

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

Mieman Fellows at Haward

FOR three consecutive years a staff member of our papers has been awarded the Nieman Fellowship at Harvard University.

The Lucius Nieman Fellowships were established in 1939 by Mrs. Agnes Wahl Nieman in memory of her husband, former publisher of The Milwaukee Journal. The Fellowships are offered working journalists of at least three years' experience.

The whole field of instruction at Harvard is open to Nieman Fellows. They are permitted to take courses in any department or school of the University. No technical courses designated as courses in journalism are offered, nor are special courses of study established for Fellows. The purpose of the Fellowships is not to give technical training in journalism but rather to enable the Fellows to increase their competence in subjects with which they have to deal as writers or editors.

About twelve Fellowships are awarded annually. Competition each year has been of such an order as to insure a representative selection.

In 1943 Paul Hughes, city editor of The Louisville Times, was the first Louisvillian and second Kentuckian to receive this award. Hughes specialized in post-war problems. On assignment as war correspondent in the Pacific, his personalized reports of fighting men from this area will soon appear daily in The Times and Sunday Courier-Journal. He will also record voice interviews for radio station WHAS.

In 1944 Ed Edstrom, assistant Sunday editor of The Courier-Journal, won a Fellowship which he used to study economics and municipal government. Edstrom writes for The Passing Show and The Roto-Magazine. His most recent articles have been on city planning for post-war Louisville.

Cary Robertson, Sunday editor of The Courier-Journal, is one of ten American journalists awarded the Nieman Fellowship this year. Robertson, who edits the Roto-Magazine, The Passing Show and supervises other Sunday sections, said he intended "to study history, economics and public opinion with the idea of working on some of the causes of the rise and fall of newspapers." He will be on a leave of absence from the newspaper from September until June, 1946.

To have had three of our staff men selected for Fellowships out of a total number less than 40 for the three years is an honor which these newspapers appreciate. It is, too, we think, a recognition of the high quality of the work which they and other members of our staffs put into these papers.







TIDBITS OF KENTUCKY **FOLKLORE**

By GORDON WILSON, Ph.D.

A SICK COMPLEX We used to take for granted that we would have chills and fever every summer and hardly expected to 80 pass any season without our due quota. This was looked upon as a necessary part of our being human beings. In spite of this philosophical attitude, though, we got a sick complex, which asserted itself in many ways. If there is anything that separates the thinking of my boyhood time from that part of my children's lives it is this very acceptance, in a .00 sort of dreary way, of what we now .00 know is preventable. Sickness used 00 to be almost fashionable; now health is contagious, and we want to apol-

ogize for being "under the weather."

My Fidelity neighborhood lay at the edge of swampy ground, where malaria mosquitoes lived in abun-.00 dance. Screens were unknown until I was almost grown; we failed to connect our sudden loss of the annual round of chills and fever with .70 the installing of screens. It is true 50 that some of the swamps were .64 drained, but not all the breeding grounds of the mosquito were ob-literated. People had always had ague; it was controllable with quin-.00 ine, and anybody could take quinine 50 after capsules were invented. body then seemed to suspect that malaria might undermine a fellow's health and get him into the proper solution to take tuberculosis or .16 anything else that was takable. Consumption, as we knew it, was supposed to be wholly hereditary, and it was obvious that certain families, good and bad, rich and poor, white and colored, had more cases than others. In so regarding this disease, we were no more ignorant and no wiser than the rest of the world, beyond our limited vision. Smallpox, however, had practically ceased to be, for all the country doctors practiced vaccination, and there was no left-over, so far as I can recall, of .32 the idea that smallpox was a direct .86 visitation of Providence because of 05 some open or secret sin. Even the children proudly displayed vaccination scars, as so many badges .86 of forethoughtedness. Just before my .09 time a fearful scourge of smallpox 25 had swept through our area, wiping out whole families or leaving badlymarked people. That caused even the most old-fashioned to consider .40 the common sense of being vacci-.05 nated.

3.15 I wish that other diseases could have been sensibly viewed. Many a farm had cows with tuberculosis, know now. Scrofula was rather com-45 mon, so common that many people 3.74 felt that it was a sort of blessing, because victims of it in otherwise tubercular families often failed to take consumption of the regular .80 kind. The idea of isolation or quar-.00 antine was hooted at except for .75 smallpox. As a result, such diseases as measles often spread like wildfire, maining people or even killing the very young and the very old. One of my schoolmates, home from a few months of wandering to see the world, went to a party or open house where all the people of a whole community had gathered. He knew when he went that he had fever and that he had recently been exposed to measles, but he wanted to see the neighbors. Three of the ones he saw that night died of measles taken 40 from him, and my father, the coun-80 try doctor, had great difficulty in saving the lives of several others. of the dread diseases that can be prevented by pasteurization of milk, I know of dozens of people of education and people in authority who sneer at the idea of there being danger in milk from a cow that is able to be up on her feet. Some day 40 we will be as careful about milk as we are now about smallpox, I hope,

Farmers have another real inter-122.80 est in inflation control. One of its 73.90 purposes is to enable persons with 98.00 modest incomes to get their share 98.50 of scarce goods. The farm popula-tion includes large numbers whose 96.80 incomes are relatively low. Inflation 83.75 control is a real protection to them 74,30 as long as there is danger of prices 87.90 getting out of hand.

78.90 Farm land prices on the average the country over have been rising 220.10 steadily during the war. In some 19.00 areas, the increase has approached 61.02 boom proportions. A lifting of price 72.38 controls before the danger is past would open the door to a speculative 11.90 boom. This would lead to piling up 27.40 of mortgage debts which in many 17.90 cases would be way out of line with long-run farm earnings. Such a re-32.00 sult would spell foreclosure and dis-22.50 aster for many farmers when the in-10.66 evitable reaction sets in.

Many farmers who normally would have retired have remained 44.60 on the job to help meet war needs. 19.88 A larger than usual turnover of 4.00 farms consequently is in prospect 4.92 after the war. Many of those taking over will be returning war veterans. It will be most unfortunate of these 50.90 transfers take place at inflated land .516.00 prices. Here is another strong reason for continuing the protection

Additional controls, 69.40 particularly to limit and discourage land speculation, are in order. While controls need to remain in force 18.00 during the danger period, individ-39.75 uals also will do well to bear in mind that self-restraint remains an important weapon against inflation.
