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#### The Medical Profession at Fault

THIS is not to discuss the guilt or innocence of the man known to many Floyd countians as "Dr. Liebowitz. If he is an imposter, as charged, his guilt will be decided by trial in court.

But the penalty fixed by law, if he is convicted, is the matter at discussion (this editorial was written before his scheduled trial here Wednesday).

The medical profession, or its representative group, has done a sorry job with past Legislatures in seeking legal penalties for men who, posing as legally qualified physicians, treat the afflicted who look to doctors for their physical sal-

It is utter travesty on justice for a poseur to practise one of the noblest of professions, to kill or cure scores while collecting highly remunerative feesall for a fine of a pitiful fifty dollars when caught and convicted. Equally farcical is the second offense penalty: one hundred dollars in fine or a thirty-day jail term, or both.

Why should human suffering in an allegedly civilized state be so cheap at court while so costly in the lives and well-being of sufferers, those who pay

for it all in wasted bodies and financial resources?

A "doctor"-any person, say, of normal intelligence and a smattering of medical knowledge, sans consciencecould operate under such penalties to his own personal profit. A fine of fifty dollars alongside the rich take of a few months' medical fees is not much on the red side of the ledger. Meanwhile, the imposter could work in two ways to the harm of the sufferer: by administering the improper treatment, or by preventing the patient from turning to a qualified physician for proper treatment.

It is the duty of the medical profession through its organizations to demand heavier penalties for such offenses, crimes against the laws of society and against the greater law of living and let live. No legislative body could deny such request.

NOW that President Roosevelt is dead, his birthday may or may not continue to be the focal date around which revolves the annual drive for funds

for the war on infantile paralysis. Whatever the plans for the future of those directing this battle for humanity, his death has presented another means of raising funds for the war on polio, it occurs to THE TIMES.

This idea may seem far-fetched, but

Have the recordings of all the Roosevelt addresses placed in the hands of the National Infantile Paralysis Foundation, let no other produce or sell them. Then, next year, have each local group leading the drive sell albums of these recordings to admirers of the departed President.

Thus could be realized many thousands of dollars that otherwise might not be subscribed, and at the same time those who cherish the memory of their departed leader would acquire for their homes the voice, a living part, of Franklin Roosevelt.

Thus would this nation pay to Franklin Roosevelt the greatest reverence he would have sought, had he lived a thousand years.

Those who would not care for such a memento of the President could, of course, by direct contribution aid the cause which is the duty of us all to help.

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





WITH THE 38TH DIVISION ON BATAAN-Pfc. Isom Prater, son of and Mrs. Boomer Prater, of Es-Ky., landed with the famous 149th infantry, 38th division, on the west coast of Luzon in a surprise move against the Japs.

A cannoneer in the anti-tank platoon of his battalion, he was used to carry supplies to the front line troops, since his usual mission of counteracting armor was not need-

"The battle for Zig Zag Pass in northern Bataan was a hard fight, says Pfc. Prater. "We had to dig them out of caves and foxholes. Even tanks had to be knocked out, but we could not get our weapons into the mountains. Our boys fought like veterans and soon annihilated the last enemy troops in the area.'

Inducted April 7, 1941, Pfc. Prater ailed for overseas July 14, 1944, and since has served in Hawaii and New Guinea before his participation in the campaign to free the Philippines. He has been awarded the American Defense Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Theatre Ribbon, both the Expert and Combat Infantry Badge, and is eligible for the Philippine Liberation Ribbon. His wife resides at 2002 Lakeview, Washington, Ky.

#### Myrtle Sailor, Survivor Of Sunken Vessel

TREASURE ISLAND, San Francisco, Calif.—Some 120 survivors, all navy enlisted personnel from Philippine invasion vessels, were logged recently at the U.S. Receiving Ship on Treasure Island. Among the survivors was Seaman Elmer R. Frasure, of Myrtle, Ky.

The sailors were all from ships sunk by enemy action in the invasion of Bataan peninsula and Cor-regidor. Twenty of the men were off the navy's minesweeper USS YMS48 whose sinking off Bataan on February 14 has been announced by the Navy Department. The remainder survivors from three landing craft engaged in the invasion of Corregidor, one being the LCS (L) The YMS 48 had been sunk by Japanese shore batteries on Bataan. The ship had been hit at least eight times before she was fin-ally finished off by a U.S. destroyer.

At Treasure Island the men were given medical examinations and were prepared to depart for their homes on leaves of absence before eporting again for duty.
