## Veteran of 33 Months Gets U.S. Assignment

Camp Davis, N.C.—Sgt. Homer W. Rogers, Wayland, Ky., has been assigned to Camp Davis, an army air forces personnel distribution command redistribution station and convalescent hospital. Sgt. Rogers is a veteran of 33 months service in the Galapagos Islands and Panama. He has been awarded the Good Conduct Medal and wears the American theatre ribbon.

Prior to his entrance into the service in December, 1940, he was employed by the Elk Horn Coal Corporation.

## FOUR CONNORS BROTHERS DIVIDE THEIR ATTENTION BETWEEN ARMY, NAVY

Until April 16, the navy had an edge with the family of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Connors, of Auxier. Two of their sons were in the navy, only one in the army. But that date saw the youngest of four brothers—Prentis Blaine Connors, Auxier high school junior, enter the army.

Boatswain's Mate 2/c Charles Connors, Jr., 24, enlisted in the navy in March, 1942 and served on merchant ships and troop transports until he began amphibious training at Norfolk, Va., recently. His bride, the former Miss Frances DeVito, resides in Brooklyn, N.Y. He has been honored with the Presidential citation.

Pvt. William Harold Connors, 27, was slightly wounded on Leyte after spending 30 months overseas and taking part in several island invasions. He also has received the Presidential citation. Pvt. Connors is now at a rest camp at Miami Beach, Florida, after more than three years' army service.

Seaman 1/c James Paul Connors, 20, who enlisted in the navy in February, 1942 at the age of 17, participated in the North African and Sicilian invasions and was the third Floyd cousin to be decorated for bravery during the war. He has survived three ship sinkings and a fourth ship of which he was a crew-member was torpedoed. He recently returned to this country from Brazil, where he spent 14 months, and is now in training at Newport, Rhode Island. He has received two citations.

Pvt. Prentis Blaine Connors is stationed with a field artillery unit at Ft. Sill, Oklahoma. He was a member of the Auxier high school basketball team before leaving for army service. Shortly before he entered the army, his three brothers visited their parents at Auxier. The four boys are nephews of Mrs. Mabel Branham, of Prestonsburg.

## Prestonsburg Sergeant Decorated in Italy

WITH THE FIFTH ARMY, ITALY—Sgt. Virgil Johnson, Prestonsburg, Ky., recently was awarded the Bronze Star for heroic achievement in action.

He is serving on the Fifth army front in Italy with the 337th "Wolfpack" Infantry Regiment, 85th "Custer" Division.

When his platoon encountered heavy artillery fire which scattered the last two squads, related the award citation, he courageously exposed himself to the enemy fire to re-organize the squads. He led them to the base of a ridge, contacted the platoon sergeant and then led the squads forward to secure a vital position. His mother, Mrs. Elma Johnson, lives in Prestonsburg.

Mullett, Prestonsburg, Ky., and Pfc. George C. Joshlin, Senath, Mo., 3rd platoon runners, neglected to wake Pfc. Dunay when participating on an attacking mission.

When the attack subsided, the pair returned to pick up their bed-rolls. Mullett and Joshlin found the area had been completely shelled by 88-mm. fire, and yet when they looked around, there lay their buddy, still sound asleep.

## Pfc. Conn Accounts For Four Japanese In Luzon Mountains

WITH THE 38TH DIVISION ON LUZON—Pfc. Samuel G. Conn, ammunition bearer for his company, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Conn, of Dana, Ky., is now seeing action with the 149th infantry, 38th division of Bataan fame, in the rugged Zambales mountains of Central Luzon.

In a recent engagement with the enemy, Pfc. Conn, while investigating a Jap cave, accounted for four Japs killed. Later that day, returning to the same cave, he found a phonograph machine with numerous records of popular American songs. "This phonograph," says Pfc. Conn, "has brought us many moments of fun and relaxation. With all the records found, it is evident that the Japanese people are fond of American music."

Pfc. Conn was inducted March 31, 1941 at Ft. Thomas, Ky., and on Jan. 9, 1944 was sent overseas to Hawaii and New Guinea prior to taking part in the present campaign on Luzon. Pfc. Conn is the holder of the Asiatic-Pacific ribbons, the Good Conduct Medal and the Combat Infantry Badge.

## In European Theatre, Haywood Is Promoted



Mrs. Hargus Haywood, of Buchanan, has received word that her husband, Hargus Haywood, formerly of this county, now stationed somewhere in the European theatre of war, has been promoted to corporal. Serving with the 101st Airborne Division, he has seen action in Italy, Sicily, France, Luxembourg, Belgium and in Germany, having sailed overseas in May, 1944.

