POLL OFFICERS ARE SELECTED FOR PRIMARY

FIVE WOMEN NAMED IN LIST OF 212 OFFICIALS

The 207 men and five women who will serve as election officers in the county's 53 polling places at the August primary were announced late Saturday.

The poll officials were named by Election Commissioners W. W. Cooley, B. L. Sturgill and J. O. Webb. The list follows: Prestonsburg, No. 1—M. D. Powers, judge; Harvey Howard, Sheriff; W. J. May, clerk; Lee May, judge.

CARTER KILLED IN COLLISION

EIGHT OTHERS HURT AS TRUCK, TAXI IN CRASH

Clyde C. Carter, 49 years old, Northern taxi driver, was instantly killed and eight other persons were injured Saturday night when his taxi and a truck collided, head-on, at a curve seven miles from Sandy Hook.

Seven of the eight injured were passengers in the Carter taxi. They are Mrs. Carter, Keith Allen Maynard, grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Carter, Mrs. Evelyn Withrow and five children, of Dayton, Ohio. Ova Ferguson, Relief, Ky., driver of the truck, suffered a crushed chest.

Mrs. Carter and grandson were taken to the Paintsville hospital, where it was said Wednesday that both will recover. Her left arm and right clavicle were broken. The child's thigh was fractured. The five Withrow children and Ferguson were taken to a Lexington hospital. Mrs. Withrow, a former resident of Garrett, was taken to the home in Morehead of her father, Melvin Hamm.

Mr. Carter was born and reared at Fallsburg, Lawrence county, and was the son of Mrs. Ruby Holt Carter, of Louisa, and the late George Burton Carter. He moved from Lawrence county to Beaver Creek 20 years ago and for 18 years was employed as a mine foreman at

A large crowd attended the all-day meeting of the Floyd County Fish & Game Club at Warco Sunday.

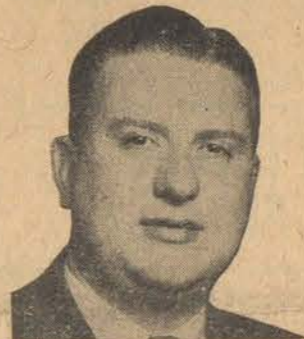

SPECIAL PROBE INTO ELECTION THREATENED

VOTERS, CANDIDATES GIVEN WARNING BY JUDGE

Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., this week in printed circulars issued a warning to candidates, election workers, voters and election officers that a special session of the grand jury of the Floyd circuit court will be empaneled to investigate any irregularities at the polls during the August primary.

The circular, titled "Warning," cites the duties of election officers and asks that interested citizens at the polls watch the proceedings and take notice in writing of election law violations. Also cited was the presence on the voter-registration list of the names of 2,000 or more persons who have died, moved out of the county or joined the country's armed forces. This list of ineligible is the result of the purgation board's failure to remove them from the registration lists, the statement said.

No Absentee Voting

Members of the country's military forces and all others outside the state will not be qualified voters at the August primary, since Kentucky has no absentee-voter law, it was learned here this week. One thousand or more voters from this county are now in the army, navy or air corps.

"Election officers," Judge Stephens said, "should thoroughly inspect each ballot box in which ballots are to be deposited for the purpose of detecting any voted ballots which may have already been deposited therein, and when the polls close there should be enough interested people to follow the boxes to the courthouse to see that no tampering is done to the ballots after the closing of the polls. There will be enough good people, I am sure, standing around the voting places who will observe and take notice in writing of any violations committed

