Mrs. Homer Parsons, 21, Slain, Husband Wounded, Comptons, Collins Named

An April Pool's Day joke carried into the following day resulted the slaying by pistol fire Tuesday night near Betsy Layne of Mrs. Syl-via Helen Parsons, 21-year-old wife of Homer Parsons, 42, service sta-tion operator, and the wounding of the husband.

Arrested later in the night and jailed here on murder charges in connection with the shooting were Charlie, Basil and Columbus Compton and their brother-in-law, Dan

Mrs. Parsons died instantly with a bullet through her head. Her husband was shot in his side, the bullet ranging downward, and it was said Wednesday morning at the Prestonsburg General hospital, where he underward an operation that he will

At the hospital Parsons told County Attorney W. W. Burchett that the trouble started from the use of a dummy with which some children had been frightening motorists. As Basil Compton approached with his brother-in-law, Collins, as a passenger, the dummy resembling a human figure appeared in the highway and Compton swerved his car to avoid Compton swerved his car to avoid striking it. While the children were laughing about the incident, Parsons said, Compton and Collins became angry and one of them struck D M. Parsons, son of the wounded man. The younger Parsons retaliated in kind and Compton left, leaving Collins behind.

Later, he said, the Compton brothers returned and began firing, entering the building. He said some of those shooting had two revolvers. The husband and wife fell in the floor, in the narrow confines of the service station office. Parsons said the others returned to begin shooting while he and his wife were dressing Collins' head, which had been injured in the first encounter.

Thereupon, he was quoted as saying, Charlie Compton began shooting. Columbus Compton said he took no part in the shooting. Basil Compton told THE TIMES

Wednesday morning that he and his brother Charlie almost wrecked their cars when the dummy appeared on the highway. He admitted that he and Dan Collins left their car, adding that "they beat us up. "I left Dan in the road and went

up to Columbus' home and then we went back to get Dan. A man started hitting me, I don't know who he was. I had Dan and was trying to get away when this man fired three shots. I don't know anything about who fired at them. I had no gun and Dan didn't have any."

He claimed that he had left his brothers, Charlie and Columbus, in his car but that neither was there when he returned. Compton claimed he was afraid to drive back past Parsons' place and that he took Collins on to Wheelwright to a doctor and that there they surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Bill Bryant. Columbus Compton was arrested at Martin bus Compton was arrested at Martin by Deputy Sheriff Harold Conn and Highway Patrolman T. J. Salisbury. Collins was severely beaten, of-ficers said, and Basil Compton had suffered a minor cut on the top of

During the few hours between the time of the shooting and the arrest of the four men, a large number of Floyd county officers with the assis-tance of highway patrolmen searched for them.

A grand jury investigation of the shooting will be made this week.

ORDINANCE

An ordinance correcting certain March 4, 1946 "providing for the construction of a school building and gymnasium for the City of Prestonsconstruction of a school building and gymnasium for the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky; declaring said construction to be a necessity; providing for the issuance of School Improvement and Refunding Revenue Bonds in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 162 and Section 162.150 K.R.S. to pay for the cost of said construction, providing and determining the duty of the City of Prestonsburg, Kentucky, in connection with the operation of said school building and gymnasium and the creation of a fund to pay the interest on and the principal of said bonds as and when they mature and authorizing the execution of a lease on such school buildings and gymnasium to the Prestonsburg Independent School District, Board of Education, Prestonsburg, Kentucky;" and ratifying and approving all steps taken to date in connection with the construction of said school building and the issuance of said bonds.

WHEREAS, the Prestonsburg City home the past the council by ordinance duly enacted on March 4, 1946, provided for the

construction of a school building and the issuance of bonds, etc., as more fully set out hereinabove; and WHEREAS, an error was made in whereas, an erfor was made in the schedule of maturities of said bonds and in the amounts necessary to be paid into the bond and interest redemption fund; and WHEREAS, the City has proceeded with the issuance of said bonds according to the corrected schedule of maturities:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it ordained by the Prestonsburg City Council, Prestonsburg, Kentucky, as follows:

1. That portion of the first literary paragraph of said ordinance relating to the schedule of maturities of said bonds is amended to read as follows:

"maturing yearly on April 1st of each year as follows: \$2,000 in each of the years 1947 to 1960 inclusive; \$3,000 in each of the years 1961 to 1963 inclusive; \$4,000 in each of the years 1964 to 1975 in-clusive."

2. The schedule of payments to be made into the City of Prestonsburg School Building Bond and Interest Redemption Fund is hereby amended by striking off the payments provided for in the years 1976 and 1977.

3. All acts heretofore performed by the City in connection with the

by the City in connection with the issuance and sale of the bonds provided for by said ordinance of March 4, 1946, are hereby ratified and ap-

4. This ordinance shall take effect and be enforced at the earliest date provided by law on and after its publication.



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



Coal Mines Inspected

Recently adopted safety improve-ments and the corrective measures recommended for hazardous conditions and practices in two Eastern Kentucky coal mines are discussed in federal inspection reports releas-ed by the Bureau of Mines this

The two developments, inspected a few weeks ago by government men, are the Princess Elkhorn Coal Comare the Princess Eighnorn Coal Com-pany's 1,150-ton-a-day mine No. 2 which employs 128 men at Permele in Floyd county, and the Columbus Mining Company's 350-ton-a-day No. 10 mine which employs 84 men at Barridge in Perry county. Both operations had been inspected be-fore

Below average accident rates and a number of improvements at Mine No. 2 were commended by Federal Inspector Russell Shaw. The output for each lost-time injury during January-September, 1945, the inspector said, was more than twice the 10,000-ton national average for this tyre of mine Beauti measure. the 10,000-ton national average for this type of mine. Recent improvements included the posting of the systematic timbering plan, a new ventilating fan, use of split system of ventilation, intake air for all haulageways, fireproof rooms for the underground substation, a new escapeway, a weekly examination of return air courses.

Major safety proposals called for strict enforcement of the systematic timbering plan, some haulage, elec-trical and mechanical safeguards, enforcement of the no-smoking rule, and wearing of safety goggles when
