Shotgun Shell Famine Ends as 40 Million Rounds "Unfroze"

Duck, pheasant and other small game hunters will have plenty of 12-

gauge shotgun shells on hand this fall for their favorite sport, an announcement issued in Washington by the Office of Surplus Property, Department of Commerce, states.

Over 40,000,000 rounds of 12-gauge shells, frozen for military use since the start of the war, will be sold this month to dealers throughout the eleven United States Regional Offices of the Office of Surplus Property.

The sale began Saturday, Oct. 13. The ammunition being sold is of the standard commercial type used by hunters and includes both "birdshot" and "buckshot."

To effect equitable distribution, minimum and maximum quantities which may be purchased have been established. Dealers in Kentucky, Ohio, Indiana and West Virginia can obtain full information on this offering by contacting the Office of Surplus Property, Department of Commerce, 704 Race Street, Cincinnati, Ohio.

Appeals Body Cites Martin Candidates

The opinion quoted Special Judge W. D. O'Neal, Whitesburg, who tried two Republican primary contests and who declared the practice appeared to have become a custom in Martin. He added candidates had to join in unless they wanted to be considered lacking in generosity. The Appellate Court upheld Judge O'Neal's decision that James Horn defeated "Big Bill" Stepp for nomination as Sheriff, and Rus Cassidy beat Crit Parsley for County Clerk. Judge O'Neal added that all four spent considerable money not only for the donations, but also for conveying voters to the polls. He said there was no proof, however, of the charges and counter-charges of buying votes.

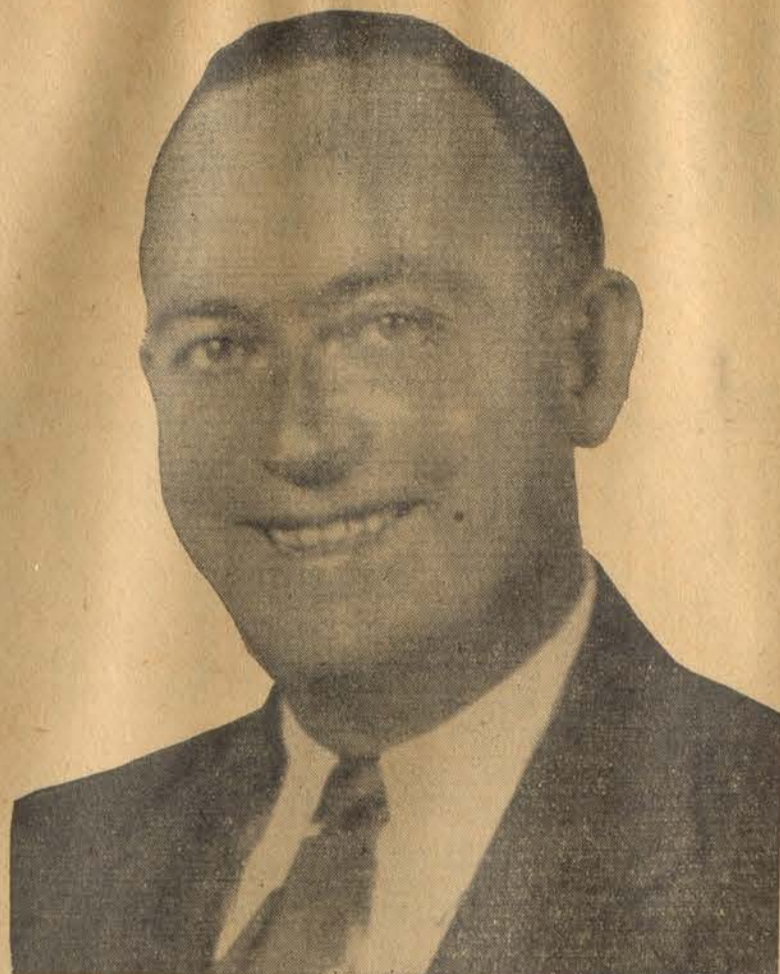

Instead, I have protected them, and I promise you now that your boys and girls will be protected and cared for by sober, discreet men. I promise you to protect your schools and churches at all times. All the high school principals will tell you that any time they need an officer during entertainments of any kind, I am always anxious and willing to be there.

