## CLINIC HERE TO BENEFIT CRIPPLES

OF FOUR COUNTIES IN THIS SECTION, AUGUST 7TH

Arrangements are practically complete for the free clinic planned by the Kentucky Crippled Children Commission to examine physically handicapped children in four counties, according to Miss Vera P. Pool, Ashland, the Commission's field nurse in the Big Sandy area. The clinic will be held in the high school building, Prestonsburg, on Thursday, August 7, and is for the benefit of cases in Floyd, Johnson, Martin and Magoffin counties.

Dr. M. D. Garred, Ashland, will be in charge of examinations and diagnosis. Cases in need of treatment may file application with the Commission's nurses and will be admitted later to the Ashland hospital, where the Commission maintains a ward for crippled boys and girls. The clinic will begin at 8:30 a. m.

## SECRET LETTERS!

## TRACE THEFTS TO FLOYD

### NORTH CAROLINIANS UNCOVER EVIDENCE AT GARRETT

Trail of automobile tire thieves led this week from Mitchell county, N. C., to Garrett, this county, as residents of the Floyd county town told of Frank Pittman disposing, there and elsewhere in the Beaver Creek section, a portion of the \$1,200 worth of tires he is alleged to have stolen in North Carolina within the last few months.

Ed Woody, Garrett truckdriver, and a brother-in-law of Pittman, told County Attorney W. Claude Caudill of Pittman's activities in disposing of the tires on two trips into this county. He said that Pittman is a resident of North Carolina, and named Lewis Sullins as a companion of Pittman.

Sheriff I. H. Woody, of Mitchell county, N. C., accompanied by D. O. Blevins, Gulf products distributor, and A. F. Arnold, Standard Oil Company representative, joined Floyd authorities in the investigation which began in North Carolina several months ago.

Woody, who was arrested Tuesday by Deputy Sheriff Tom James and Garrett police, denied any complicity in the thievery. It was said that he may be released. The North Carolina Sheriff wired authorities of his state to arrest Pittman, who is believed to have returned there.

## SLONE FREED IN SLAYING OF TAYLOR

### PEACE WRIT NAMES DRIFT SLAYER AND KIN

Shortly after Dolliver Slone, 35, was released Tuesday under \$5,000 bond in the slaying at Drift Saturday afternoon of Levi Taylor, 25-year-old miner, a peace warrant for his re-arrest was issued on the statement of Mrs. Evelyn Taylor, mother of the victim.

The peace warrant also named Mrs. Pert Slone, wife of the slayer, and her father, Joe Hall, as having joined Slone in threatening members of the Taylor family.

Slone surrendered to officers Monday and was brought here where he was held under guard but not in jail till bond was executed Tuesday afternoon.

He claimed that he shot Taylor after the latter had beaten Mrs. Slone and as Taylor later advanced upon him, armed with a knife, outside Ernest Turner's restaurant where the trouble started. He was quoted by Sheriff's deputies as saying that his first two shots were fired into the ground in an effort to stop Taylor's advance.

