VOTE \$85,000 BOND ISSUE

To Pay Debt, Build School Structures; Talk Garbage Plan

The Prestonsburg City Council Monday evening adopted an ordinance directing the sale of \$85,000 worth of bonds to retire outstanding bonded indebtedness of the City Board of Education and to construct a Science building and brick gym-nasium for the high school here.

In thus amortizing the indebtedness created in the construction of the grade school here several years the grade school here several years ago, the city in effect acts only as the financial agent of the board of education. The grade school and buildings to be erected by the issue of bonds will be leased by the town to the board of education, with rental actions ago. Although piling up no huge scores against the three teams they played, the Left Beaver Creek boys won by the Left Beaver Creek boys won by wide margins, holding the opposition to scant returns for their efforts. An ordinance providing for the annexation of certain lands to the corporate limits of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as is provided in Sec. 81-210, Kentucky

Upon motion of Clabe Bingham, duly seconded by Frank Layne, the following ordinance was introduced,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE GENERAL COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF PRESTONSBURG, KY.:

Sec. 1. That the following described tracts or parcels of land situate in Floyd county, Kentucky, on the waters of the Big Sandy river, and adjoining and being contiguous to the present eastern limit of the City of Present eastern limit of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, be and the same are hereby annexed to, incorporated within, and made a part of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, Said tracts or parcels of land are more particularly bounded and described as follows:

"BEGINNING at a point on the present eastern corporate limit of the City of Prestonsburg, at the low water mark on the western side of the southern end of Lot No. 1 of Block No. 1, of Richmond Sub-Division No. 2, and running in an easterly direction with the meanders of erly direction with the healiters of the Big Sandy river and along the low water mark of said river, a dis-tance of 3850 feet to a point; thence from said point and in a northwestly direction and in a straight line distance of 500 feet to a point; a distance of 500 feet to a point; thence in a westerly direction and in a straight line a distance of 3850 feet to a point on the present corporate line of said city; thence in a southern direction and along said corporate line a distance of 1025 feet, crossing U.S. 23, to THE POINT OF BEGINNING."




