INEZ WINS REGIONAL TOURNEY

DEFEATS GARRETT AFTER P'BURG TRIPS MEADE

The Inez Indians, perennial contenders from this section for the state basketball championship, again are on their way to Lexington to the state tournament this week after winning the regional tourney here Saturday night.

But they reached the state tourney this year, only after reckoning in the most serious way with Prestonsburg and Garrett, champion and runner-up in the 58th district net meet at McDowell.

Prestonsburg removed Meade Memorial as an obstacle to the Indians Friday night in the biggest upset of the tournament, blasting by a 40-31 score the team that at least twice this season had defeated Inez.

Then Garrett fought its way through to the finals and Saturday night extended the Indians to the limit before losing, 32-26, after leading through the earlier part of the contest.

The tournament, attended throughout by huge crowds, and featured by hard-fought games throughout, was one of the most interesting ever held in this section.

Belfry and Frenchburg opened the meet Thursday night, with the Pike countians leading all the way to win, 36 to 28. Second game of the evening saw Garrett forced to come from behind to defeat Cannel City, 36-32. The Cannel City boys, coached by Carl Stewart, formerly of Maytown, jumped off to an early lead and maintained a three-point margin at the half. The smoother-working Garrett machine got the lead by one point at the end of the third period and increased this edge to four points by game's end.

Three Floyd Players On All-Regional

Garrett shared honors with Inez on the all-regional team selected at the close of the tournament, each team placing two men. The mythical all-star aggregation follows:

Wallace (Cumberland), Pinson (Belfry), Music (Garrett), Benton (Cannel City), Wheeler (Frenchburg), Hunter (Prestonsburg), Harmon (Inez), Butcher (Meade), West (Inez), Hughes (Garrett).

The sportsmanship trophy was awarded to Cannel City. Harmon, Inez star, received the trophy as high-scorer of the tournament.

Prestonsburg fans found cause for cheering at the end of the first quarter of the Blackcats' game with Meade Memorial when the 'Cats held an 8-6 edge, yet withheld their wildest cheers as they feared Butcher & Co., would "turn on" later in the game. As the Prestonsburg boys tied up the high-scoring Butcher and continued to add to their lead, the crowd went wild.

Friday evening's nightcap was easily won by Inez, the Indians swamping Cumberland, 54-32.

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Says Messer, Slone Merited Acquittal In Wicker Case

Instead of the two years they received for the slaying of Mart Wicker at Lackey, Allen Slone and Cluett Messer should have been given a directed verdict of acquittal, the Court of Appeals held last week.

The court's opinion said Messer aided Slone, town marshal of Lackey, in removing Wicker from a roadhouse where he was drinking. It indicated that he was removed because Slone knew his arrest would mean revocation of his prison parole. Later, Wicker returned, the court cited, threatening Slone and Messer, and was killed in an exchange of shots.

Commonwealth's Attorney John Allen's comment was that the two would be given another trial and that, in his opinion, a directed verdict should not be given.

DRAFT BOARDS ASKED FOR 54

NEW CALLS MAY EXHAUST LIST OF VOLUNTEERS

Calls received Wednesday for 54 men from this county for military service may, for the first time since the Selective Service system was instituted last year, necessitate the sending of draftees early next month, it was held here.

Draft Board No. 44 has a sufficient number of volunteers to supply the call for 18 men on March 31, but at this time lacks six of having the 20 called for entrance into military service on April 8.

The April 8 call of 16 from Board 45 will be filled by volunteers, but this will drain the Board's volunteer reserve, as it now stands, to 22 men.

GARRETT MEN JAILED HERE

SALISBURY, ALLEN ARE RETURNED FROM HYDEN

Charged with the shooting and wounding of James Belcher, of Mt. Sterling, and of the hold-up and robbery of other members of Belcher's party, Tuley Salisbury and Oliver Allen, of Garrett, were in jail here this week.

Fugitives since the night of February 3 when they are alleged to have committed the offenses, the two were arrested in Leslie county. They were returned here Sunday from Hyden by Sheriff Dial Salisbury.