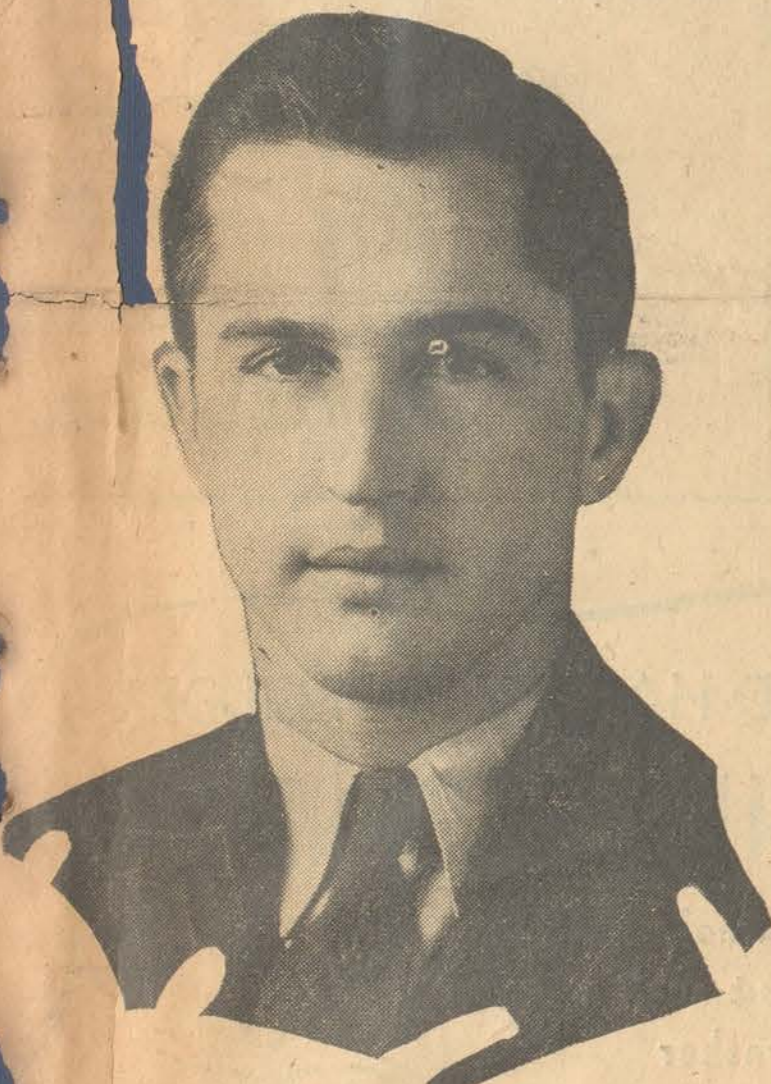
Others claimed that Taylor, after striking the woman during an argument inside the restaurant, was leaving the building to go home when the shooting began. They contended that the victim was unarmed and that Mrs. Slone told her husband to shoot. This version of the shooting said that Slone's first bullet missed Taylor, passing through Bob Salisbury's shirt.

Three of Slone's bullets entered Taylor's body in the region of the heart, but he walked ahead toward Slone, finally falling as he grasped his slayer's hair.

Surviving Taylor are his mother, two brothers, Chester and Charles; five sisters, Bonnie, Maxine, Joan, Ruth and Betty Jean. The funeral was conducted Monday afternoon