He has been in the army five years, having volunteered for the paratroopers in December, 1943. He had been with a medical detachment prior to volunteering. He was stationed at Camp Tyson for 15 months, and was a staff sergeant while in the medical division.

## Roark, Outstanding Athlete at Base

1328 AAF BU, ASSAM, INDIA—Sgt. James (Jimmy) Roark, of Prestonsburg, Ky., has proven to be one of the outstanding athletes ever to appear on the sports field at this base.

Roark, who is 25, weighs 170 and stands five feet nine, graduated from Prestonsburg high school in 1938. While there he played three years of basketball and three years of football.

In 1941 he received a baseball contract from the St. Louis Cardinals but it came too late. He had already signed a contract with the army. Reporting to Long Beach, Calif., he played, coached and managed the sixth ferrying group baseball and basketball squads. Outstanding players on these teams were Red Ruffing, Harry Danning, Chuck Stevens, Max West, Murrey Fernandez and many other minor league stars. When he left Long Beach his team's baseball record showed 69 wins against seven losses. The basketball squad was made up of former college stars, among them being Howard Rohan, Cincinnati, Walt Ross, Texas A. & M., Louie Degros, Colorado Mines, Fred Chalowski, Southern California, Fred Firestone, Illinois, and Joe L. Brown, son of the famed comedian Joe E. Brown, U.C.L.A. This club sported a record of 36 wins against 17 losses acquired against such teams as 20th Century Fox, Southern California, U.C.L.A., Long Beach Junior College, San Pedro Y.M.C.A., Santa Ana, the latter team featuring three All-Americans.

Sgt. Roark came overseas in September, 1943 and in that time has had a hand in managing and coaching the softball, baseball and basketball clubs at this base. The softball team claims the championship of India on the strength of a brilliant record of 45 wins against no losses, acquired against the best competition in India. In baseball it has a record of 21 victories and two losses. Most of the men playing on these clubs are former semi-pro ball players, among them being Sgt. Bob Harper who is under Cardinal contract, T/Sgt. Ed Fritz, who played for the University of Kentucky baseball and football teams, Bob Zeisler, a brilliant pitcher and a former teammate of Depaul's George Mikan on the basketball court, 1st Lt. Charles (Chuck), Hubbard, Auxier, Ky., who played in the Big Sandy league. Roark is one of the leading hitters in the softball league here and is sweating out rotation back to the States. His post-war plans are to follow up in organized baseball or to settle down to a coaching assignment.

His brother, Buddy Butler, is now convalescing in General hospital, Augusta, Ga. He is gamely practicing dance while still on crutches.

## Japs Bounce Shell Off Akers' Helmet But He's Unharmd

WITH THE 38TH DIVISION ON LUZON—Pvt. Ransom Akers, a BAR man for his squad and grandson of A. B. Bryant, Fed. Ky., is presently seeing action with his regiment, the 149th infantry, 38th division of Bataan fame, in the Zambales mountain ranges of central Luzon.

In a recent phase of the battle in these mountains, Pvt. Akers told of many narrow escapes. "My worst experience," he says, "was when the Japs, using a 37-mm. shell as hand grenades, bounced one off my helmet. This shell exploded about 10 feet behind me. It is tough in these mountains. These Japs are determined to fight till the last man. We are looking for him."

Pvt. Akers in civilian life attended the Fed school. He later worked on his farm there and on April 8, 1941 was inducted at Ft. Thomas, Ky., and was sent overseas to Hawaii and New Guinea, Jan. 9, 1944. He also took part in the closing stages of the Leyte campaign prior to his present station on Luzon.

He is the holder of the American Defense Ribbon, the Good Conduct Medal, both the expert and combat infantry badges and the Philippine Liberation Medal.

**Goal of 95,000 Set For Ky 4-H Clubs**  
National 4-H Club Week, March 3-11, will find Kentucky with a goal of 95,000 members this year, it is announced from the State College of Agriculture and Home Economics at Lexington. The scope of club work and its educational and economic value are revealed in a report of the college.  
Last year 2,900 clubs in Kentucky had an enrollment of 91,074 members—49,898 girls and 41,266 boys. The work was carried on in all counties.  
The club members contributed in the war effort by buying bonds and stamps, by producing food and by helping out in the labor shortage. Approximately \$500,000 was put in bonds and stamps. More than 8,500 club members helped on farms. Their services were especially valuable in picking strawberries and other fruit and in truck gardens.  
Thirteen thousand, six hundred and nineteen boys and girls raised 537,247 chickens last year, and 26,690 had victory gardens.  
Livestock raised by the club boys and girls included 15,203 hogs, 5,250 sheep and 3,334 calves. They also grew 6,783 acres of corn and 3,219 acres of tobacco.  
Club girls last year put up 1,113,289 quarts of food and planned and served 88,379 meals, many of them doing housework while their mothers worked in the fields, taking the place of sons gone to war. In learning to sew, 4-H club girls made 55,887 garments.