Bond for each was set at \$7,000, and neither had executed bail Wednesday morning.

The two men told officers that they were not guilty of the charges.

Belcher, shot through his lung, has recovered from his wound and Wednesday appeared before County Attorney Forrest D. Short to make a statement in connection with the shooting.

FAILURE TO DEVELOP LEASE COSTS GAS FIRM \$3,000

The Kentucky Court of Appeals last week turned down a contention that the judgment of a gas or oil development concern should be considered as "conclusive" as to whether a field warrants further drilling.

The high tribunal upheld a \$3,000 award made by the Floyd circuit court to Thomas Refitt, of Pyramid, who had sought damages because the Midland Gas Corporation failed to drill three additional wells, as provided in its lease, after completing two gas wells.

The corporation claimed gas was not found in sufficient quantities on Refitt's land to warrant further development.

The court admitted a rule accepting the development firm's discretion in such cases unless fraud or bad faith were shown had been announced "broadly" in an earlier appellate court decision.

TAX INCREASE SUGGESTED

FOR FLOYD COUNTY; 1,000 TAXPAYERS FAIL TO LIST

Floyd, along with 104 of the state's 120 counties, has been advised by the State Tax Commission to make tax assessment increases on various types of property.

Suggested increases for this county are \$800,000 on town lots and \$2,200,000 on lands. With the assessment originally reported by Tax Commissioner Gomer C. Sturgill standing at \$7,890,438, the increases suggested would bring the valuation of taxable property in the county to \$10,890,438.

County Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., said that the State Tax Commission wrote him a few weeks ago suggesting that the Board of Supervisors increase assessments in order to obviate the necessity of a "blanket raise" later. He added that the Commission had not however given any formal notice of exact amounts to be demanded of the county.

The original assessment is expected to be increased considerably, since approximately 1,000 property-owners who did not file lists have been notified to appear before the Board of Supervisors and list their property.

MINE FAMILIES EVACUATING PROPERTY

LABOR DEMANDS FROM LOGAN LIFT HOPES

Peaceful evacuation by 108 mine families of property of the Elk Horn Coal Corporation at Wayland, Garrett and Sizemore Branch was under way this week after writs of forcible entry and detainer had been executed by Deputy Sheriffs Tom James and W. B. Boyd.

Eighteen of the families vacated the coal company's premises last week. The others were reported moving or preparing to move. Only one family had been forcibly ejected.

The ejection writs were procured by attorneys for Receivers Howard N. Eavenson, W. W. Goldsmith and J. J. Moore, months after the men had become unemployed and ceased paying rent, it was stated.

J. W. Howard, of the Prestonsburg law firm of Howard & Mayo, attorneys for the receivers, was quoted as saying that "some of the families living in the company houses haven't paid any rent or utility bills for as long as two or three years, and the company couldn't continue paying upkeep when there was no income." He added that none of the heads of these families had worked for Elk Horn since August, but that some of them had continued living in the company's houses while actually working elsewhere.

A report received here Wednesday indicated that plight of the evicted miners may not be as sore as believed, since the West Virginia Unemployment Service had announced that mines around Logan had work for approximately 100 men. Those able to pass physical examinations may gain employment there.

Robert Hicks, chairman of the Wayland Local, United Mine Workers, said the Union had no funds to distribute among the unemployed miners. Almost all of them have received WPA relief in some form during recent weeks, it was said.

SAM STEPHENS DIES AT 80

WELL-KNOWN MAN IS PARALYSIS VICTIM

Samuel Stephens 80 years old, member of one of the county's best-known families, died at his home on Bull Creek Sunday night of paralysis.

Mr. Stephens was a native of this county, and had resided in the Middle Creek section until about six years ago when he moved to Water Gap. He had been a member of the United Baptist Church for 18 years and was one of the county's best citizens.

