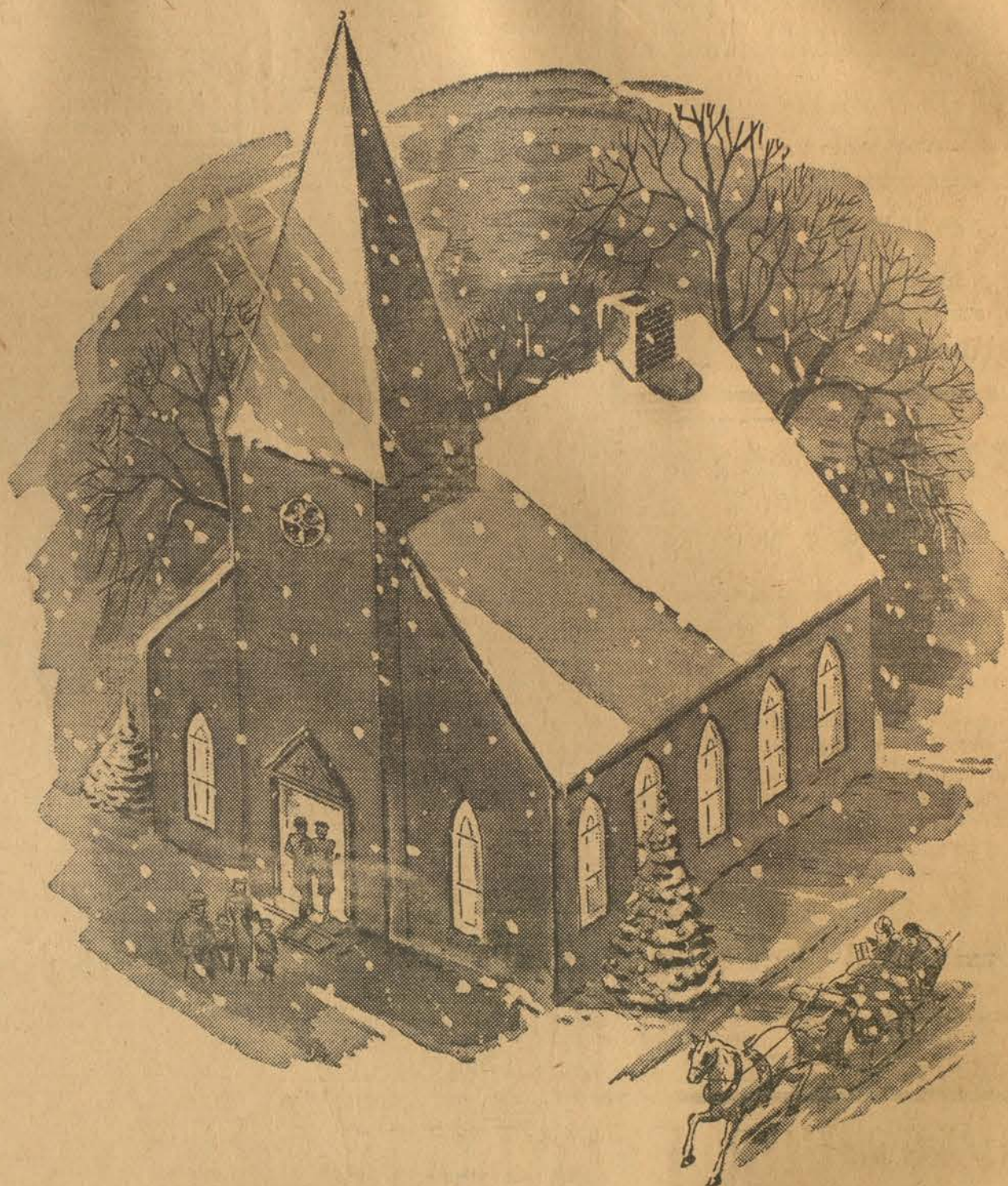

War casualties are returning to their homes in increasing numbers. Some are physically disabled, having lost arms or legs in the service of their country, but other wounds may not be physical.

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The primary responsibility for care of the veteran is that of the government. Legislation provides the veteran with mustering-out payments, employment service, unemployment allowance, education, training, hospital and medical care, pensions, and other benefits—but a very important part of effecting permanent adjustment must be carried out by home folks.

The Club's resolution reads: "Whereas, we have read with real concern the article in The Courier-Journal of Dec. 2, calling attention to present conditions in Kentucky's system of education;

And, whereas, we believe that every child is entitled to a sound education for worthy citizenship and should be encouraged to remain in school at least until the age of 18;

And, whereas, we have learned of the urgent need for sufficient funds to provide for better teachers and better schools whereby a suitable education may be available for the youth of our state;

Therefore, we (the Woman's Club of Wheelwright, Ky.), do go on record, this 10th day of December, 1945, with the following action:

1. We approve of the 17 points in the Kentucky Education Association's legislative program;

2. We urge our legislators to do all in their power for the passage of legislation necessary for reaching the goals set forth in the 17-point program, and thus raise the standard of education in our state.

The secretary of the club, Mrs. Stephen W. Clark, reports that copies of the resolution of the Club has been forwarded to the legislators.

The Club voted to donate \$5 to the Student Loan fund, supported the Penny Arts fund by a contribution and subscribed \$5 to the International Scholarship fund. A donation of \$10 was also made to the tuberculosis campaign now under way.