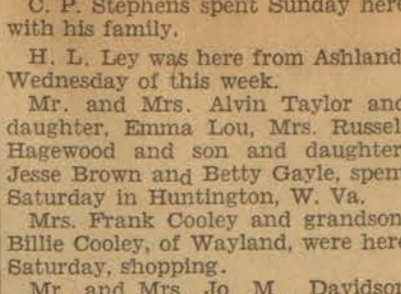

individual is entitled to sell. Marketing is carried on by two persons, the buyer and the seller, of whom are guilty of breaking the regulations.

Marketing of any type is necessary because of the people's desire for more of their fair share of rationed articles. These people heard these articles when they are obtainable, thus paying others of their share. They pay above ceiling prices to their own selfish greed. Many people, however, are ignorant of the facts of black market; therefore they are innocently caught in the grasp of this great profiteering racket. Carelessness is another of the causes of black market. Many American citizens do not mean to encourage the black market, but they are too thoughtless to inquire whether articles are above ceiling prices or whether they have been government approved.

Here is a typical example of a black marketeer: A man wants to obtain enough gasoline for a pleasure trip, but he does not have enough ration stamps of his own. Rather than do without the gasoline for his unnecessary trip, he proceeds to buy counterfeit stamps at a very high price. Not only does he deprive his fellow citizens of their fair share, but he is also aiding the Axis powers against our servicemen fighting on the battlefields in all corners of the earth. Then, too, the defense

worker may be kept from work because of the lack of gasoline. If every person would follow the rules of rationing, the black market would soon be stamped out.

The gasoline black market constitutes the greatest problem of the black market racket. Nearly half of the convictions for all types of rationing and price control violations in the criminal courts last year were gasoline cases. This gasoline comes from our limited civilian supply. Many people do not understand there is a real shortage of gasoline. The reason for this is that we have about reached maximum production of crude oil from reserves in the United States, and until recently the shortage of gasoline in the East was due to the lack of transportation for the gasoline from the Midwest.

Black market gasoline means that there is a problem of black market in ration stamps, not gasoline. Although there is a shortage of gasoline, the illegal coupon circulation creates the main problem. Illegal coupons come mainly from three sources. They are stolen from local War Price and Rationing Boards; they are counterfeited; legal coupons, which have been taken by gasoline dealers are stolen from the service stations and sold to other dealers.

There are many dangers brought on by the black market. In the first place, it tends to destroy the rationing program which has been set up by our government. Some people have their "fair share" while others are forced to do without. Scarce commodities which are needed so badly by our civilian population, by our military forces, and by our Lend-Lease program are prevented from reaching those in need. Black marketing greatly affects the price control program. Buyers who pay unreasonable prices for illegally sold goods are helping in this unpatriotic offense. Black marketing encourages crime on the home front and creates new problems of juvenile delinquency. It cheats the honest buyers and sellers and makes it more difficult for the honest merchant to carry on his business. It also causes a great loss of important by-products. For example, important by-products of meat such as leather, insulin and gelatin are wasted. It endangers the health, for one may eat foods, especially meat, which have been prepared under unsanitary conditions.

Of course the biggest black market danger is taking away products, especially gasoline, from our armed forces. It is estimated that about five per cent of the supply of gasoline is siphoned off by the black marketeers. This means that two and a half million gallons each day are being taken away from our men on the battlefronts. Today our armed forces are eleven thousand per cent more mechanized than they were in World War I. A destroyer uses three thousand gallons of oil each hour. One thousand four-motored army bombers use one million, eight hundred and fifty thousand gallons of gasoline on a typical six-hour mission. This is enough gasoline to supply nineteen thousand A-book holders for a year of wartime driving. As the war program expands more and more petroleum products are being used to supply the armed forces. As one can readily see, a shortage of gasoline can greatly hinder the war effort. Only enough gasoline is available to redeem the coupons legally issued. When illegal coupons are put into circulation, the people get them, thereby securing more than their fair share. In this way more and more gasoline is taken away from the war effort.