He was twice married—first to Miss Kate Coburn, after whose death he was married to Miss Rachel Bradley Wireman, who died a year ago. Surviving him are two daughters and one son: Mrs. Emma Coyer, Water Gap;

WHAT EVERY HIGH SCHOOL STUDENT SHOULD KNOW ABOUT TUBERCULOSIS

TUBERCULOSIS is probably as old as man. Positive proof of it has been found in Egyptian mummies and pre-Columbian Indians. Naturally it has not always been known as tuberculosis but has been given several names. Hippocrates, the father of medicine, called it phthisis, which means "wasting." Although tuberculosis continued its consumption of human lives down through the ages, little more was learned about it until Laennec, after he had performed post mortem examinations on tubercular patients, discovered how tubercles form and the damage they enact upon the lungs and other parts of the body. Other notable scientists, such as Villemin, Koch, and Trudeau added greatly to the meager knowledge of tuberculosis.

Boys and girls of high school age are particularly liable to contract tuberculosis. The high rate of the disease at this period is caused in part by over-activity. An enormous amount of energy is consumed by studying too hard and playing too hard in various activities. Plus this the boys and girls often get little sleep. Therefore, it is necessary for high school boys and girls to be particularly wary of tuberculosis.

Tuberculosis is caused by a minute germ called tubercle bacillus. Besides the human variety of bacillus, there are other types, one of which is the bovine, or cattle. The carrier in this case is milk from tubercular cows, but it is safe to drink milk that is pasteurized. The bacillus multiply with great rapidity in the tissues they invade. To combat these germs tiny cells move to the spot where the bacilli have lodged. They soon build a sort of shell, which is called a tubercle, around the germ. This shell renders the germs inactive.

The germ is spread in numerous ways. People, who have no regard for the health of others, spit carelessly on floors and sidewalks. Even though they may have no knowledge of it, germs may be in their sputum. These germs may be easily transmitted to the hands of children or blown about and breathed in by passers-by. Improperly washed dishes may have the germs of tuberculosis on them. The germs may be transmitted swiftly by means of direct contact with a person who has the disease.

A person in the early stages of tuberculosis may show no outward signs. After a person has had the germs for a while he may begin to feel tired and weak; he may have a little fever, and perspire freely at night. His appetite may be poor, and he may have some pain in his chest and shoulders. He may or may not have a cough or hoarseness, and he may notice blood in his mouth after coughing. Almost every case of tuberculosis differs in its symptoms from every other case, therefore if any of these signs appear a person should consult a doctor at once.

Getting fresh air and sunshine, taking daily exercises, getting plenty of sleep and rest, taking care of one's general health, having a health examination by a good doctor every year and keeping away from all cases of tuberculosis are rules to follow in preventing tuberculosis from getting into one's body.

Tuberculosis can be cured, but not by any medicine, vaccine, or mysterious trick. It is cured by absolute rest in bed, by good food, good nursing care, and most of all by explicit following of the doctor's orders. REST is the essence of treatment. The diseased lung may be rested by several methods. The most common is called pneumothorax, which is a process of collapsing the lung, thus leaving the lung at rest.

The treatment of tuberculosis may be carried out at home, but it is cured more accurately at a sanatorium. In a sanatorium everything has been planned for the one purpose of helping people conquer tuberculosis.

