

## ONE KILLED, 5 WOUNDED, 1 MISSING

### Say Casualty Reports From Battlefronts; Deal Is Prisoner

The list of Floyd county casualties, as reported this week while American fighting men slug it out at the gateway to Germany and on the island approaches to Japan, includes one killed, one missing and five wounded.

Killed in action on Armistice Day in France was Pvt. Robert C. Lambert, husband of Mrs. Thelma R. Lambert, of Martin.

S/Sgt. R. C. Hayes, Jr., 20, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. O. Hayes, of Alhport, a turret gunner-radio man on a Flying Fortress operating from an English base, is missing, according to a report received here.

The wounded: Pvt. Mack Nelson, son of Jeff Nelson, Prestonsburg; seriously, in France, Nov. 10.

Pfc. Thomas Spears, Jr., son of Mrs. Margaret Spears, of Banner; seriously, in Germany, Oct. 9.

Pfc. Noah Williams, son of Tan Williams, McDowell; seriously, Oct. 31, on Leyte.

Pvt. Joseph W. Holbrook, son of Henry Holbrook, of the Middle Creek road; slightly, Oct. 16, in France.

Kessie Boyd, son of Andy Boyd, of Dana; slightly, in France.

Ferrell Deal, of Grethel, this week was notified that his son, Pvt. George Deal, reported as missing in France August 27, became on that date a German prisoner.

Garrett relatives of Glenn Pack, who was seriously wounded in France, learned several days ago that he has been returned to a hospital in this country.

## CLICK DEATH PROBE MADE

### Hint at Identity Of Driver Gained In Investigation

A quiet investigation of the hit-run death near Martin on the night of Nov. 17 of Frank Click was being continued this week by County Attorney W. W. Burchett.

The investigation has uncovered some hint of the identity of the driver of a car which struck Click but evidence at hand is insufficient to justify an arrest, it was said this week.

Click, a resident of Emma, was killed while en route home from Martin where he had visited a friend whose name was given as "Red" Campbell. He was dead when found, shortly after midnight.

## PURGATION, INADEQUATE

### Hill Says, Commenting On Purgation Board Work in County

Commenting on the proposed appointment of new county registration-purgation officers by the State Registration and Purgation Board, County Judge E. P. Hill said this week that work of previous purgation boards in this county had been wholly inadequate.

It is estimated that there are hundreds of absent and dead voters' names on the registration lists in this county.

"Bad as a thorough purging of the lists is needed, it appears that the whole matter is up to the board members themselves, and not up to the fiscal court or county officials," Judge Hill commented.

Counties wanting the services of purgation boards should file their lists with the state board during December, E. E. Hughes, chairman, said at Frankfort Tuesday. Purgation board members in all counties except Jefferson are paid per diem for their services.

## FDR'S LEAD IS 80,141

### May's Official Margin Over Gabbard, 3241; Barkley's Is 82,628

President Roosevelt's majority in Kentucky was recorded officially Monday as 80,141 over Governor Thomas E. Dewey. The State Board of Election Commissioners held up formal award of certificates of election to all winners except three because complete campaign expense accounts had not been received.

Those awarded their certificates were Democratic Congressman Brent Spence in the Fifth and A. J. May in the Seventh Congressional districts, and E. J. Felts, elected circuit judge in the Seventh judicial district to fill a vacancy.

Certificates for the others were made out and left for State Board Chairman E. E. Hughes to forward on receipt of the expense reports.

Hughes pointed out state law gives candidates 30 days after an election to file their final expense accounts, but requires the board to meet on the third Monday after the election to canvass the returns.

The official reports from the 120 counties, which made no changes in the winners as shown by the unofficial totals, gave Democratic United States Senator Alben W. Barkley an 82,628 majority over his Republican opponent, James Park, of Lexington.

Only 4.4 per cent of the total 867,921 vote in the Presidential race was cast by absentee voters, according to figures compiled in the office of Secretary of State Charles E. O'Connor. That office received 38,720 absentee ballots by Nov. 6 and forwarded them to their home counties. A total of 59,870 ballots had been applied for.

