The deduction rate for the lime in Floyd county is \$2.40 per ton, Mr. Stephens said, and each farmer may order enough lime to take up as much as 80 per cent of his soil-building al-

lowance. Mr. Stephens emphasized that orders for liming materials should be placed as early as possible since the 1941 program year closes on June 30,

Of the total 1,754 farms in the county, 754 used 5,683 tons of lime in the program last year, Mr. Stephens pointed out, but lime is needed on all of the farms in Floyd county, and through co-operation in the Agricultural Conservation Program all farmers will be able to obtain this muchneeded material this year.

The Middle Creek railroad was on its way.

Haley, Chisholm & Morris, awarded contract on construction of the 10 miles of railway, had seven carloads of equipment on West Prestonsburg sidetracks.

A Chesapeake & Ohio Railway Company extra force was engaged in building a spur track for camp cars. Rail facilities there, for a time Tuesday morning, were congested.

Men were actually working-and others, looking on, were wanting to The railroad, contractors said, was ready to be started when C. & O.

gave the word, "Go." In fact, the contracting firm Wednesday morning was reported beginning construction. Work began from the corporate limits of West Prestonsburg toward railhead on the Left

Fork of Middle Creek. From the junction with the railway company's main line to the "outside" city limits, C. & O. was itself reported as building the rail line. From that point the contractors are

expected to do the work. At the same time, county officials here, in a discussion of plans for construction of a highway to the proposed mining center, were told by officials of the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company that they expect to begin work immediately, so that coal-loading may be begun as soon as the railway is completed. The Works Progress Administration has been asked to begin highway construction at once, and survey of the route was begun

"We have been told to finish the building of the railroad at the earliest possible moment," a representative of the contracting firm said Tuesday. He declined to state the contract

Coal company officials said Tuesday that, in addition to installation of a tipple and machinery for operation of the mine, they expect to construct 150 homes at the rail-head.

From the West Prestonsburg terminal the rail route follows the bottom between Main and Duncan streets of the town, up the right side of Middle Creek to the forks, across

WE STAND CORRECTED Editor, Floyd County Times:

An article from The Floyd County Times appearing in the Paintsville Herald, under the caption "Title to Big Sandy Property Threatened," bears two historical discrepancies to which I would like to call your atten-

First: It is stated that the hearing concerning the Wolcott survey was held by Circuit Judge A. J. Auxier in 1907. It is true the hearing was held in 1907; but by the late Judge D. W Gardner, Circuit Judge at that time.

Second: Here I quote from the article: "And across the old bridge linking Prestonsburg with the 'railroad side' of the river they marched, bearing the huge banner which proclaimed their sentiments to the world: 'Down with the Wolcott claims."