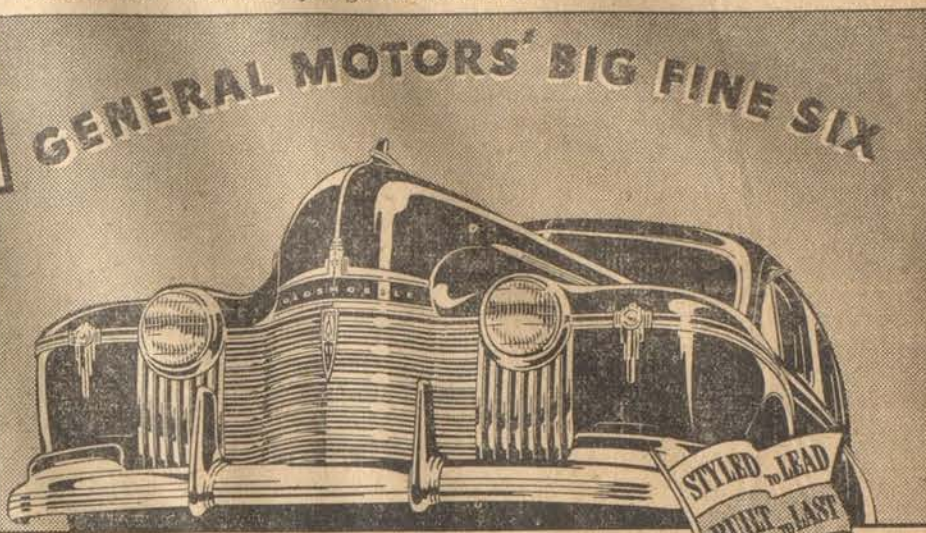

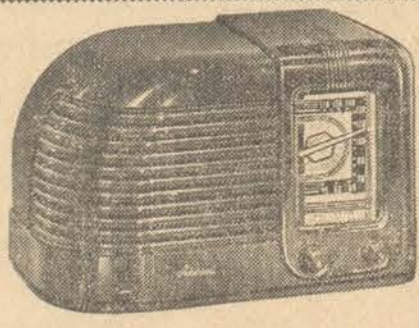

WE ALL SHOULD HELP

THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES is going to assume that none of its readers is so heartless that he or she would refuse a crippled child a dollar, if he or she knew that dollar was necessary to the treatment and possible cure of the child.

So it is going to use some of this space to explain a matter that will be brought to your attention between April 2 and April 13 during the Easter Seal sale of the Kentucky Society for Crippled Children.

A short time ago, you might have been asked to help in the drive for funds to fight infantile paralysis. You helped? Good.

But don't think, please, when you are asked for another contribution during the Easter Seal sale, that those who solicit you are doubling up on you. They are not.

The first fund was raised for the fight against infantile paralysis only. And infantile paralysis constitutes only around twenty per cent of the crippled cases in Kentucky needing help. Half of that first fund went to New York, so that research work can continue in the hope that the scourge of infantile paralysis can be eradicated.

But these funds to be sought next month are all used in Kentucky—for the benefit of every type of crippled child. Those who make the drive for funds in Floyd county will make it for Floyd county children who need expert care and treatment, so that

they may enjoy the buoyant health and freedom of movement Nature intended as childhood's heritage.

You can understand. If we contribute only to the infantile paralysis fight, what of those children whose limbs are twisted by other diseases, by congenital deformities or by accidents?

Right now, the Kentucky Crippled Children's Commission, official agency of the Society for Crippled Children, is trying to cure and thus re-make the lives of 86 Floyd county youngsters. Already, the Commission has helped 149 Floyd children at an average cost of \$272. That figures out a cool \$40,000!

Now, if we've made ourselves clear, we have no fear of any worthwhile Floyd county refusing to contribute to this worthy cause.

VICTIMS OF THE MACHINE

DISTRESSING as the mass eviction of unemployed coal miners' families in this county is, there should be no thoughtless censure of the coal company as the machine age claims its hapless victims.

The complete "behind-the-news" story of the unemployment of these men is not known to this newspaper; but what it does know is that the Elk Horn Coal Corporation and its receivers have found the same situation confronting them that other operators have met, or will meet.

That situation is simply this—the use of machines is reducing the demand for human labor.

And that is an economic problem that has perplexed the best minds in America. The solution lies in the future.

If Elk Horn were the only coal company to turn to mechanization, it would deserve public condemnation. But it is not, and it is in a highly competitive field of industry where the production methods of other companies must be matched if the company is to survive.

THE TIMES has an idea that, if all mines would go back to the old production methods with the competitive battle placed on an equal footing, the common working man would profit by a better distribution of employment and the operators by less of the over-supply of coal that weakens the market.

inch of top-soil, and that there is not more than eight inches of top-soil in a virgin forest. The muddy waters of our streams are heavily laden with this top-soil. In land cultivated in corn over 75 tons of soil is lost per year.

