# To the Men & Women of Floyd County



HOWES MEADE

After an absence of many, many months overseas, and now having spent most all of the last three months out among the people in our district, either walking or driving the hard-seated Jeep I acquired from the Army's surplus equipment, I have learned much about the problems that confront our people. Those problems become much clearer when one hears it from farmers toiling in the field, or the miners, railroad men, veterans, merchants and all the other hard-working people who earn their bread by the sweat of their brow. And I can say to you now that I am down-right mad about the circumstances and conditions forced upon my people in these hills. Conditions forced upon a freedom-loving, hardworking people by a group yelling "democracy" while actually taking away the Constitution-guaranteed rights of Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness. I am determined to devote my life to righting these wrongs to my people.

I will enumerate some of these wrongs and, from time to time, I will cover others.

## **EDUCATION**

Under our hills God deposited the greatest stores of natural resources in the world. The country looks to us to supply their needs with our coal, oil and gas. We are great friends of all when it comes to the depletion of our wealth in resources to carry on the wheels of industry in the East. The East grows rich on our resources while we remain at the bottom of the ladder in educational advantages. To see some of the school buildings our children must attend brings tears to the eyes. To realize the mere pittance of salaries afforded our teachers makes one shrink with shame.

When the country went to war we were called upon to contribute and we were glad to contribute the young manhood of our section, and remember this section had a higher rate of combatant service and Purple-Heart awards than any other. We were great friends of all

There is no reason why we should not now receive equal educational opportunities with the rest of the country. There should be no

ratings of states whereby we fall 46th, 47th, or 48th. I will introduce and fight through a bill for the Federal Government to equalize the educational opportunities in every state. The per capita spending in each state should be the same. Certainly a child in these hills deserves the same educational advantages afforded any child in York, Connecticut, Massachusetts or any other state (if not more) The administration of our schools and our school system would remain the same. It would be an equalization of money available for the education of every school child. There is not a service man or veteran in this country who would not agree that this bill is right and there will be many servicemen and veterans elected to Congress this fall.

# SERVICEMEN AND VETERANS

I will introduce solely or jointly with other veterans in Congress a bill to provide for the immediate payment of the accrued and terminal leave earned during service on the basis of thirty days' furlough or leave for each year. If one man deserved it every man deserves this payment. One man risking his life in the service is as good as any other man. Further, I will fight against any and all discrimination and advantages in the service because of rate or rank. Again one man in the service is as good as any other man in the service. I will fight for every right coming to our veterans. I know what the boys had to go through with and I'll fight for their rights as long as

These are but two of the problems and wrongs to our people. I will throughout the campaign cover all the others through the newspapers and in my speeches and discussions with the people all over

Last September when I announced while I was still serving overseas I said that I would get out and see the people and learn of their problems and that is what I have been doing and will continue to do right on through the August Primary until "we, the people," triumph at the polls on November third.

262,705 telephones were installed during the past six months-141,659 of them during the first three months of this year-but we still have many thousands of applications for service on hand.

Our program for the next few years calls for an expenditure of \$300,000,000 for buildings, switchboards, wire, cable and other equipment to provide more and better local and long distance service.

There is yet a long way to go to catch up on present held orders for service, but we are moving full speed ahead and looking forward to the day when all who want service can get it without delay. In the meantime, your cooperation is appreciated.