While no record was kept of civilians as compared to servicemen and women actually using absentee ballots, the count on the applications showed 18.2 per cent of the latter came from civilians. Ballots received

## BOND SALES NOW THIRD OF QUOTA

### Corporation Purchases Comprise Greater Part of \$250,000 Subscribed

Floyd county bond purchases during the Sixth War Loan drive have reached the quarter-million-dollar mark, County Judge E. P. Hill, chairman of the drive, announced Wednesday.

Bulk of this amount, however, was subscribed by corporations, it was pointed out as individual bond buyers were reminded that heavier buying of Series E bonds is necessary if the county is to top its goal of \$715,510.

Only \$42,000 had been reported by the Federal Reserve Bank at Cleveland as having been credited against the county's bond quota as of Wednesday, but the bank's reports usually are several days behind the actual total. Heavier purchases by corporations included: Glogora Coal Company, \$30,000; Warfield Natural Gas Company, \$60,000; Inland Steel Company, \$100,000; Standard Oil Company, \$2,000; Kentucky West Virginia Power Company, \$5,000.

"The teachers and school children of the county are leading this campaign, and they are not being aided by personal appearances of movie stars or any fanfare whatever to show the people the importance of putting their money into the fight," the drive chairman said. "They are depending upon the patriotism of the people and on their good commonsense to put Floyd county across."

Few community reports had been received by Judge Hill this week.

Mrs. Anna Spradlin Pruitt, wife of W. M. Pruitt and one of the county's oldest women, died Friday at her home on Abbott Creek, a victim of complications at the age of 87.

Born Jan. 24, 1857, Mrs. Pruitt was last of the family of Miah and Betty Vaughan Spradlin, early residents of the Abbott community. She had been a member of the Methodist Church for more than 50 years and was one of the county's best women. Her husband died 23 years ago.

## Former Floyd Countian Is Winner Of Tom Wallace Forestry Award

### DR. HALL WINS PRIZE FOR UNUSUAL RECORD IN REFORESTATION

Dr. J. F. Hall, a native of Floyd county who now resides in Flemingsburg, Ky., has won the \$200 Tom Wallace Forestry Award first prize. The Courier-Journal announced Sunday.

Announcement of Dr. Hall's success in the contest for Kentucky and Indiana farmers was made along with the names of other winners of contests sponsored by The Courier-Journal and The Louisville Times worth \$2,800 in cash prizes.

Dr. Hall's experiences in reforestation were told in an essay which he submitted as a part of the competition.

The former Floyd countian told THE FLOYD COUNTY TIMES Monday that he began work in reforestation about 18 months ago, although he had planned for the last

three years to do such work on his 450-acre farm near Flemingsburg.

First of all, Dr. Hall fenced off 43 acres of woodland, then began the work of culling and cutting off the dead trees, scrub growth and other unfit individual trees. Timber on the tract is mostly hardwood and in the more barren spots on this acreage he has planted 3,000 locust trees. Another tract of 57 acres has been fenced in, but actual reforestation work on it has not been begun, Dr. Hall said. "This is a fascinating work and I intend to go ahead with it," he added.

The former McDowell man, a brother of E. V. Hall, Flemingsburg, former Superintendent of Floyd county schools, and of the late O. C. Hall, onetime Commonwealth's Attorney of this district, has constructed a dam on his farm which has converted a hollow into a pri-

vate fish pond around which he has planted 3,000 pines and maples, but this venture was not included in his report in the contest.

The timber culled and cut from the tract where the reforestation project was undertaken has been put to various uses—sawed into lumber, used as tobacco sticks, as poles, etc.—so that Dr. Hall estimates his venture has resulted in no cash outlay beyond cost of fencing which he considers a permanent improvement to the farm.

Mention of Floyd county to Dr. Hall prompted him to declare that "Floyd needs a lot of reforestation, not only to save the soil but also to keep the hills from being stripped bare. I hope the folks become interested in it and do not wait too long."