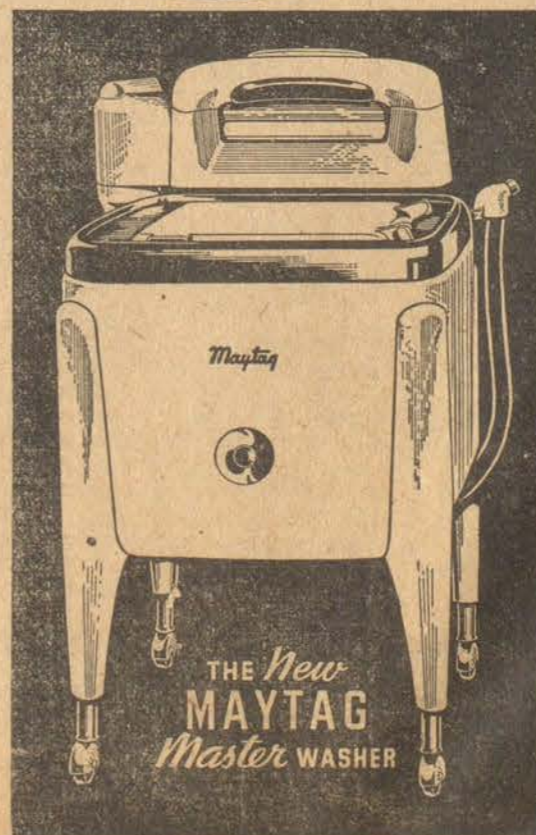

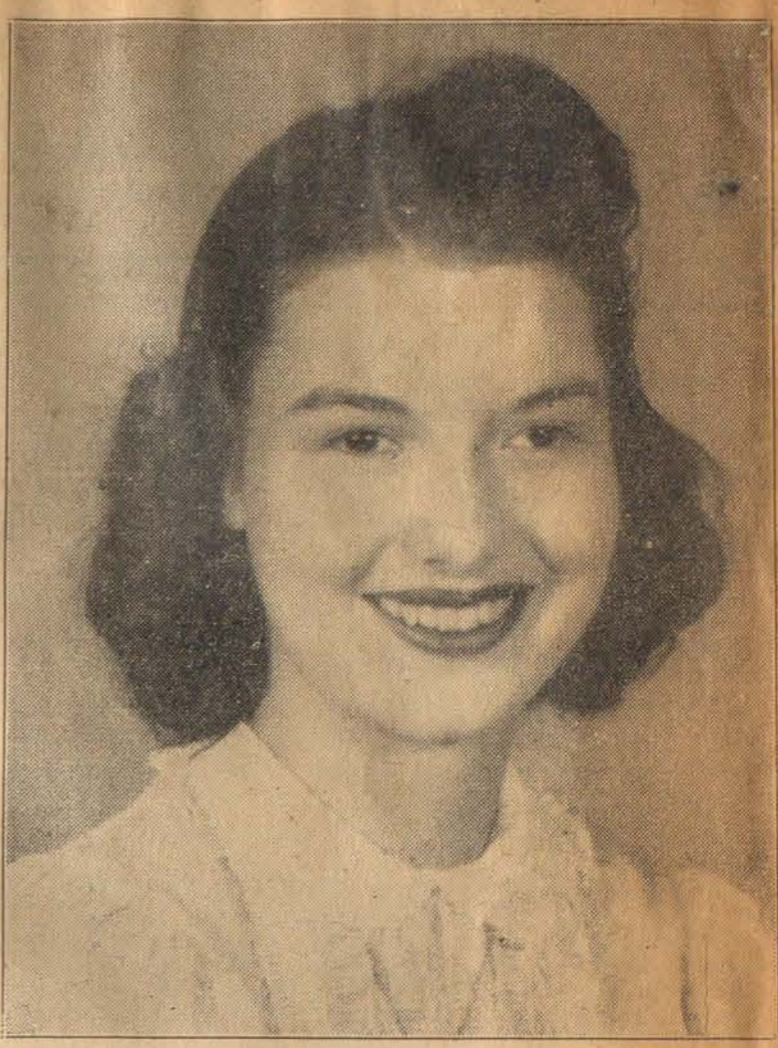
Floyd Countian Turns No-Bridge Handicap To Own Profit
