The J. B. Dick & Co. 5c to \$1 stores in Prestonsburg, Pikeville, Paintsville, Whitesburg, Campbellsville, Lebanon, Ky., and Williamson, W. Va., were purchased last week from J. B. Dick & Company by R. H. Hobbs, Pikeville, who previously was one-third owner.

The Pikeville store was the first of this group and was opened Nov. 1, 1923, under the management of Mr. Hobbs. The other six of the group were an outgrowth of that store.

The buying and executive offices of these stores, which has always been in Pikeville, will remain there. There will be no change in the policies under the new ownership which will be known as R. H. Hobbs Co. 5c to \$1 Stores, as Mr. Hobbs has always been in full control of this group and the present policies are his.

As soon as practicable store signs will be changed to the name of the new owner.

# FLOYD MAN GUN VICTIM

Police Say Slayer  
Seriously Stabbed;  
Hamilton Killed

Body of Duran Hamilton, 24 years old, who was shot and killed Wednesday night, last week, at Rising Sun, Md., arrived here Saturday and was taken by the Arnold Funeral Home to the victim's former home at Teaberry for burial.

Hamilton, an employee of the Triumph Explosives Co., Elkton, Md., died almost instantly of .22-caliber pistol bullet wounds in the left side of his chest and side. His alleged slayer, Levi Reynolds, 19, Conowingo, Md., was seriously stabbed during the affray which took place in front of a tavern.

The tragedy followed a celebration by Hamilton and others of the return from overseas service of his brother, Pfc. Thomas Hamilton. Reynolds and Hamilton are believed to have disagreed when they met at another place, shortly before the killing, though relatives said Hamilton told them at the time there was no trouble. They said they were preparing to leave the scene of the shooting when Reynolds, following them, arrived.

The slayer was under state police guard at a hospital, and authorities said Hamilton's knife was used in Reynolds' stabbing. Reynolds was a native of Maryland.

Surviving Hamilton are his father, S. Hamilton, now of Conowingo, Md.; Dennis Hamilton, Conowingo; J. D. Hamilton, Teaberry; Marie Teague, Colors, Md.; Thomas Hamilton of the army; C. Rakes, Rising Sun, Md.; Robert T. Fitzpatrick, Lima, W. Va.; Anna Hamilton, Jay Lee, Jake and Denzil Hamilton, all of Md.

Funeral rites were conducted at the graveside in the family cemetery at Teaberry, the Revs. W. B. Hamilton, John Hamilton, Isaac and Milford Adams officiating.

# HOWELL SHOT IN ARGUMENT WITH COUSIN

Left Beaver Man  
Expected To Die;  
Mosely in Jail

An argument over which of the two had during the day bought the most beer is said to have resulted in the shooting late Monday afternoon at Clear Creek of Frank Howell, 30 years old, of Dony, by his cousin and neighbor, Bailey Mosely, 36.

Howell's condition was said at the Martin General hospital Wednesday to be serious. Mosely's bullet passed through his abdomen.

Mosely was jailed here Tuesday morning. Constable Willie Johnson quoted him as saying he was drunk and "did not know what happened." The officer said the wounded man had declared he was shot without cause.

The cousins, both of whom reside on the head of Frasure's Creek, Left Beaver, had gone to Clear Creek Monday morning to work at clearing right-of-way for the Kentucky & West Virginia Power Co. Rain prevented them from working, so they started drinking beer, the constable said he was told.

Shortly before the shot which struck Howell was fired, his father-in-law, Bart Gayheart, sought to snatch Mosely's revolver, himself was shot through the hand and ran. As he fled the scene he heard another shot, saw his son-in-law fall to the ground.

The wounded man is a son of Floyd Howell, is married and has three children.

# LEFT BEAVER STORE LOOTED

Four Youths Held  
In Clear Creek  
Store Breaks

Four Left Beaver Creek youths were jailed here this week, charged with two separate breaks into the commissary of the Clear Branch Mining Company at Ligon.

In jail are Cecil Newsome and Clyde Vance, both of whom are said to have registered for selective service, and who admitted to County Judge E. P. Hill they forced entrance to the store a few weeks ago. For their release \$1,000 appearance bond and \$500 peace bond was asked. Judge Hill said Tuesday that school records reveal the youths are under 18.

Jailed for the latest break into the store which was made Saturday night were Kenneth Yates and Lloyd Mitchell, whose ages were given as 14. They were arrested by Deputy Constable Moore.

Also in jail here on a storehouse-breaking charge is Tony Buckanovich, a veteran court character who formerly appeared here under the name of Tony Cragg. He was jailed Sunday by Constable Rich Hall on a charge of breaking and entering Earl Castle's store at Estill. He waived examining trial and was held in jail in default of \$1,000 bond for his grand jury appearance.