## Reforestation—by a Floyd Countian!

THE Floyd county folks go ahead with the generations-old folly of setting out forest fires, cutting away indiscriminately at their woodland and forgetting ever to restore to their hills the trees they have taken away, a native of this county, now residing in the Bluegrass, ironically enough wins the Tom Wallace Forestry Award.

It is a bitter irony, this story of Dr. J. F. Hall, a native of Left Beaver Creek, turning his time and hands to the great work of culling his woodland, of scientifically providing for its better growth and of adding new trees to it in a section of the state where erosion is not an urgent and serious matter; while, here in his native hills, his kinsmen and the rest of us thoughtlessly cut away and permit to be burned away, with never a move toward reforestation, the timber that remains after the first great massacre of the trees back in the days of rafting, along the Big Sandy.

THE TIMES would express the wish that he had remained here to show the way to others, did we not fear that, had he remained in Floyd county, reforestation would not have caught his interest.

In that case, the doctor himself would have been the loser and his native county would not have benefited.

As it is, he has begun, away from "home," a job we here at home cannot too long postpone. If we cannot now begin reforestation, we can at least stop the wanton destruction of the trees. We can stop the forest fires and permit those trees left to live and grow. It is a sad reflection on a people to see hills whose beauty lies in their verdure become denuded and gullied like the face of a wrinkled crone.

All this brings THE TIMES back to its argument that if this section is not to become a wasteland some day, once our mineral resources are exhausted, conservation must be practised.

The "new grounds" today hacked out of the woodlands—they cannot be graced by the word, "forests," any longer—are the soil of rich bottom lands, miles away, tomorrow. Treeless hillsides, bare even of grass, are veritable chutes down which every rain sends the remaining topsoil. The streams are filled with sand till any rainfall of consequence sends them out of their banks, inundating lowlands, covering the fields with white sand.

These streams must be cleared, possibly by dredging, to provide a channel for the water. But the communities in which such waterway improvement is to be made, if at all, must restore to their hills the trees and grass; otherwise, the streams would quickly refill with sand instead of water.

When the federal government undertakes its post-war program of waterways improvement, the up-the-creek communities must not be forgotten. The immediate effect will not be so striking as a great dam or super-highway, but the permanent benefits will be greater.