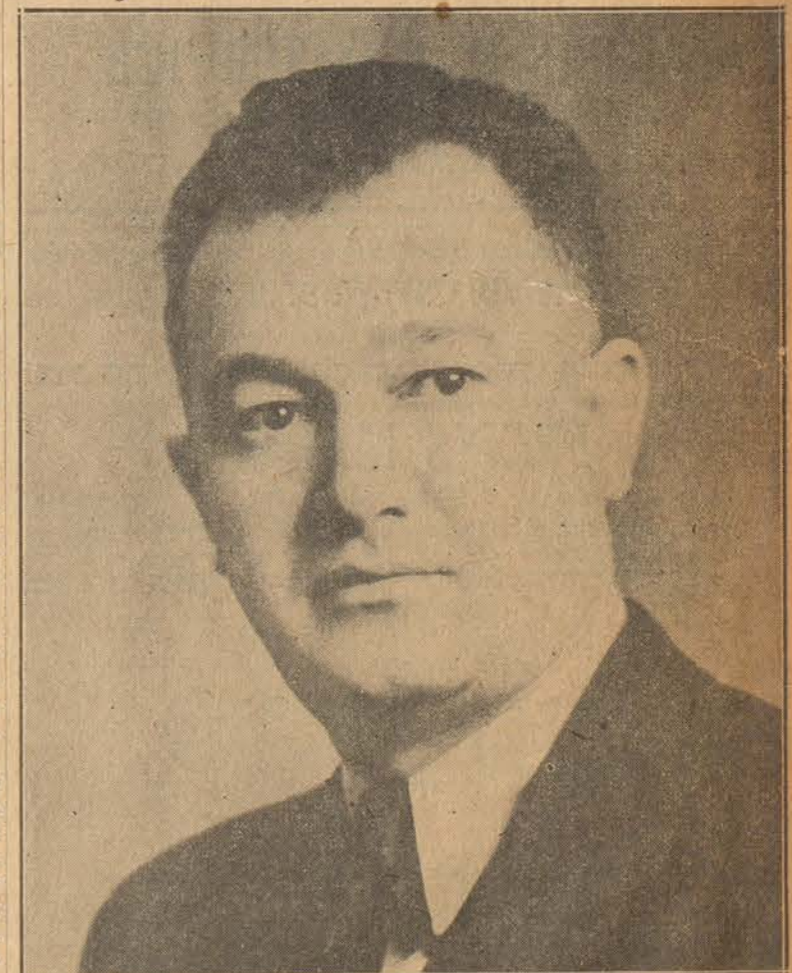

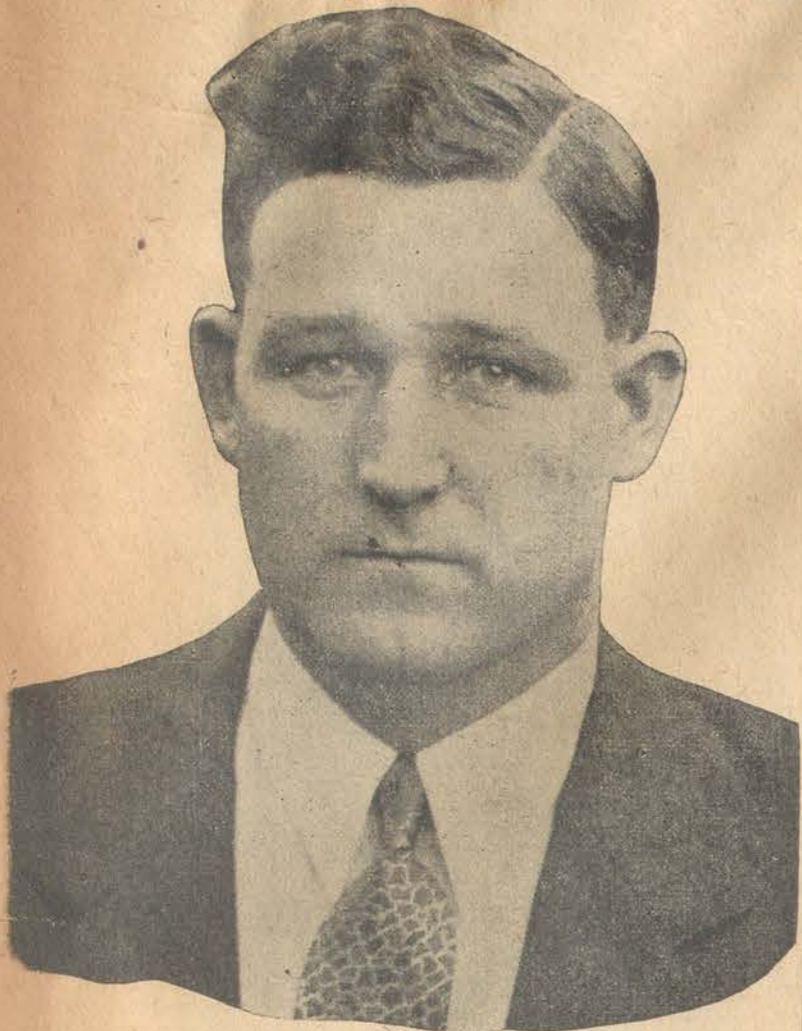

**Mayo School Places 194 Students In Jobs**

The Mayo State Vocational School has placed 194 students in permanent employment within the last year. The greatest percentage of these trainees have gone into industries, essential to the national defense; others, in private employment.

Of the eight National Defense Training Centers in the state, the Mayo School ranks first in the percentage of placements. The school has been able to place every trainee who has successfully completed a course.

A. L. Pigman, director of the school, recently said, "The demand for trained workers is becoming more acute every day as more defense industries begin production on defense orders."

Every class at the school has a waiting list, except three-day programs.