Muddy water kills the "smaller life" of the streams in which fish live. If soil erosion can be checked on our hills it will help our streams. Rivers and creeks overflow their banks because their channels are filled with eroded soil.

We have thousands of acres of idle land, unfit for anything except to grow trees, yet these lands are idle—unplanted, uncared for, useless to everyone except another acre to pay taxes on. If we could procure a lowered tax rate on land planted in trees, it would help prevent them being cut for timber.

The more land we have in timber (young or old), the more cover we will have for wildlife, the less erosion we will have and the more continuous flow of water for our streams. All of which will help both the hunter and the angler.

Trees cannot prevent a flood, but the damage of a flood can be lessened by conserving our trees. Fire destroys trees and leaf mold on the ground. It destroys the low-growing berry bushes on which quail feed during the winter. It destroys the natural habitat of the animal. When the food, shelter and habitat of the animal are destroyed, it has no alternative but to leave or die. That, I believe, is responsible for the destruction of our birds and rabbits.

When our coal, oil and gas is gone there will be nothing left for the Eastern Kentuckian to do but return to the soil. The frontiers of the world are closed. There are no rich western lands to be taken up by homesteaders. We must conserve our soil. Civilizations have disappeared, due to the neglect of the soil.

At one time an overflow of the stream nearby meant that the surrounding land would be enriched by two or three inches of good loam. Not so today. When the creek goes down, we find a bar of white sand where once was good, rich soil. Most of the top-soil on the hills is gone and will never be replaced.

Hi School Seniors Given Skin Tests; Clinic, April 2

Skin-testing of all Floyd county high school seniors is being made by the Floyd County Health Department, preparatory to the tuberculosis x-ray clinic to be held here April 2 by Dr. John B. Floyd, director of the bureau of tuberculosis, State Board of Health.

Dr. Marvin Ransdell, director of the county health department, said last week that the tests have been completed in Martin, Maytown, Garrett and Wayland high schools where there are approximately 125 seniors. Of those submitting to the tests, approximately 15 percent are reactors, he said. Other schools will be visited this month.

The high school seniors have been selected for these tests because they are at the age at which the incidence of the malady is highest, Dr. Ransdell stated. In Kentucky last year, it is pointed out, 1,200 young women and men, either high school seniors or recent graduates, died of tuberculosis, and so the state board of health program with this group was initiated.

The clinic to be conducted here is sponsored by the Woman's Club and the Floyd County Tuberculosis Association in co-operation with the county health department.

Dr. Ransdell emphasized the fact that any others who desire x-ray examination are to be welcomed at the clinic. Cost of such examination is \$1.25.

State To Award Left Middle Creek Road Contract

Construction of the Left Middle Creek road leading to the mining center to be located on Lick fork will be done by contractors for the State Highway Commission rather than the Works Progress Administration, it was announced last week.

The WPA had already begun work on the route, but the change was decided upon in order to hasten completion of the project.

Contract on the work will be awarded early next month, it was stated.

Judge Orders Release Of Jehovah's Witnesses

Pikeville, Ky., March 18—Circuit Judge Monroe Fields said he would enter in writing for the record Monday an oral opinion in which he declared void a Pikeville ordinance prohibiting the dissemination of religious literature within the city.

The court submitted the ruling in directing the release of three members of the Jehovah's Witnesses sect who had appealed a municipal court conviction.

The opinion said the ordinance as written affected all religious denominations and the distribution of all religious literature, including Sunday School lessons and the like, and that it "therefore transgressed on the constitutional rights of the citizens of Pikeville."

