6TH WAR LOAN DRIVE BEGINS

County Quota, Set At \$715,510, Shy OF 5th Bond Drive

**NOVEMBER 20** 

Floyd county's quota in the Sixth War Loan drive, which begins Mon-day and continues till Dec. 16, is \$715,510, a total lacking \$154,490 of reaching the Fifth War Loan quota for the county

Although a chairman for the drive had not been definitely named, organization work was expected to be well under way by start of the drive. As in previous drives, cooperation of the schools was expected to play a prominent part in putting the county "over the top."

The state's quota is \$104,000,000, the nation's \$14,000,000,000. Of the Floyd county quota, \$298,440 is to be bought in Series E bonds by individuals; \$46,070 of other bonds by individuals, and \$371,000 by corporations.

County Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., who led the county's Fifth War Loan drive, said Glenn C. Spradlin had been nominated for the work during the present drive.



A U.S. ARMY HOSPITAL STA-TION, England-The story of a fierce German mortar barrage on American troops moving forward outside of Carentan, France, was told by Pvt. O. C. Hunt, Prestonsburg, Ky., who is convalescing in a United States army station hospital in England.

'We were advancing when the Germans started putting down a strong mortar barrage right on top of us," he said "Suddenly a shell burst near me and I was hit. First aid medics got to me right away and carried me back to the dressing station.

Pvt. Hunt, who was awarded the Purple Heart for wounds received in action, "is recovering satisfactorily," according to his ward surgeon, Capt. James D. Biles, of Memphis, Tennessee,

Pvt. Hunt formerly worked on a farm outside Prestonsburg and lived with his mother, Mrs. Rosie Hunt.

## Lawson in Group Turning Nazi Gun To Help Our Side

SIXTH ARMY GROUP, France German railroad gunners, who abandoned their massive gun and carriage before the Seventh Army punch in eastern France, don't know it, but their weapon is indirectly responsible for the hundreds of tons of Allied artillery ammunition that is making life miserable for fellow-Germans who have their backs against the German border.

The gun has not fired one round of ammunition, but the gun's strong, steel carriage forms a bridge over a demolished railroad span. Long supply trains carrying ammunition, rations and gasoline to combat units use the bridge daily in a link from the port of Marseilles to the north
