, of course, is not the only state where this same thing is happening. It is an old story. Yet the injustice of the system disillusions both youth and those who have held to the belief that their tax money is being spent for the education of their own youth.

For private institutions, such as Notre Dame, or such as Transylvania in our own state, to turn a Kentucky boy away would be less open to censure. But for a state-owned college to send a deserving Kentuckian elsewhere, at the same time welcoming with open arms a youngster from another state, simply because the home product lacks a few pounds of avoirdupois-that doesn't register here.

THE TIMES has no idea of condemning college football. It does not object to football players being given financial assistance in school-it does not subscribe to the out-moded theory that a boy should "die for dear, old Siwash" and through his play enrich old Siwash's coffers, without some consideration other than the plaudits of the multitude.

But it does shrink from the vicious system that has been long years a-building, a system that most colleges practise in self-defense, seeking out the heaviest and brawniest athletes to the seclusion of others, so as to compete successfully with other school.

True, the gate receipts resulting from winning teams may help to support the institution-but have you taxpayers noticed any reduction in your taxes

We're not saying that football is over-emphasized. We're saying that home talent and character are being under-estimated.

If the value of a football player to his school is to be figured in avoirdupois, if the matter is to be reduced to cold figures and into terms of Big Business -why not permit schools to sell and buy and draft players, even as organized baseball does?



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


