Beset on every hand by candidates wanting their printing and by a printer shortage, I grasped at a straw last week by "signing up" a man who said he was a printer, and it came as much good as the same when he does a drowning man. A printer passed and the alleged printer didn't show up for work. Then, when the next day was far along, he had to happen to me:

"I asked Jimmy Goble, 'Where do you suppose that printer of Udell's was?' And he pitilessly let me have 'I don't know. Yudel me!'"

THE FANTASY

I have just returned from a place that has me feeling like I have just walked out of the pages of a Graubark novel. This place is beautifully unbelievable and romantic.

I don't see one valley but some call it the Valley of the Dogwoods. It is so beautiful to be sentimental about it who doesn't after seeing the valley—you can with a surer touch of poetry call it "Memory Lane."

As I thought, as I have noted here, it is not one valley or one lane; it is the big valley with half a hundred back-country coves and shady, half-forgotten lanes a part of it.

The springtime is the season of the year when I was there and when you must be there. If you go anywhere. The dogwoods are in bloom when you see. Do this and when you enter the valley, just watch. Watch for the white dogwoods that are native to those hills. And tragically often you'll see pink dogwoods. All in beautiful, luxuriant bloom, come sunshine or storm. All forming avenues of Nature's white, pink-dotted against the green of a rugged mountainside backdrop.

What has enchanted me about the place is the story behind it all. That, as much as the hidden-dell romance of the place, enthralled me. The story is:

Several years ago, when folks were thinking of memorials, living and otherwise, to those who fought and lived or died in the war, somebody caused these folks, not a few but all of them, to plant dogwoods which today are crowding and each spring blooming to keep the memory of their "boys" beautifully bright. And so, as you drive along these quiet by-paths of the world you see the results; dogwoods in white bloom, for those who served and returned; pink dogwood for those who fought and stayed on the battlefields they won.

If you care to, as I did, you can stop in front of a farmyard gate and see at the base of a tree or trees representing the war service rendered from that particular family a plaque bearing the name of the veteran in this age, his period of service, then you must stop with the dogwood somewhere along the way. Look in the evening is the magic time for such visiting. Lead them to the subject gently, then hear an old man or an old woman with the calm that belongs to the old of the hills tell the legend of the dogwood, how the Cross was fashioned from it and because of which the dogwood's petals are marked by spots of the Savior's blood.

I sat with one such and when he had finished the old, old legend he remarked, as a sort of afterthought: "There are different kinds of crosses and my boy carried one for us all."

(Note: As the title of this piece indicates, it is pure fantasy. But it could be written, doubtless with more finesse, and quite truthfully, years from now by some newspaper or magazine writer after a visit to this section of Kentucky—if we now plant the dogwood to grow, as has been suggested, as memorials to those who served Floyd county and their country during this war.)

129 SEEKING OFFICE DRAW FOR POSITION

Only Cooley and Akers On Democratic Ticket Without Opposition

Ninety-seven Democratic candidates and 32 Republicans drew for position on the primary election ballot at the courthouse here Tuesday morning.

Names of candidates for Circuit Judge, Commonwealth's Attorney and Judge of the Court of Appeals from the Seventh appellate district will be certified by the Secretary of State and their position on the ballot is not determined by draw as in the case of candidates for whom the citizens of only one county or subdivision vote.

The July 5 midnight deadline for registration of candidates passed without any major political developments. But when the registration was closed only two Democratic candidates for office in this county were unopposed. These two who escaped opposition are W. W. Cooley, candidate for re-election as Circuit Court Clerk, and Clive Akers, up for re-election as Tax Commissioner.

Four Republican candidates for county offices are unopposed and the party has not offered a candidate for Circuit Judge, Commonwealth's Attorney, County Attorney or Tax Commissioner.

Section's Stockyards Named in Suits Filed By OPA at Lexington

The Lexington Office of Price Administration today filed seven injunction suits in U.S. district court seeking to stop alleged illicit meat operations in Eastern Kentucky, it is announced.

Named in the suits are:

The Big Sandy Stockyards, Paintsville; the Paintsville Livestock Market, Paintsville, and R. M. Gillespie, operator of the Allen Livestock Market, Prestonsburg, charged with failure to keep proper records and failure to sell livestock by weight.

The Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company, Earl Palmer and Bedford Burnett of Middleboro, retail meat dealers, charged with improper grading of meat, or offering to sell ungraded meat, selling or offering to sell meat at above maximum prices and failure to collect ration points.