# INLAND STEEL TO MATCH AID

Given Red Cross  
By Mineworkers;  
Drive Under Way

Area Red Cross headquarters announced in Alexandria, Va., Wednesday that the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright had guaranteed it will match, dollar for dollar, contributions made by its employees. The company has approximately 1,500 employees at Wheelwright. The Alexandria dispatch said mine local union representatives in Lexington recently voted that each miner contribute to the Red Cross drive a day's wages.

The national drive for Red Cross funds was launched March 1 by a proclamation from President Roosevelt and plans for a speedy campaign to reach Floyd county's \$22,500 quota were completed here.

As the drive for special gifts from the larger donors was begun March 1, it was announced that the draft had upset Red Cross organization plans. Walter Scott Harkins, Prestonsburg, who was first named to head the drive, has been inducted into the armed forces. After that, his brother, J. D. Harkins, Jr., was named to succeed him. This week, J. D. Harkins was obliged to resign the post, County Attorney W. W. Burchett winding up with the chairmanship.

As the drive begins mine-locals of the county already are subscribing their quotas. What the non-union folks will do remains to be seen.

# OPA To Check Gasoline Coupons Beginning Monday, March 1st

Beginning the week of March 6, OPA investigators will conduct a nation-wide spot check of gasoline coupons in the possession of motorists to determine if they are properly endorsed, the Lexington district OPA office announced this week.

The purpose of the check, OPA enforcement officials explained, is to eliminate black markets in gasoline, so that every motorist may be assured of receiving his fair share. The check will prove a protection to the motorist, the dealer and the supplier, these officials asserted.

The check will be made at representative service stations and perhaps at some parking lots. No motorist will be stopped while driving and asked to show his coupons, OPA officials said.

Each gasoline ration coupon must have the car license number and the name of the gate in which the car was registered written on it. The investigator will ask to see all coupons in the motorist's possession. If all are not endorsed, the investigator will hand the motorist a notice directing him to appear before his local War Price and Rationing Board within 10 days.

If, when he goes before the Board, the coupons have been properly endorsed, the matter will end there. If not, a notice of violation will be issued which will result in the cancellation of some of the driver's coupons, the officials stated.

The drive will continue for four weeks.

Tuberculosis Claims

A long illness of tuberculosis ended here Saturday in the death at his home of Joseph Jarrell, 57 years old, veteran teacher in the Floyd county school system.

Born and reared on Bull Creek, near here, Mr. Jarrell was a son of the late William and Maria Elizabeth Hignite Jarrell. He began his teaching career in 1905, and as a result of a lifetime of work old students and friends resided in all parts of the county. Except for the term of County Superintendent Harry N. Cooley during which he was employed as assistant, Mr. Jarrell continued his work in the classroom. Shortly before his final illness he was in the insurance business here. For his ability as a teacher and his high qualities as a citizen he held the respect of all who knew him.

# ALMOST 500 FLOYD MEN TO REPORT

To Submit to Exams  
For Armed Forces  
At Huntington

Floyd county's largest contingent of potential fighting men—almost 500 of them—leaves here next week for pre-induction examination at Huntington, W. Va.

Draft Board 44 has notified its group of selectees to appear here Monday morning, March 6, and those from Board 45 will leave here Wednesday morning, March 8.

The March pre-induction call cut deeply into the ranks of business and professional men of the county. In Prestonsburg, a half-dozen or more business men were called by Board 44.

Included in the Board 45 list are Curtis Owens, principal of the Garrett consolidated school, Boone Hall, principal of Wayland schools, and H. H. Vincent, brother of Congressman B. M. Vincent, and Martin high school athletic coach.

Re-classification of men 18 to 26 years old given occupational deferments is a new task of draft boards, since President Roosevelt has pointed to the critical shortage of men for the armed forces, and little relief from heavy draft demands was seen here for next month.

Cottrell's courage, coolness and devotion to duty in the face of grave danger were an inspiration to the men of the company and are a credit to the armed forces of the United States."

