Pike Countian Dies As Truck Misses Maytown Bridge

An ex-soldier was dead and a Floyd county schoolgirl in a critical condition as a result of highway ac-

condition as a result of highway accidents in the county Tuesday aftermoon and night.

Wilson Lynch, 30 years old, a veteran of World War II, and a resident of Coal Run, Pike county, died instantly of a broken neck when a Pinson Transfer Company truck in which he was riding missed the highway bridge across Right Beaver Creek at Maytown and plunged into the stream.

Near death in the Beaver Valley hospital, Martin, is 15-year-old Ticker Conn, of Printer, who was hit on the highway at Printer Tuesday afternoon by a truck owned by Henry Porter, Allen coal operator, and driven by Glenn Faulkner. Her skull was fractured and, yet unconscious, she is paralyzed on the right side of her body. the stream.

Thurman Maynard, Zebulon, Ky,, driver of the transfer truck in which the ex-soldier died, is said to have missed the road to Pikeville, turning up Route 30 instead of following Route 23. In the darkness and driving through snow, he lost the road. Maynard suffered shock.

According to the report received here, Miss Conn had alighted from a Sparks Brothers bus, traveling up the highway and parked on the inside of the curve at Salisbury, only a few seconds before being hit. It was said she walked around the rear of the bus and against the bed of the coal truck which rounded the curve from the opposite direction.

Faulkner, driver of the truck, was placed under \$1,000 bond by County Judge E. P. Hill. The injured girl is a daughter of John Conn, of Printer.

"The home service workers of the

Floyd County Chapter are ready to help these veterans and their families. They are entitled to all available assistance in solving personal and family problems just as they were during the time the man

served with the armed forces," Miss White explained.

The primary responsibility for care of the veteran is that of the government. Legislation provides the veteran with mustering-out payments, employment service, unemployment allowance, education, training, hospital and medical care, pensions. allowance, education, training, hospital and medical care, pensions, and other benefits—but a very important part of effecting permanent adjustment must be carried out by home folks. They carry out those personal services which only neighbors and friends can perform. For many veterans, federal legislation may not solve their problems but rather present new ones to be solved. Thus the home service workers of Floyd County Chapter will give the friendly interpretative service which will aid the veteran and his family. The laws passed for benefits of veterans lose most of their value unless the local community assumes its proper share in assisting veterans