A. J. Dalton, retail merchant and slaughterer, of Pikeville, charged with failure to register his slaughtering establishment with the OPA and also with failure to have his meat graded.

BEER RETAILERS TOLD TO FILE NEW PRICES

All beer retailers must file a new price schedule as of July 11, it was said here this week by Green R. Allen, price clerk of the War Price and Rationing Board.

New beer ceilings were announced as 21c per 12-ounce bottle of all "premium" beers and ales and 16c for same size bottle on cheaper brands. These prices include tax.

WLB HEARING IS PROMISED NEXT WEEK

Ky. W. Va. Workers Vote for Strike But Defer Work Stoppage

A "temporary cessation" of the two-day United Fuel strike was effected Wednesday night, with the War Labor Board promising that a hearing on the wage issue would begin next week.

One major gas company of the Tri-State region was beset by striking workmen and another was threatened with the same production crisis this week following NLRB polls of workmen held in connection with wage increase demands.

The United Fuel Gas Company's huge volume of gas piped from Eastern Kentucky and West Virginia to industrial and domestic consumers in Kentucky, West Virginia, Ohio and states farther east had dropped from a normal flow of 350,000,000 cubic feet a day to around 10,000,000.

An overwhelming strike vote was announced this week following a NLRB-conducted poll of employees of the Kentucky West Virginia Gas Company who are members of Prestonsburg Local, International Oil Workers Union.

A hearing commissioner last April approved a blanket 10-cent raise in hourly wages, with a five-cent bonus for night work for the union but delay of the War Labor Board in taking action on his recommendation led to the vote to strike to compel a decision, it was said. Union officials said they asked for a 21-cent raise.

Of the 222 workmen eligible to vote on the Kentucky West Virginia strike question, 190 voted—164 to strike, 24 against, with two ballots voided.

Ed Sutton, Langley, president of the local, said an Associated Press dispatch quoting him as saying a strike decision has been deferred till July 22 is incorrect. "I said a decision has been deferred temporarily," Mr. Sutton said. "A strike could be called within the next 24 hours."

R. L. Pitts, Prestonsburg, the local's secretary-treasurer, Monday received a telegram from the War Labor Board stating the case had been settled, and one union official expressed the opinion a decision favoring the union has been reached.

The Warfield Natural Gas Company, operating in this section, is a subsidiary of United Fuel, and as a result its big Warco compressor station became idle at midnight Monday. The Goldman station operated through Tuesday but the strike was expected to suspend its operation. The Warco station handles approximately 65,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily at this season of the year and employs from 35 to 40 men. Pipeline and meter men employed by the company were working Tuesday but a company official would not hazard a guess as to future effect of the strike begun in compressor stations.

In all, the United Fuel system has 22 compressor stations and practically all these were down this week. The union agreed to permit use of 100,000,000 cubic feet of gas daily

102 Floyd Countians Receive Discharges Since May 1st

ARMY TO RETURN 2,000,000 SOLDIERS TO CIVILIAN LIFE IN NEXT 12 MONTHS

Since May 1, 102 Floyd county service men have returned to civilian life, the two draft boards of the county announced this week.

Congressman A. J. May, Prestonsburg, reported, following hearings by the Military Affairs Committee, of which he is chairman, that 100,000 men were returned to the nation's civilian life last month, although the army had planned on the release of 30,000 less. Demobilization began May 12, four days after V-E Day.

During the next 12 months, Maj. Gen. Stephen G. Henry, assistant chief of staff, told the Military Affairs Committee, the army expects to return 2,000,000 soldiers to civilian status and at the same time to induct 800,000 through Selective Service to maintain an army of 7,000,000. This month, the army plans to release from duty 100,000. On through the year the number given discharges will increase till January, 1946, when the number discharged will level off at 200,000 a month up till May, 1946.

POST-WAR INDUSTRIES TO BE TOPIC OF DISCUSSION HERE NEXT THURSDAY

The Kiwanis and Woman's Clubs of Prestonsburg this week issued an invitation to all Floyd countians to hear Congressman A. J. May and others discuss potential post-war industries for the county at the Methodist Church here Thursday evening, next week.

"Floyd county, the third richest in Kentucky in natural resources, can attract new industries after the war and for that reason this meeting is highly important," a spokesman for the two clubs said. "The meeting is non-political and not of a religious nature; it is solely for the purpose of planning for the future, with every citizen invited to sit in."

Congressman May, sponsor in Congress of canalization of the Big Sandy, which is regarded as a definite post-war undertaking, may discuss this and other industrial angles, including the possibility of a coal hydrogenation plant for this county. Mark K. Reed, prominent Floyd county coal operator, has been invited to preside as master of ceremonies.

