For these men whose hazardous work in the mines makes Floyd a wealthy, busy part of this country, a celebration such as they plan is altogether appropriate. And it is likewise good that they find many friends here who say, "Welcome"—and mean it.

An Open Letter

TO THOSE WHO WILL SERVE ON PETIT JURIES DURING THE CIRCUIT COURT TERM BEGINNING HERE MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 2:

AS you will doubtless recall, the Com-monwealth, not the defense, at the last term of the Floyd circuit court sought changes of venue for two murder trials. That's unusual procedure, but the Commonwealth declared that "such a state of lawlessness exists in Floyd county" that it could not have a fair chance in the trial of men accused of

That didn't mean that the state of lawlessness referred to was such that folks were being killed off like flies, that armed thugs were roaming the highways, shooting up and holding up everybody they met, or that the processes of law and order were being intimidated by force or threat.

It meant that a relatively few citizens, some of them influential, were upholding crime and that the petit juries of the county, on the whole, were falling so far short of doing their duty that the Commonwealth did not care to risk trial in this county at that time.

It was a blunt charge against us all; more particularly, it was a searing indictment of the county's petit juries. It named no individual, because a large percentage of the people of this county want law and order and some jurors at the last term of court were good jurors. The trouble was, there were a few so weak morally or mentally or so timid of spirit that duty could not be seen or, if seen, was disregarded.

So it's up to you to redeem us all in the eyes of the law and in the esteem of others.

You can do this in reasonably short order. It will require the use of your thinking faculties, fortified by moral courage and a desire to serve your county in a high order of service. It will not permit of any vacation such as jury service sometimes is regarded. Your job will be no sincure.

You will not be expected to convict every man or woman accused of an offense. It is common knowledge that a grand jury indictment does not constitute guilt. But you will have to consider the forces of law and order a necessary force in your lives and in those of others. You will have to possess a desire to hold guilty those who are guilty, regardless of station in life or the power of influence behind them.

Most of all, after you have decided upon a defendant's guilt, you must have the nerve to fix his penalty as long and as hard as deserved.

Above all, do not make the tragic mistake of evaluating a life at so many dollars per head or of tagging the price of a girl's or a woman's honor in dollars and cents.

You will have to decide who is guilty and who is innocent. And if you would make of the law anything but a travesty

of justice, you will not decide that a man is guilty only a teeny-weeny bit. If he is charged with murder and is guilty of murder, he is due a penitentiary term or the extreme penalty provided by law. If he is innocent, certainly he should not have to pay a fine or serve a jail term—he should go free. There should

With Few Exceptions, Labor Supply Adequate

In the Prestonsburg area, which comprises Floyd, Johnson, Martin, Magoffin and Morgan counties, the total employment in 14 mining establishments increased from 5,618 on May 15 to 5,638 on June 15 the U.S. Employment Service here amounced last week During the same period, veteran employment increased from 570 to 596, which indicates that at least six veterans were hired as replacements in addition to those who were hired to increase production. Female employment decreased from 138 to 146 during the period.

With the exception of experienced coal loaders, first-class bricklayers, carpenters and electricians, the labor supply in this area is equal to or exceeds the demand.

Coal Mining: At the end of June, 655 men were still needed by five loal mining establishments.

Construction: Labor supply exceeds the demand, due to shortage of building materials.


