

Bill provides that education or training institutions shall include all public or private elementary, secondary, and other institutions furnishing education for adults, business schools and colleges, scien- Robinson tific institutions, colleges, local schools, junior colleges, teachers colleges, normal schools, professional schools, universities and other eduschools, universities and other eduschools. schools, universities and other edu-cational institutions and shall also Rogers, Jovce Eileen Short. including business and other estab- Good

Before a veteran begins his education or training allowed under the G.I. Bill he should ascertain that the institution in which he intends to enroll for his course is an approved institution. Such institutions must be approved by the State Department of Education. Establishments desiring state approval should contact this office.

A trainee veteran may receive subsistence allowance while train-

A trainee veteran may receive subsistence allowance while training on the job. This allowance is in addition to any wage or salary paid by an employer to a trainee. In evry occupation there is a wage or salary which represents the minimum entrance wage of a journeyman in that occupation. An employer may pay a trainee salary representing the difference between the subsistence allowance provided by the federal government and the "journeyman's pay." The combined wage cannot exceed the minimum wage for such occupation. wage cannot exceed the minimum wage for such occupation.

A disabled veteran in receipt of pension benefits may receive the full amount of subsistence allowed under the G.I. Bill provided the combined totals do not exceed \$92 per month for a veteran without dependents and \$103.50 per month for a veteran with dependents. The only time these amounts may be exceeded is for a disabled service veteran eli-gible for benefits under Public Law No. 16, 78th Congress (Vocational Rehabilitation), is to be rejected for such benefits. The veteran may then receive the full amount of his pension and subsistence allowance regardless of their combined totals while in training under the G.I. Bill.

At no time is the veteran's pen-

sion award adjusted. Only on the subsistence allowance may adjust-ments be made. Veterans taking part-time courses will have their subsistence allowance adjusted accordingly. Veterans taking correspondence courses will receive no subsistence allowance.

The Veterans' Administration is allowing a veteran in school under the G.I. Bill to work part-time without affecting the subsistence allowance. However, a veteran must maintain passing grades at all times or corrective action will be suggested.

Veterans taking institutional training and employed full time will receive no subsistence allowance.

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
