CIRCUIT COURT MURDER SLATE WIPED CLEAN

OCTOBER 5, 194

'Active' Murder Docket Without Case for 1st Time Within 25 Years

The September term of the Floyd circuit court adjourned last week after clearing for the first time in a quarter-century the docket of every murder case "before the court." Several murder cases remain on the docket but the defendants are fugitives.

Trial activities ended Thursday morning when Circuit Judge Henry Stephens, Jr., declined to preside in the trial of Policemen W. B. Howard and Albert Horn, charged with striking with intent to kill. It was stated in the order setting the case for Jan. 13 before a special judge that Judge Stephens is a cousin of Policeman Howard.

The grand jury reported Saturday at the end of two sessions totaling nine days that it had examined 105 witnesses and returned 72 true bills. It reported 26 indictments naming 34 defendants as a result of the last three-day session.

The jury's report, signed by Worley Short, foreman, commended officials for their work in "combatting crime and administering justice," commended Jailer Guy Horn for keeping the courthouse and jail in a sanitary condition and for "amply providing food and lodging for the prisoners."

The jury recommended that repairs be made on the courthouse and jail "to the extent that the damage caused by the fire be repaired and that the leaks in the courthouse be stopped, and that doors be placed at each end of the hallway in said courthouse so that they can be closed during the night in order to prevent persons from coming into the building and doing

damage thereto." After Elson Kendrick, former David special officer, had appeare before the grand jury and identified Wiley Nelson as the man who seriously wounded him several weeks ago, the grand jury returned against Nelson a charge of shooting and wounding. Other major

A Way out of the Rut

COMPANION-PIECE to this newspaper's recent story of a Floyd county farmer's success in growing alfalfa is the Page One story this week telling of F. P. Hall's experiences at Weeksbury as an apple-grower.

These stories are published to point to Your farmers a way out of the rut—the corn furrow-they have too long followed, to the detriment of the soil and with little profit to themselves.

Frank Hall's experience as an orchardist is not set down here as the record of a bumper crop year. The story is of growing apples on a Floyd county hillside during a year when corn shriveled,

almost died, under the burning sun of a long and devastating drouth.

Mr. Hall's net profit on his apple orchard covering ten acres of a once-denuded Left Beaver Creek slope may exceed for this drouth year \$3,000, or \$300 an acre. The same type of land this year has not yielded better than eighteen bushels of corn to the acre, and if the entire corn crop from ten acres of hillside land were sold it could not be expected to accrue to the farmer who "sweated it out" more than \$360—less than a dollar a day for the year.

Those are some of the figures that may be drawn. Add to these the pleasant years of profit-taking from long-range planning for farm life, add that major item, the conservation of the soil-and you have in this orchard venture a clearcut picture of the need for Floyd county farmers to renounce their allegiance to

But this is not to imply that the planting of an orchard is a guarantee of success on the farm. Only those who are willing to make a study of horticulture, to plan scientifically for a productive orchard and to work toward that end should undertake it. Those who cannot or will not do this might fare better never to undertake any but the most rudimentary phases of farming. As in every field of endeavor, there is no magic "Open Sesame" to success.






