To Visit Floyd Sites Tomorrow; Banquet Marks Visit Here

The Kentucky Sanitoria Commission, in this county to view proposed sites for the tuberculosis sanitorium to be established in this district, will be guests of the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club at a banquet here to-

Friday morning, the commission which includes Representative W. G. Biggers, co-author of the tuberculosis sanitoria program legislation, will visit one or more sites selected in advance by Floyd county officials and citizens as most suitable for a hospital location.

Several potential sites have been studied, but a location on the Miles Gibson farm at Langley was considered most suitable after a group last Friday visited four farms. Mr Gibson has offered five acres of his land, gratis, and purchase by the county of additional acreage may be made at what is considered "a very reasonable price." Gas, electricity and water are easily available to this location, it was pointed out, and these are requisites to a hospital location, the sanitoria commission has emphasized.

Two other tracts have been offered free-one by Bob Kramer at Hippo, another by Bee Daniels on Abbott mountain, near here.

We Walk in Fading Beauty

FEW DAYS AGO, a Floyd countian, visiting in Lexington, was asked if the hills of this county aren't beautiful in their autumnal colors this year.

Proudly the visitor to the Bluegrass told the questioner that the hillsides are indeed very beautiful. But he did not elaborate. Had he been a good salesman, he might have waxed poetic, told of the flame of the maple, the russet of the oak, with the green of pine and cedar and all the colors between making the mountainside a veritable mosaic created by God's own hand.

He might have gone into some of that but the thought arose-"But the hills this year are not as pretty as last, not so beautiful by far as they were years ago. The woodsman's unsparing axe in springtime over the years has been robbing the hills of their seasonal colors, of much of the picturesqueness that is one of the section's greatest assets.'

Yes, the story of Floyd county's hills, indeed of most of Kentucky's hills, is a sombre thing, more of tragedy than romance. Ruthless destruction of our forests has removed much of the section's beauty and robbed it of a material as well as a scenic asset. Land cleared for crops, forests burned over by the thoughtless and the careless—these leave the hills exposed to relentless scarring by an angry Nature.

Yet the hills are very, very beautiful in their Joseph's coat of foliage this fall. One finds consolation in the thought that we need never see them less beautiful if we want them so.

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




