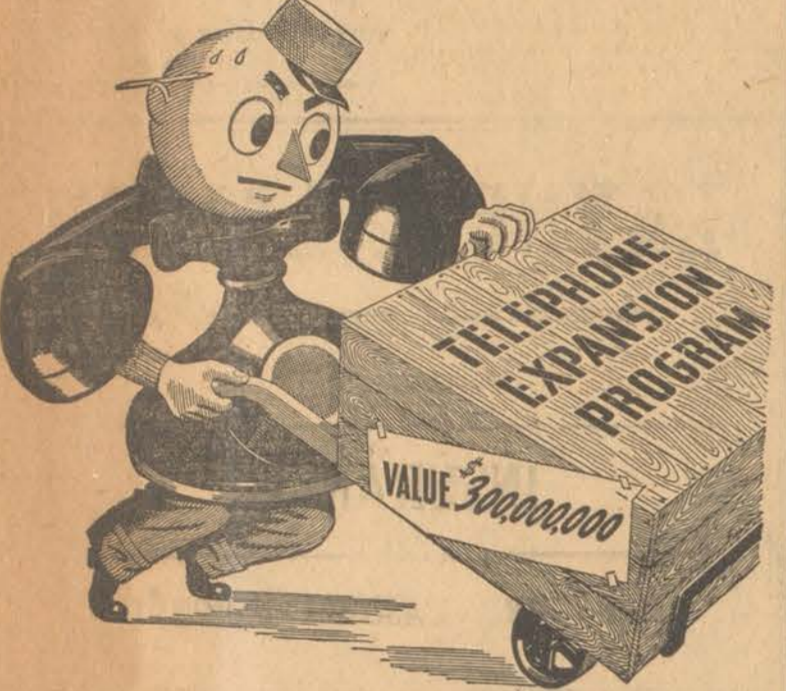
Wheelwright Club Ships 24 Cartons of Clothing
