





Ways To Spread Meat Allowance

Planning the family's part in the share-the-meat campaign is a challenge to every homemaker. To get in step with meat-sharing is patriotic, it is fair and it will help in the effort for victory

Farmers who butcher meat for home use and those who buy from farmers for storage in freezer lockers are expected to take part just as much as those who go to the meat market every day. For all, the allowance is three-fourths of a pound of veal, pork, beef or lamb for a child under six years of age, one and one-half pounds for each child from six to 12, and two and one-half pounds for a person over 12. "Bone in" is included in this allowance

To get the most from the meat allowed, home economists at the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics make these suggestions: 1. Keep raw meat in the coldest part of the refrigerator or in the coldest storage place available, which should be 45 degrees or lower. 2. Ground meat spoils more quickly than meat in one piece; use it soon, 3. Cook meat with moderate heat to make it tender, save food value, and have more to serve. 4 Browning meat develops a rich flavor, but it may cause shrinkage.