The meeting will begin at 8 p.m. Earlier in the evening, Mr. May and other speakers will be guests of the Prestonsburg Kiwanis Club at its weekly meeting.

It is becoming increasingly apparent that I will not get to see each of you before the election and so I am taking this means of thanking each of you as personally as this sort of statement can be made for the enthusiastic support a great majority of the good people of Floyd county are giving me in my race for the Democratic nomination for County Court Clerk.

Much of this support is coming without solicitation. It is coming from the goodness of your hearts and from your deep sense of fair play. Such spontaneous friendship, uninspired by political pull and the power of wealth, is the real sort and I appreciate it all the more.

I am willing to admit that no man's record in the service of his country at war alone qualifies him for public office. I have never claimed that. I did all I could, and gladly, as a member of the Eighth Air Force and because of that service am now disabled. But, were I not qualified, and were my character not such as to merit the votes of Floyd county's people, I would be rendering my home county and people a dis-service by asking their support.

I received my grade and high school education in the schools of this county, was graduated from Caney Junior College, attended Morehead State Teachers College and studied pre-law at the University of Kentucky. I taught in the Floyd and Greenup county schools and how well I did my job may be learned from the Superintendents of these schools or from the pupils and parents where I taught. I was teaching when I volunteered for service in the army.

As for experience in the office of County Court Clerk, I do not have it—and who does except the present Clerk and a few assistants? No other has had a chance to gain experience in that office for 16 years.

But surely none will contend that any citizen with an adequate education, industry and conscientious desire to serve the people could not do the job. If this matter of experience is to be argued as a bar to any other man or woman holding the office of County Clerk, a "Vice" County Clerk should be named immediately and be given intensive training, so that in the event of the present Clerk's illness or death the office could be run without confusion in the county's records. Every official is for a matter of a few weeks, inexperienced when he first takes office, but that is only natural and is no lasting handicap to any individual of normal intelligence.

I have no criticism to make of my opponent either as a man or as an official. I merely contend that he is not indispensable. And I do assure you I can and will do the job as County Clerk as efficiently and at less cost to the County and State.

My election would give recognition not only to me but to all other young men and women who served during this war at very low pay while those at home for whom they served and fought lived in comparative safety and while many grew rich.

I assure the people of Floyd county that I do not propose to make politics my career. I will not be seeking this office, years on end. I will give your boy or your girl a chance. I believe in democracy and the democratic way of life for which we fought.

I ask every believer in fair play, every father and mother and all other relatives of boys who went to fight in a war not of their own making to join me in winning this election. And we shall win—no power of wealth or influence can turn the people away from doing what they know to be just and right. All we have to do is "carry on" till the vote is cast and counted. This is a mission from which we will not turn back.

Please accept my sincerest thanks for your kindness. It will not be forgotten.

GROVER PAGE, a COURIER-JOURNAL cartoonist for almost thirty years, is a visual editorialist who interprets the news with his brush and pen. The war, international politics with their vast implications, national, regional and local affairs... all are reflected in his work.

He calls himself a "short order" artist because he executes most of his sketches in about half an hour. However, they are preceded by endless thought, and quite often, conferences with Courier-Journal editors. His cartoons, built upon a solid foundation of accumulated fact, are usually taken directly from stories in the morning paper... which he digests with his breakfast. Besides his daily cartoon, he produces an astringent Sunday strip of the week's outstanding events.

Grover insists that a cartoonist never stops working except when he sleeps, as even his small, every-day experiences give him material to translate the world's most complicated situations. His own interests are varied... they have to be in his job! You can tell, for example, that he is an ardent fisherman from the angler influence in many of his drawings.

Grover came to The Courier-Journal from The Nashville Tennessean. Previously he studied art in Chicago, for since he was ten, he determined to cartoon. Even so, he started out as a mechanical engineer and his first cartoon was published at sixteen, when he was working on a water supply project in his home town of Gastonia, North Carolina.

Famous for his prize winning wood-cuts as well as cartoons, Grover has taken many of them from drawings he's made in rural Kentucky and Southern Indiana. His son, Staff Sgt. Grover Page, Jr., inherits his father's talent and is now a front-line sketcher with the 38th Division in the South Pacific.

The Pages live in Louisville, though their first seventeen years in this part of the country were spent in New Albany, Indiana. Grover plans to stay here the rest of his life, working at the same drawing board he has used for almost thirty years.
