

#### ... a State of Lawlessness Exists ...

WHEN Commonwealth's Attorney John Chris Cornett last Thursday morn-

ing moved that the Commonwealth be granted a change of venue for the trial of Lonnie Robinson on a charge of murdering two Prestonsburg policemen, much of the import of his words did not "register" with courtroom spectators and with others who later read and heard of his statement.

Quietly, dispassionately, the prosecutor stated the need for a trial outside Floyd county and surrounding counties. There was nothing of the dramatic or sensational about the way he said it-to him it was a plain statement of factbut the words shrieked a challenge to all law-abiding people in this section.

John Chris Cornett said, in part:

'Such a state of lawlessness exists in Floyd county and adjacent counties thereto that a fair trial cannot be had in Floyd county.'

The man accused of shooting to death two men garbed in the uniform and vested with the duties of law-enforcement officers did not ask for trial elsewhere. It was the Commonwealth that feared justice could not be had. Thus is the challenge to those who respect the law and abhor lawlessness emphasized.

Some men will say Mr. Cornett would better have served the county had he left this unsaid; they will say THE TIMES

on feed.

would better serve by ignoring it. But we contend that the cry of "Fire!" is justified when the conflagration is apparent; that refusal of those who see the fire to heed will not put it out.

The Commonwealth's Attorney was qualified to speak and was entitled to speak. Although here only a month, he was in a position to know. Daily he saw intimately the activities about him as the circuit court sought to arrive at the "golden mean" of justice for accused and accuser alike. Police here and officers over the county had first-hand information of conditions; their knowledge was available to him.

This statement of Mr. Cornett's does not mean that men are prowling every town and hamlet and countryside, murder-bent, guns in hand. It does not mean that the peaceable citizen cannot go and come without danger of death or injury.

It goes deeper than that-to the spirit that prevails the county and neighboring counties. This is the spirit that is as truly lawless as that of the hair-in-eyes beetlebrow whose intellect has never risen above his bestial instincts. It is the spirit which possesses some so-called "good people"—that the law is a rule only for others, a scrap of paper to be cast aside if it interferes with their own desires. It is the spirit which leads men and women to cast their lot with the criminal rather than with law and order and those who represent such orderliness.

To overcome this "state of lawless-ness" the courts will need to dedicate themselves to the high emprise of demanding plain and simple justice for ev-ery individual; officers of the law will need to conduct themselves, personally, and officially, with a deeper conscious-ness of duty and of their obligation to every citizen. And the schools and churches will perform a very real service by emphasizing education in good citizen-





## More Headaches for the Farmer

Once more the farmer is being asked to break all food production records. To plow more acres, feed more livestock and harvest more crops than ever before. He is being asked to do this so that America may continue to feed and clothe the needy throughout the world, as well as our own folks at home.

To carry out this job the farmer must have tools of production. Most of those he owns have taken a terrific beating. They can't be tied together much longer with rusty fence wire.

In the teeth of this situation, the farmer ran into a strike in the steel industry—a strike which hit at the heart of food production.

tion has offered a wage rise which if applied throughout the industry would amount to \$135,000,000.

Steel workers are already among the highest paid wage-earners in America. Before the strike their average earnings were approximately \$1.16 an hour, \$9.26 a day and \$46.32 a week--on a forty-hour week. The U.S. Steel offer would have given them about \$1.31 an hour, \$10.46 a day d \$52.32 a week. But they refused it, and accused the steel industry of conspiring to ruin the union with an offered wage increase of \$25 a month, the highest increase in the industry's history.

The strike is a direct violation of contract between the union and the steel companies. The union wanted a long-term contract and got it. The union agreed not to strike during the life of the contract. Yet, the union struck on January 21.