Each car owner can help in combating the black market by doing the following: (1) by always writing the state and license number on all gasoline coupons; (2) by never buying gasoline coupons or accepting "gift" coupons; (3) by never applying for more gasoline than is needed for essential purposes; (4) by always giving up the proper coupons when buying gasoline. If everyone would follow these simple rules, the gasoline black market would soon be abolished.

Although the gasoline black market is the biggest black market problem, there are many other important phases of the black market. There is the black market of meat, cigarettes, tires, nylon and silk hose, violation of the ceiling prices, and many others. Each of these is a serious offense and faces us at a time of great peril. When all of the black market cases are enumerated, one can easily understand that it is necessary that this new crime wave be eliminated. This racket of saboteurs is disrupting our rationing program and hindering our progress in the war. It thrives in regions where the people are ignorant of its causes, results, and methods of prevention. We must not meet this dangerous enemy on a dark, lonely road unprepared, but armed with the weapons of knowledge and fairness and with the thoughts of our boys "over there" in our hearts, we can and will overcome this great national foe.

College Suggests Farmers Try Kudzu This Spring

Farmers interested in additional hay and pasture and in controlling erosion might try kudzu, says a statement issued by Dr. E. N. Fergus, of the Kentucky College of Agriculture and Home Economics. He believes kudzu has merit, especially on hilly land where erosion has taken place.

Plantings made this spring would give farmers a chance to learn about the habits and value of kudzu, and also provide crowns for new plantings, it suggested.

Kudzu is started by setting seedlings or crowns in early spring. Plants are set 3 to 7 feet apart each way. On land that can be cultivated, plants may be set closer together in rows 7 to 10 feet apart and corn grown between the rows.

Three small fields of kudzu are being grown at the Robinson Experiment Station at Quicksand, Breathitt county, all on steep hillsides. One field, 15 years old, furnishes grazing for at least one cow to an acre and a half from about June 1 to killing frost.

On a second field, where corn had been grown for several years, three years were required to cover the hillsides and control erosion. The third field, which is on grassland, was established by digging hills and planting crowns and then hoeing around them for one year. The kudzu is spreading and gradually taking the grass.

The Louisville man attested to Jap bestiality. He saw American soldiers killed after digging their own graves; told of being transported from one prison to another in a Jap prison ship, of being crammed in a 30 by 30-foot hold with 1,200 men, with a five-gallon bucket the only toilet facilities; how three American officers, captured while attempting escape, were hung by their thumbs, beaten for hours, then shot.

Sparks said his fingertips still are numb, that he has no sense of touch from the tips or nails of his fingers—a result, he said, of the Japanese discovering his attempt to bring food into the prison and by way of punishment driving bamboo slivers beneath his fingernails and setting them on fire.

Sgt. Prichard, who was officially credited with wiping out, single-handed, a Jap machine gun nest on Iwo Jima, is in this country because a Jap sniper's bullet caught him as he returned from this daring mission. His was the story, in brief, of that bloody campaign during which only 82 Japs were taken prisoner, he said. "We killed 22,000 of the 23,000 Japs there," he explained.

After he was wounded, Sgt. Prichard was given five pints of blood plasma and one pint of blood. "I have somebody to thank for that blood," he said with deep feeling. "And it may be somebody in this room."

Home Front production, the buying of War Bonds, contributing to the Red Cross and giving blood for the wounded were listed by the veterans as "musts" for the folks at home. "I got two Red Cross packages while I was a prisoner," Machinist Mate Sparks said. "The second saved my life. Without it, I could not have survived."

The three veterans were accompanied to this county by Lt. R. C. Cunningham, of the navy.

**Floyd Farm Census Lists 4,395 Farms, Sturgill Announces**

The number of farms in Floyd county, as shown by the preliminary count of returns of the 1945 agriculture census was 4,395, as compared with 4,026 in 1940, and 3,950 in 1935. This was announced this week by B. L. Sturgill, supervisor for the 1945 farm census in the eighth Kentucky census district with headquarters at Prestonsburg.

The total land in farms in Floyd county, according to the preliminary 1945 census count, is 163,155 acres, as compared with 159,497 acres in 1940, and 151,114 acres in 1935. Average size of farms shown in the preliminary 1945 census count for Floyd county was 37.1 acres, as compared with 39.6 acres in 1940, and 38.3 acres in 1935.

In announcing the 1945 census totals of farms and land in farms in Floyd county, Supervisor Sturgill pointed out that the figures are preliminary and subject to correction. Final tabulations of Floyd county farm census returns will be made by the Bureau of the Census and announced from Washington when completed, Mr. Sturgill said.
