





### Federal Mine Inspectors Visit Three Coal Mines: Wheelwright Re-visited

Dr. R. R. Sayers, director of the Bureau of Mines, revealed this week that Federal coal mine inspectors recently visited three mines in Floyd and Bell counties, crediting the operations for their observance of certain safety practices and recommending some improvements as further protection for life and property

During the re-inspection, Faull said, several improvements were made to electrical installations in the surface plant and additional shop machinery was guarded.

The re-inspection report discloses mine improved considerably during 1943. However, there were three fatal accidents, bringing the total deaths during the past four years to 12. Ten of these were caused by falls of roof and coal, two by haulage.

"These accidents indicated that additional precautions must be taken in timbering and haulage," Faull said, also offering suggestions regarding ventilation, control of coal dust, electrical facilities, and ignition hazards. Faull repeated recommendations for the removal of underground portable blower fans and for prohibiting smoking in the



# Outlines Rations

A chicken-raising leaflet of the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics says to feed chicks as soon as they are put in the brooder. Feed a good chickstarter mash for at least four weeks. See that they have plenty of water, As soon as the chicks get out on grass and into the sunshine, use one of the following methods of feeding until the chicks are 12 weeks

That is, keep the feed before the chicks all the time, so that they can eat all they want whenever they want it. 1. Self-feed cracked corn or cracked corn and wheat, soybean meal,

water and green feed. Add a pound of salt and eight pounds of steamed bonemeal to each 50 pounds of feed. 2. Self-feed commercially prepared supplement (26 to 32 percent protein), grain, water and green feed. 3. Self-feed grower mash, grain, water and green feed.

From the 12th week until the 26th week, feed growing pullets one of the foregoing three rations, with whole corn instead of cracked corn.
