Floyd Dry Campaign Underway

The horrible increase in undesirable conditions resulting from the liquor traffic the past three years prompts many who considered the first attempt at local option futile to volunteer their services to the Drys for the coming campaign. The Wets are so alarmed already they have said if the Drys win, they plan to contest and keep the matter dangling in the courts for several years, if possible. Christians everywhere recognize the terrific increase in liquor consumption as the major cause of the mounting crime wave throughout the nation. Per capita consumption climbed from 10.53 gallons in '34 to 20.48 in '45, beer from 310,000,000 gallons in 1934 to 1,500,000,000 in 1945, according to tabulations from the U.S. Department of Commerce. With this report comes much ill health, poverty, abuse, sorrow, tears, shame, profanity, vulgarity, immorality, fear, delirium, death and damnation. For "Neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, nor thieves, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners shall inherit the kingdom of God."