**Farm Women Crowd Defense Program**

The interest of farm women in national defense is revealed in the attendance at meetings held by county home demonstration agents in Kentucky in the last month or two.

Reports summarized at the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics show that 35,028 Kentucky women attended 2,134 meetings held to discuss general problems of national defense. Attendance at 1,387 meetings to discuss nutrition totaled 49,293 women. Consideration was given to home food production, including gardens, dairy and poultry production, canning and storage. One thousand and forty-two meetings were held to consider the production of more food for Britain.

In addition to the women attending these defense meetings, thousands of homemakers were reached with letters and informational material mailed by county home demonstration agents.

# HELEN HAYES IS ABOUT TO PLAY FAIRY GODMOTHER TO A YOUNG BREATHITT COUNTY CINDERELLA

(J. Howard Henderson tells in The Courier-Journal the Cinderella story of a Breathitt county girl, student and protegee of David Donoho. As an art instructor, Mr. Donoho, son of Dr. L. A. Donoho, of Wayland, this county, has gained wide recognition. Mr. Henderson's story follows:)

MY WIFE told me the other day about a girl she knew in the freshman class at Breathitt county high school four years ago, and the interesting story of an unusual opportunity that has come to the girl.

The story has for its characters the girl, Ethel Craft, who lived 18 miles up Troublesome Creek from Jackson; youthful David Donoho, teacher of arts and dramatics; Mrs. Helen Little, English instructor who is a teacher in the real sense of the word, and Actress Helen Hayes.

Perhaps it was because a Guidance Program was being followed at Breathitt high and David Donoho and Helen Little were teaching there, for certainly the work

at Breathitt High is more closely tied into the lives of the pupils than in most high schools in Kentucky. This situation, I think, brought Ethel Craft the opportunity she otherwise would have missed.

My wife remembers Ethel as over-inclined to giggle in a diffident, shy way, as if she were uncertain of herself, being a freshman and from far back in the country. But in a school play that year Ethel began to show more talent than was common to her classmates.

Mr. Donoho sought to interest Ethel Craft in the career and accomplishments of Helen Hayes. Two years ago he thought Ethel should see Helen Hayes act, and he and Mrs. Little took the girl to Cincinnati. Miss Hayes' father died that day, the performance was cancelled and the trio returned to Jackson.

One day last January Ethel asked Mrs. Little if she heard Miss Hayes the previous Sunday night, remarking that she did not think Miss Hayes was as good then as she had been the Sunday before. Mrs. Lit-

tle knew the Crafts did not have a radio, and a little questioning brought out that Ethel had been paying her little brother to walk two and one-half miles with her every Sunday night to a neighbor's where she could listen to Miss Hayes' program.

Mr. Donoho wrote Miss Hayes the story and Miss Hayes wrote back that she would appear in Cincinnati in March and would like to talk with Ethel Craft. Mr. Donoho was more excited than Ethel Craft, when, considerably diffident, he, Mrs. Little, Robert Van Horn, principal of Breathitt High, and Ethel Craft left for Cincinnati in March to meet Miss Hayes. He was quite an impetuous fellow, I hear, as he used doormen, taxi drivers and secretaries to hurry the admission of his party to Helen Hayes' presence.

Miss Hayes spent an hour talking to Ethel Craft, had their tickets changed for better ones, and saw them again after the performance. Then Ethel went back to her daily routine of walking two and one-half miles every day to catch the school bus to ride six-

teen miles to school, and reversing the order to get home. She graduated, in June, as honor student of Breathitt High.

Then Ethel Craft went to Ohio to do housework for a family on a farm near Cincinnati. She rode a train for the first time in her life Friday a week ago. Helen Hayes wired her the money to come to New York, where she put Ethel in a summer playhouse at Suffern. This fall Miss Hayes will finance Ethel Craft's first year of regular college work.

So there has come to Ethel Craft an opportunity that few girls in her circumstances are given. If she has in her what it takes, the door has been opened to her. David Donoho and Helen Little think she has. They say she has some degree of talent, is a fine, unspoiled girl with a head that will not be easily turned by the favors that will come to her. For my part I hope that Ethel Craft makes wholly good, for Helen Hayes and Dave Donoho and Helen Little will be almost as disappointed as Ethel Craft if she fails to grasp the one big opportunity of her life.