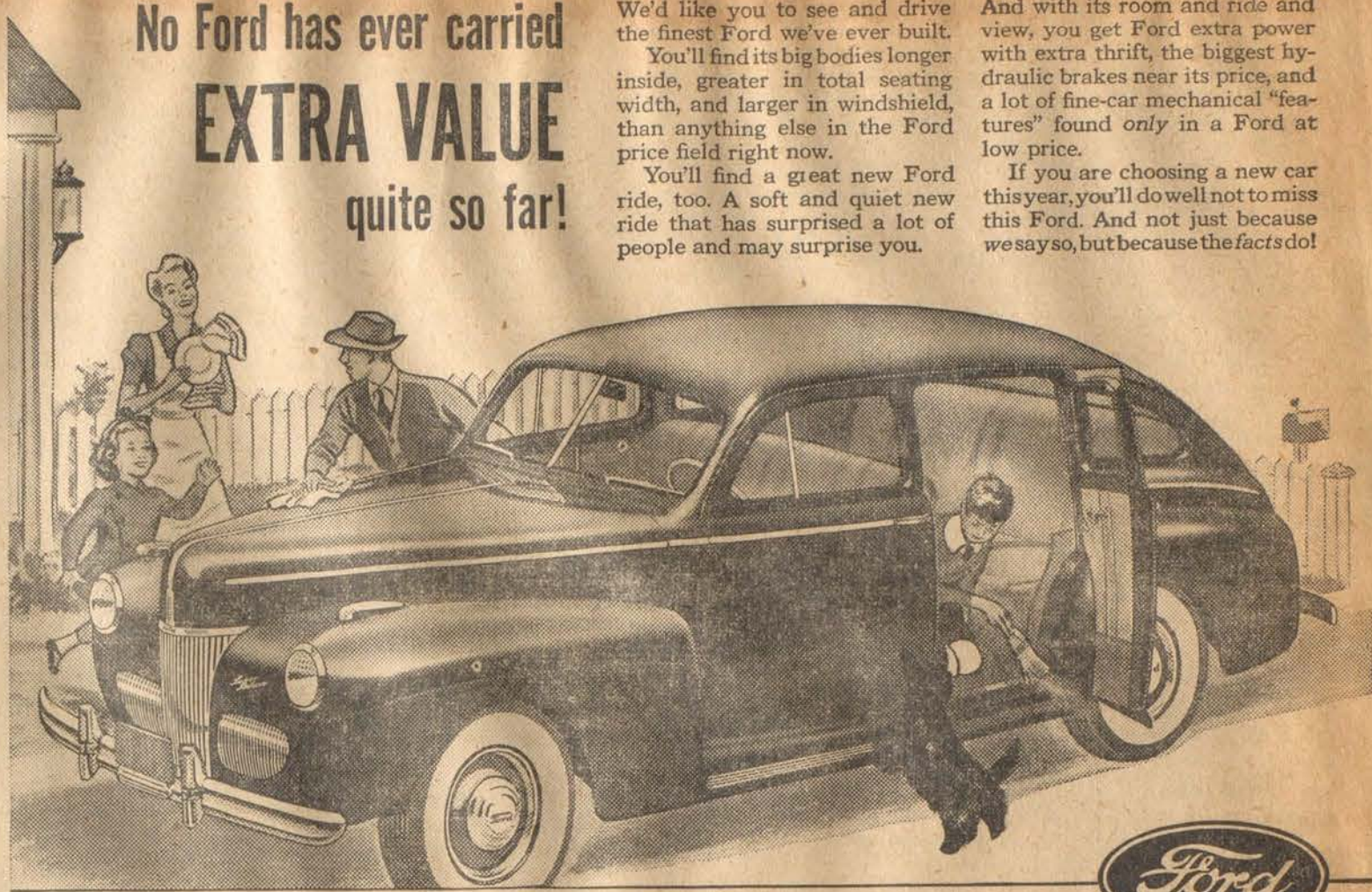

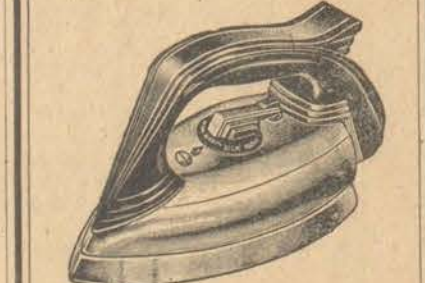