The business part of the meeting was adjourned and the social committee, in charge of the program for the evening, presented Mrs. Edith Fitzpatrick James and her glee club, which rendered a beautiful selection of Christmas carols. At conclusion of the program, refreshments were served by the social committee and hostesses to club members and Mrs. Wally Cummings and Mrs. James, who were guests. Jap Prison Survivor Is Hunting Accident Victim in Virginia Capt. David A. Hurt, 42, U.S. submarine commander who survived 42 months of Jap prison life after his sub was damaged and scuttled in the Pacific, met death recently in a hunting accident in Russell county, Va., a few weeks after his return to the country. The naval officer, a brother of J. R. Hurt, Prestonsburg coal operator, was instantly killed when he tripped and fell on his gun. 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Wayland Paratrooper Wins the Silver Star Near Champs, Belgium The Silver Star for gallantry in action was presented Cpl. Orville Hansford, of Wayland, on December 13 in the office of the commanding officer, Kennedy General Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee. Col. Albert E. McEvers made the presentation. Cpl. Hansford, a former member of the 502nd parachute infantry, received the high award for gallantry, and the citation is as follows: "On January 3, 1945, in the vicinity of Champs, Belgium, officers of a relieving unit were pinned down by enemy automatic weapon fire emanating from commanding positions 200 yards away. Observing this, Cpl. Hansford immediately instructed part of his squad to cover his movements with fire and led the remainder of the squad in a vigorous assault against the enemy positions. His action was so effective that 14 of the enemy were captured, 10 killed and 25 forced to flee. Through his courage and aggressiveness, commanding ground was gained, enabling adjacent units to advance and obtain more advantageous positions. His actions were in accordance with the highest standards of the military service."

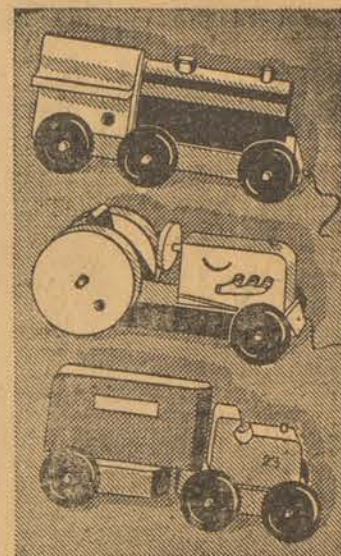

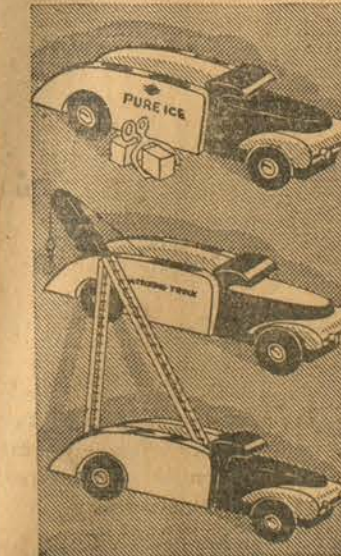

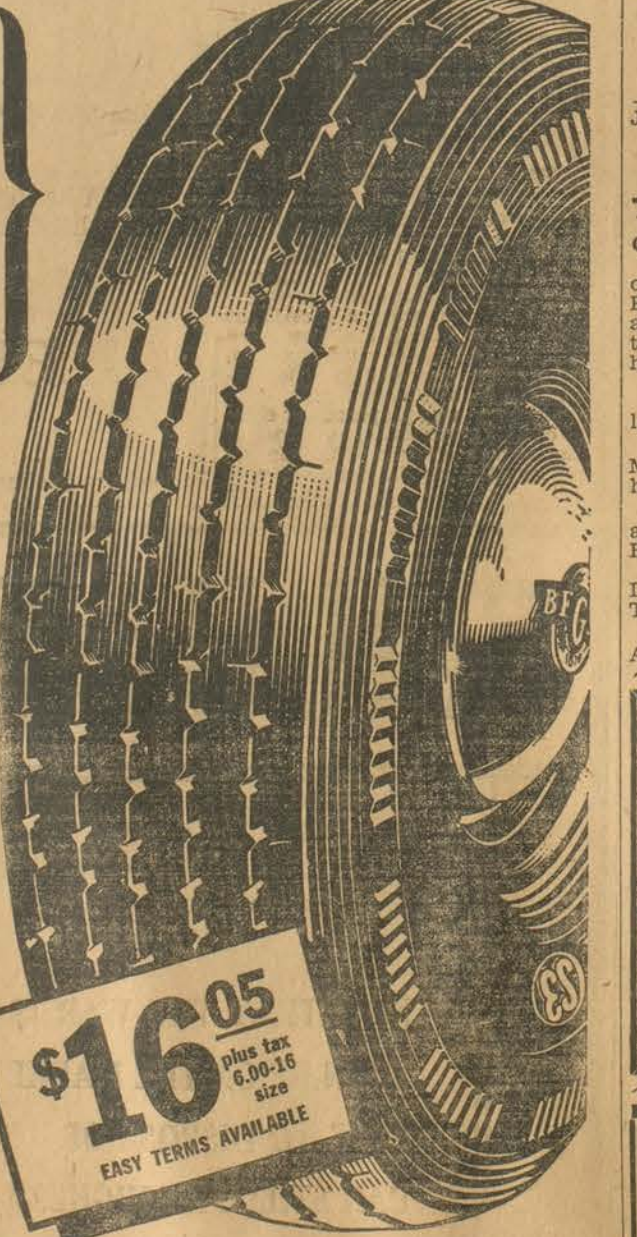