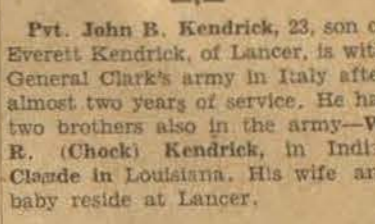

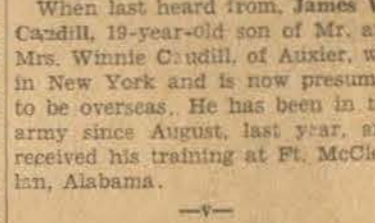

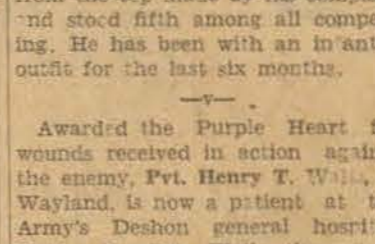
O. Clark W. F. Clark

**Navy Needs Officers, Procurement Office States**

"An urgent need for general duty officers has prompted the navy to consider commission applications of exceptionally qualified men between the ages of 35 and 38," Lieut. Commander Hugh Macmillan, officer in charge of the St. Louis office of naval officer procurement, announced last week. Heretofore, only men between ages 19 and 35 years of age were considered for general duty commissions.

Commander Macmillan emphasized, however, that any man past 35 who wishes to be considered must be particularly outstanding and able to meet even the most professional, physical and educational requirements for the general duty classification. This includes at least two years of successful college work and five years' progressively successful business or professional experience.

Physically, a candidate must be of normal good health, with an acuity of 15/20 uncorrected vision in each eye.

THE WEEK IN OPA

Endorse Gasoline Coupons

To eliminate black marketing in gasoline, OPA is requiring all gasoline coupon holders to endorse coupons as soon as they receive them.

The motorist must write the license number and state in which the car was registered on each coupon, and this must be done with ink or with an indelible pencil.

When a new automobile license number is obtained, it is unnecessary to re-indorse each coupon, but the old number must be cancelled from the cover of the ration book and the new number written in with ink or indelible pencil.

During the week of March 6, OPA will make a check of all gasoline coupons in the possession of motorists to see that they are properly endorsed. Failure to have every coupon endorsed is a ground for revoking gasoline rations.

Investigation of the 16 gasoline stations in Lexington last week by the District Enforcement Officers revealed that only one coupon was not endorsed according to the regulations when attached to the gummed sheet. This denotes a marked improvement in the handling of these ration documents by the holders.

The New Token Plan

The new streamlined food ration plan, effective Feb. 27, greatly simplifies food shopping, both for the housewife and the storekeeper. All red and blue stamps in Ration Book Four have the same point value—10 points each. Tokens valued at one point each will be given as change when a transaction does not come out even. Blue stamps will be used for the purchase of processed foods; red stamps for the purchase of meats, fats, oils, etc.

Shopping with 10 point stamps and using one-point tokens as change is the equivalent of using dimes as money and pennies as change. It is as simple as that.

Fruits, Vegetables Ceilings Set

The Lexington District Office this week issued an order setting flat community prices on the following list of fresh fruits and vegetables: apples, 11c per pound; bananas, 14c; cabbage, 6c; California table grapes, 20c; onions, 9c, 9 1/2c and 11c, depending on size; Florida oranges, 11c; Florida grapefruit, 10c; Iceberg lettuce, 5 dozen size, 15c, and 4 dozen size, 18c; potatoes all U.S. No. 1, 8c, and commercial grades, 5c or 5 pounds for 23c.

These prices are effective in all the counties of the Lexington District, which comprises Central and Eastern Kentucky, except Boyd, Campbell, Kenton and Fayette, where ceilings previously have been set. These prices will be revised at regular intervals.

Sugar for Canning

Because there is some misunderstanding regarding the sugar stamp for home canning, OPA has issued the following clarifying statements: (1) The stamp to be used for buying sugar for home canning is sugar stamp 40—not spare stamp 40. (2) Sugar stamp 40 for home canning is good for one full year—thru Feb. 1945. It does not expire at the end of this month.

Blue 10-point stamps A8, B8, C8, D8 and E8 in Ration Book Four may be used for processed foods from Feb. 27 through May 20. Green stamps K, L and M in the same ration book may be used for processed foods from Feb. 27 through March 20. Blue tokens and one-point stamps may be used as change.

Meats, Cheese, Butter, Fats, Canned Fish, Canned Milk

Red stamps A8, B8 and C8 in Ration Book Four will be good for meats fats Feb. 27 through May 20. Red stamps D8, E8, and F8 will be good March 12 through May 20. Brown stamps Y and Z in Ration Book Three will be good through March 20. Red tokens and brown one-point stamps may be used as change.

Sugar

Stamp 30 in Book Four good for 5 pounds through March 31. Stamp 40 good for 5 pounds canning sugar through Feb. 28, 1945.

Shoes

Stamp 18 in Book One and No. 1 airplane stamp in Book Three good for one pair each until further notice.

Gasoline

Stamp A-10 good for 3 gallons through March 21. B, C, B-1 and C-1 stamps good for 2 gallons until further notice. B-2 and C-2 stamps good for 5 gallons until used.
