### Chamber of Commerce Beginning Is Made At Meeting Here

May that an appropriation for installing such experimental plants has already been made and that such information should be on file in Washington at once.

Preliminary plans for a plant of this type provides for the use of 175 to 200 tons of coal a day from which production of a barrel of oil per ton of coal would be realized. An enter-prise of this type would employ around 175 men and would require a sizeable construction program

"A low ash content and a high volatile coal is ideal for hydrogenation," a spokesman for the Chamber of Commerce said. "This coal here in Floyd county is among the lowest in ash content and it is highly volatile."





#### Martha Logan's Recipe for WESTERN RANCH MEAT LOAF

2 pounds ground beef, or 1 pound each beef and

lamb 1 medium onion 34 cup diced celery or ground carrot

4 cup lard or shortening

5 cup diced green
peppers or 4 teaspoon

2 teaspoons salt 2 eggs 3 cups soft bread crumbs 1/2 cup water 1/2 cup tomato

2 tablespeons melted butter or margarine

Chop onion. Brown onion and celery or carrots in Combine with green pepper, salt, eggs, bread crumbs, and water to make a dressing. Add half the dressing (one and one-half cups) to the meat, mixing well. Pat out half the mixture in a two-quart loaf pan. Cover with remaining dressing, then top with remaining meat mixture. Bake in a moderate oven (350°F) one and one-quarter hours. Baste twice with tomato juice and butter to keep loaf moist. Yield: 10-12 servings.