## 372 MINE WORKER INJURIES RECORDED IN THIS SECTION, FIRST HALF OF YEAR

During the first six months of 1941, 372 workmen were injured, nine fatally, in and around mines of the Big Sandy-Elkhorn field, A. D. Sisk, secretary of the section's mine institute, reported at the group's monthly meeting Friday evening at Pikeville.

The report indicates that not a single mine in the field is without an accident, but that six mines have reported but one mishap. Probably the best record was given by the Elk Horn Coal Corporation Mine No. 4, which produced 103,172 tons of coal during the period with but one accident.

Of the nine fatalities, four occurred during the month of June.

Place Defense Needs Above Personal Aims, Says Guaranty Survey

All loyal citizens—workers and employees, public officials and private individuals—are called upon to compose their differences and subordinate their personal aims to the nation's defense needs, states the Guaranty Trust Company of New York in discussing some of the effects of the "unlimited emergency" on American business in the current issue of The Guaranty Survey, its monthly review of business and financial conditions in the United States and abroad.

The President's proclamation of a state of "unlimited" national emergency marked the beginning of a new phase of the defense effort, The Survey continues. It brought to an end the period of peacetime military preparations and inaugurated an era of immediate preparedness to resist attempts at hostile encroachment of the Western Hemisphere. The menace to our security is now officially recognized as not potential but actual. Internally, the country is brought face to face with "cold, hard facts." It is essential, therefore, that businessmen recognize the significance of these facts fully and promptly.

The experience of the twelve months, during which the defense program has been under way shows very clearly what some of the facts are. There can no longer be any thought of a defense program superimposed on the normal peacetime business structure, with comparatively little disturbance to the latter. Stoppage of defense production by industrial disputes must be prevented. All individuals and groups must be prepared to submit to closer government restrictions on economic life. Considerations of present sacrifice and subsequent reaction must be dismissed for the duration of the emergency. For practical business purposes, the nation may henceforth be regarded as virtually in the war basis, and business affairs must be conducted from now on with this fundamental fact constantly in mind.

HOW WILL THE DEFENSE PROGRAM AFFECT MOTOR VEHICLE OWNERSHIP AND OPERATION?

AUTOMOBILE PRODUCTION OUTLOOK—No one can definitely say today what the production schedule of automobiles for 1942 will be. However, we do know that there will be very drastic curtailment beginning in August of this year. Already the Office of Production Management has reached an agreement with the automobile manufacturers that the 1942 models will be 20 per cent under that of 1941. In the meantime, however, the Army and Navy have requested a further reduction in passenger car and truck production. It is now apparent that further curtailment will be necessary partly because of shortage of critical materials and partly because it is necessary to devote our resources of management, technicians, skilled workers and machine tools increasingly to the defense program.

REASONS—in the main, the necessity for shifting men and machines from normal operations to defense production; the shortage of materials that go into the manufacture of the automobile; the desire of the government to limit purchases of consumer goods, the production of which is in competition with defense products; and the objective of leaving as much money as possible for the payment of taxes and the purchase of defense bonds.

The Kentucky Nutrition Committee for national defense is issuing a call to every county in the state to form volunteer committees, enlisting the active aid of local leaders to assist in a "health and nutrition" program. This announcement was made before 300 members and guests at the annual meeting of the Kentucky Dietetic Association recently, by Dr. Statie Erikson, head of the University of Kentucky home economics department and chairman of the committee.

The county committees will have special functions, as follows:

To collect and disseminate data on the relation between diet and health.

Evaluate and steadily improve the school lunch program.

Survey county nutrition needs.

Assume responsibility for all local needs and situations.

In a long-term defense program for America, it is necessary to have all the people well-nourished and strong, says the home economics leader. Nutrition should be improved approximately 33 per cent or one-third, she adds. By a decisive local community and county program, "improved nutrition can be made a strong arm of national defense," it is concluded.