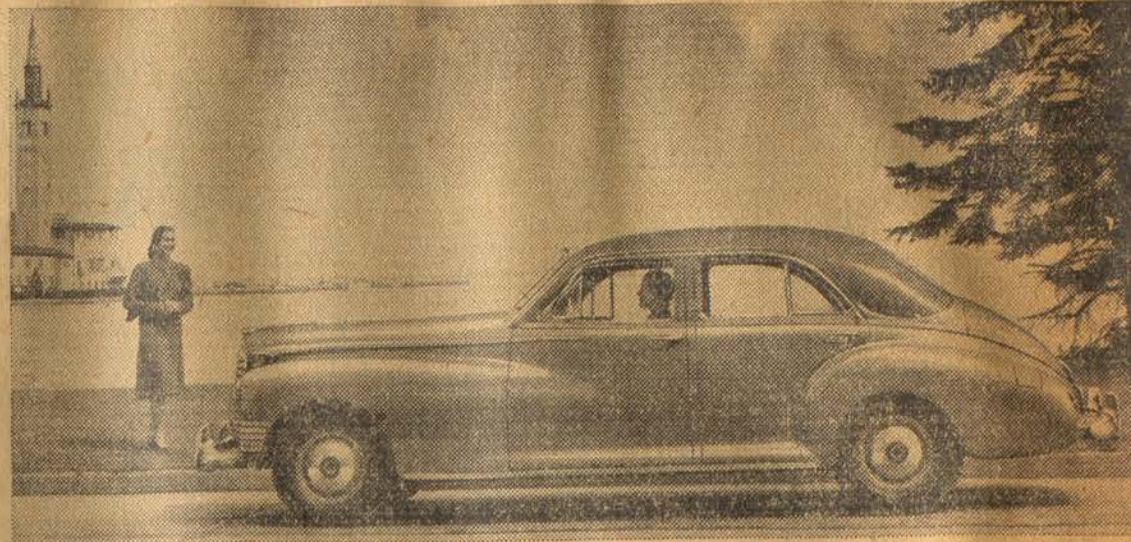

TRAINING-ON-THE-JOB UNDER THE "G.I. BILL"

The G.I. Bill provides that education or training institutions shall include all public or private elementary, secondary, and other institutions furnishing education for adults, business schools and colleges, scientific institutions, colleges, local schools, junior colleges, teachers colleges, normal schools, professional schools, universities and other educational institutions and shall also include business and other establishments providing training on the job.

Before a veteran begins his education or training allowed under the G.I. Bill he should ascertain that the institution in which he intends to enroll for his course is an approved institution. Such institutions must be approved by the State Department of Education. Establishments desiring state approval should contact this office.

A trainee veteran may receive subsistence allowance while training on the job. This allowance is in addition to any wage or salary paid by an employer to a trainee. In every occupation there is a wage or salary which represents the minimum entrance wage of a journeyman in that occupation. An employer may pay a trainee salary representing the difference between the subsistence allowance provided by the federal government and the "journeyman's pay." The combined wage cannot exceed the minimum wage for such occupation.

A disabled veteran in receipt of pension benefits may receive the full amount of subsistence allowed under the G.I. Bill provided the combined totals do not exceed \$92 per month for a veteran without dependents and \$103.50 per month for a veteran with dependents. The only time these amounts may be exceeded is for a disabled service veteran eligible for benefits under Public Law No. 16, 78th Congress (Vocational Rehabilitation), is to be rejected for such benefits. The veteran may then receive the full amount of his pension and subsistence allowance regardless of their combined totals while in training under the G.I. Bill.

At no time is the veteran's pension award adjusted. Only on the subsistence allowance may adjustments be made. Veterans taking part-time courses will have their subsistence allowance adjusted accordingly. Veterans taking correspondence courses will receive no subsistence allowance.

The Veterans' Administration is allowing a veteran in school under the G.I. Bill to work part-time without affecting the subsistence allowance. However, a veteran must maintain passing grades at all times or corrective action will be suggested.

Veterans taking institutional training and employed full time will receive no subsistence allowance.
