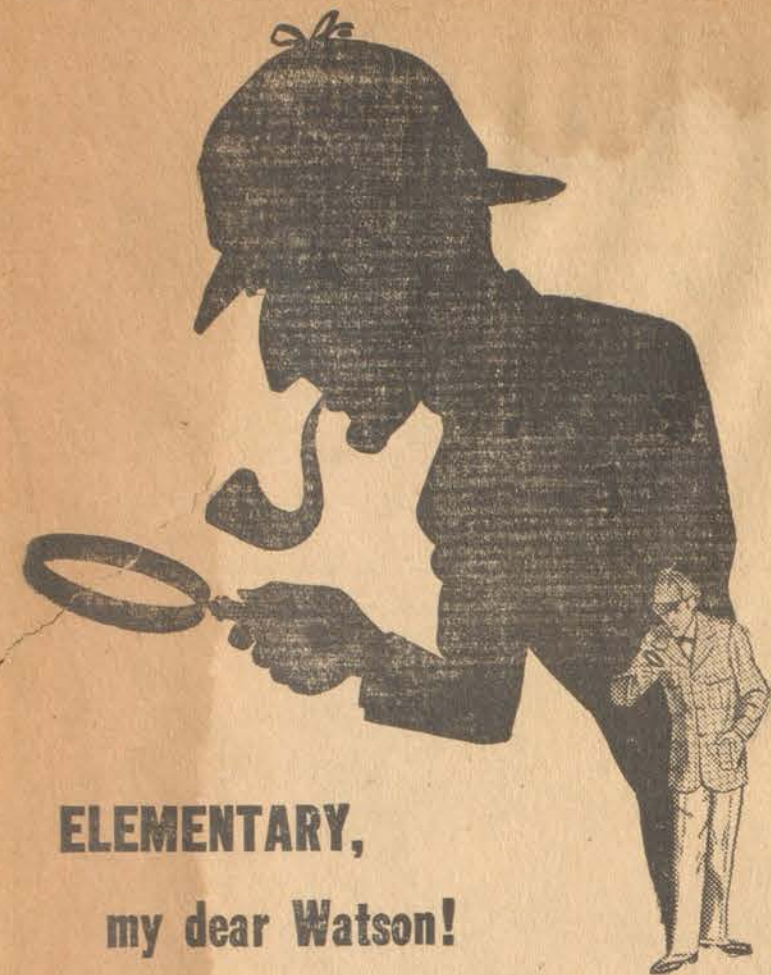

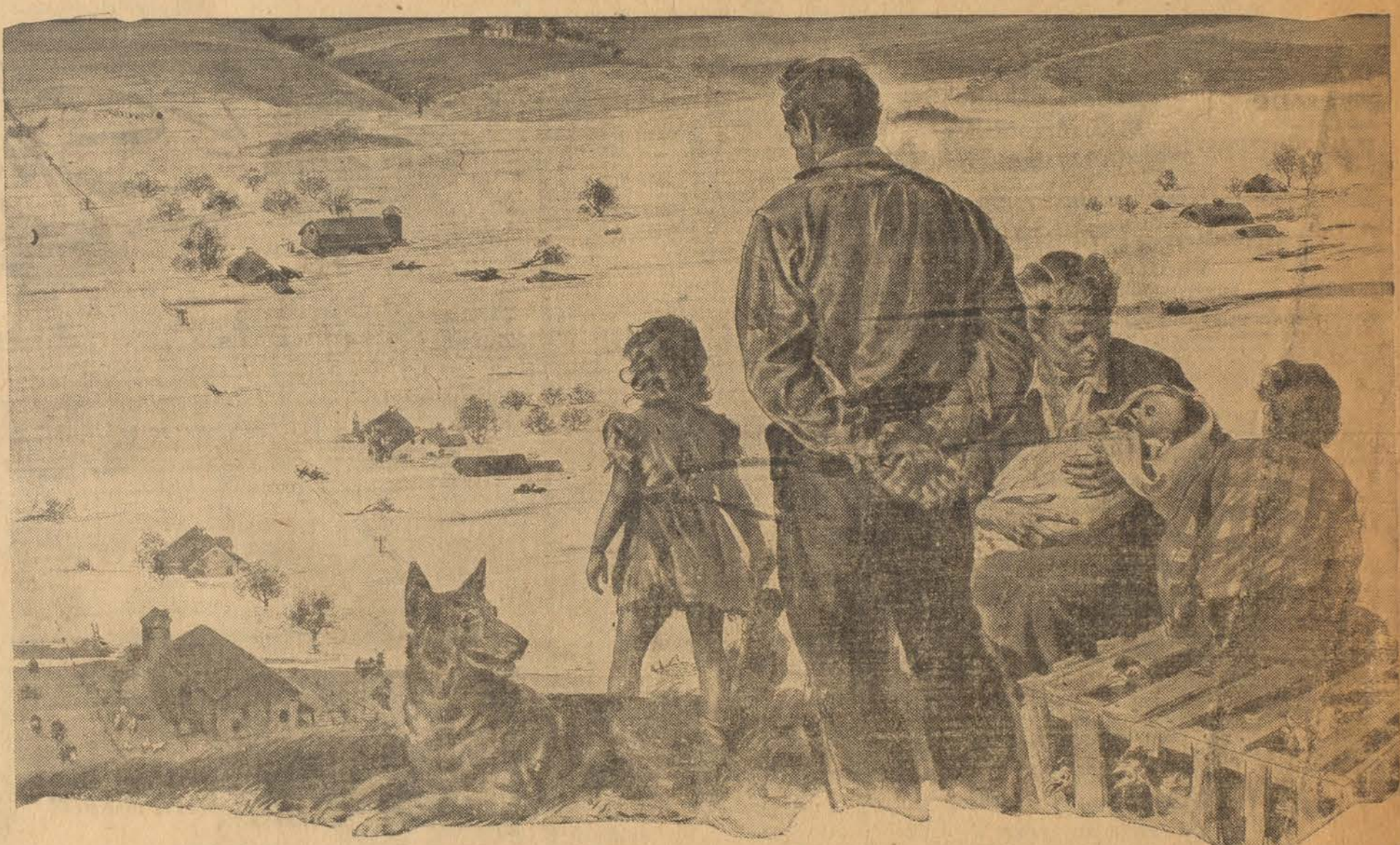

While these larger projects were faltering the Board authorized the Superintendent to purchase sites where needed and to advertise for bids on construction of 10 small frame school buildings. One of these, on Buckeye Fork of Middle Creek, is of two rooms. Another, a one-room school, is to be built at Lancer, supplanting the old school at Eureka, near here. One room is to be added to the Tinker Fork school. The seven others, all one-room buildings, are at Brush Creek, Spewing Camp, Cold Spring, Lick Fork, Buck's Branch, Ivy Creek and Clear Creek.

It is expected that these will be built, since the foundations can be built of rough lumber and no steel or brick will be used.

Because of a six-week break in the teaching schedule at Wayland, caused by a wintertime breakdown of the heating system, the Board has asked the State Department of Education to declare an emergency there and permit six-days-a-week school to recover lost time.

An official of the Floyd County Fish and Game Club said, following last Thursday's banquet, that the club is far short of its membership goal of 2,000 set for 1946. "In fact, according to reports received to date, we actually have only 515 members."

This membership lies mainly, however, in Prestonsburg, Maytown and Allen, with a few at Auxier, and the total may be substantially increased when the membership drives at David, Wayland, Bosco, Garrett and all Left Beaver towns, hitherto unreported, are made.

"Importance of a large membership cannot be too strongly stressed," the club's spokesman said. "We have planned a rather ambitious program, one which should mean much to sportsmen and all others interested in conservation, and without a strong club the work will fail."

Items of the program are:

1. A fish pond at Midas on Right Beaver Creek.
2. Construction of quail brooders and their maintenance and operation.
3. A general program of re-stocking streams and fields with fish and game and the work of protecting wildlife.

It was explained that the Division of Game and Fish does not cost Kentucky one cent; that funds spent in this work are derived solely from the sale of hunting and fishing licenses, and that work of local clubs such as the Floyd county organization is furthered by hunters and fishermen here at home, with division aid.
