More Than Money Is Needed

CVERYBODY is agreed that Kentucky must have more money for its schools -money with which to equip schools and to pay qualified teachers salaries attractive enough to keep them in the teaching profession, in Kentucky.

All the federal aid offered should be accepted and that must be augmented by increased state funds. These are matters to be handled by state and federal au-

But there is one duty, aside from taxpaying, that rests solely with the folks at home; and unless it is performed faithfully no amount of money will achieve better educational opportunity for Kentucky's school children.

This duty, an onerous one, is that of school officials to weed out with an inexorable honesty and an inflexible will the unfit who are now teaching in the

Wartime conditions have made the teacher crop a lean one, naturally, and so those inclined to supplant ill-equipped and unsuited teachers with instructors of ability and a true zeal for their profession are handicapped at this time. But will they undertake that hard, and in many cases unpopular, task when conditions do return to normal?

More important to the children even than money for their schools is an honest effort by those charged with the duty of employing only capable, earnest teachers to do just that—to lift from the schools the lagging weight of faculty drones, to rid the schools of the pernicious, almost sinful, burden of family politics that is known as nepotism.

Will these school authorities brave the wrath of the unfit and their friends and relatives, that the children may have their rightful opportunity and that the taxpayers' money may not be wasted?

Unless they do, all the millions appropriated by both state and federal governments will avail nothing. Fine school buildings and modern equipment will be mere monuments to futility and moral cowardice, if those who are charged with this stern but just duty fail us.



VANCE ARMENTROUT . . . Editorial Writer for The Courier-Journal, cast aside a legal career to become a newspaper man . . but he still holds license to practice law in Kentucky, Tennessee, and in Ohio, where he passed the bar examinations after graduating from Ohio State. Instead, he worked on newspapers in all three states, and was State Editor of the Associated Press when he joined The Courier-Journal as Frankfort correspondent, later opening the Bureau there when Judge Bingham bought the paper.

A militant writer in behalf of clean government, Armentrout has locked horns with many a careless state official. He was once incarcerated for an hour in the capital city bastille, by a legislative committee, because he would not reveal the identity of an irate contributor to the paper's "Point of View" column. One of his early tasks was a survey of state institutions, and he took an active part in reorganizing the state school system.

With this rich background of state experience, Vance was brought back to Louisville in 1926 to serve on the paper's editorial staff. Some of his keenly analytical contributions are contained in a handbook still found in many libraries. He was President of the Kentucky State Press Association in 1943.

With legions of friends in every section of Kentucky who consider him an authority on state matters, Vance is a favorite at newspaper gatherings where his reminiscenses are found personally and historically colorful. The Armentrouts' living-room faces Cherokee Park, favorite hiking spot, where editorial ideas are developed daily over a four or five-mile course. Time magazine once credited him with getting his ideas on a roller coaster.