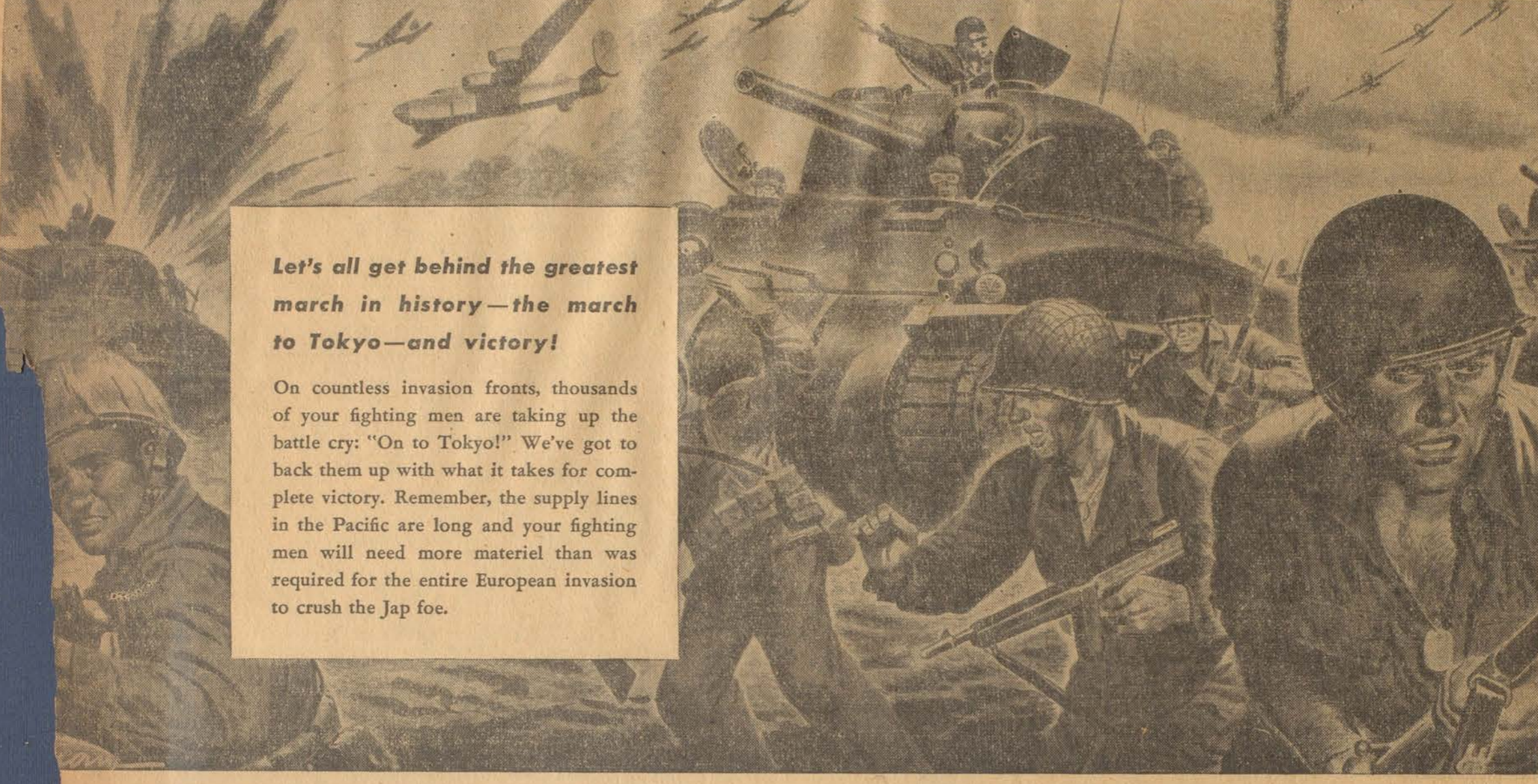

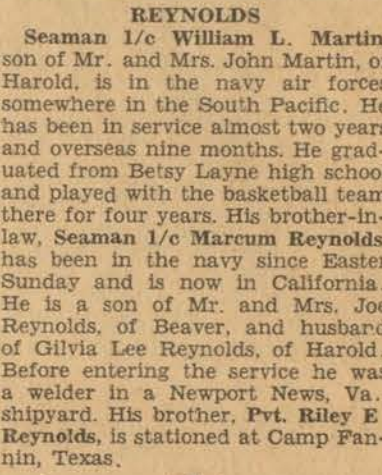

ASTRP Program Calls for 17-Year-Old Men

ASTRP, a college training program for 17-year-old men, is now the vital concern of the army. Men with educational training are becoming ever fewer as the war wears on.

ASTRP stands for Army Specialized Training Reserve Program. But, more than just initials or a name, to eligible men it stands for a chance to have three months of college training at government expense before you become 18 and enter the army on active duty.

ASTRP is open to all men of 17 who are graduates of high school and who are less than 17 years and eight months old, or who will graduate before March 1, 1945 and will be at that time at least three months from their 18th birthday.

Men who qualify will be sent, after high school graduation, to one of America's universities for three months of intensive college work, comparable to the first semester of a freshman year.

too late to be forwarded to the counties for inclusion in the tabulation totaled 1,330.

Complete official returns in the Presidential race showed Roosevelt and his vice-presidential running-mate, Senator Harry S. Truman received 472,589 votes to 392,448 for Dewey and Governor John W. Bricker, of Ohio, the Republican candidates.

Three other Presidential tickets got scattering votes: Prohibitionists headed by Claude A. Watson, 2,023; Socialist, Norman Thomas, 535, and Socialist-Labor, Edward A. Teichert, 326.

In the Senatorial race, Barkley's total was 464,053; Park's, 320,425; Robert H. Garrison, Prohibitionist, 1,808, and Yona M. Marret, Socialist-Labor, 340. The Socialist party had no Senatorial candidate.
