Requisition by Willis Unhonored by Dewey in Birkholz Case

Requisition of Governor Simeon S. Willis of Kentucky on Governor Thomas E. Dewey of New York for the extradition to this county from Mineola, N. Y., of John Birkholz, wanted by Floyd authorities on a charge of "taking a child from divorced parent to whom custody had been awarded," was refused last week by Governor Dewey. The New York Governor's counsel held that Birkholz had committed no offense in Kentucky, since the judgment of the Floyd circuit court in granting his divorce provided that he have custody of his son, Charles B., for six weeks during the summer and the child was taken from this state to New York under that order. Mrs. Sylvia Turner, of Wayland, mother of the child, and divorced wife of Birkholz, stated that Birkholz had refused to return the boy, now 7, as agreed, after he had been permitted custody of the child for the specified time this summer.

WAKE UP KENTUCKY

One state not requiring periodic motor vehicle inspection reported through police records on accidents that 27.7 per cent of the cars involved had poor brakes. That state could easily have been Kentucky.

In the District of Columbia, with periodic inspection, poor brakes rated 2.9 per cent as compared with the 27.7 per cent in the foregoing paragraph. Massachusetts, which also has a sound inspection program, rates 3.7. In New Jersey bad brakes figured in 5.6 per cent of the accidents.

The American Association of Motor Vehicle Administrators estimates that 50 per cent of all present day motor vehicles would fail to meet the requirements of a 30-foot stop at 20 miles per hour.

The experience of New Jersey is proof that state inspection pays. A state law requiring inspection twice a year was adopted in 1938. The first inspection period showed a reduction of 30 per cent in traffic deaths as compared with the same period of time in the preceding year. At the end of the first year fatalities in traffic accidents dropped below 1,000 for the first time in 12 years.

Having state-owned and operated inspection stations are Connecticut, the District of Columbia, New Jersey, South Carolina and Washington.

Getting the work done by private stations appointed by the state are Colorado, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Mexico, Pennsylvania, Vermont and Virginia.

Off hand, I'd say state-operated inspection stations would be better because they should be free from politics. The Kentucky Legislature can easily determine which is the better plan when it assembles in 1948.

Washington has two-lane inspection sheds in convenient places. Cars drive in at one end, get a quick going over, with the minimum loss of time, and if cars are in need of repairs, the drivers get written directions and drive on. A one-lane inspection station is supposed to take care of 20,000 cars twice a year.

Memphis was the first important municipality to install a city-owned and operated inspection system for all motor cars registered in the county. Now fifteen cities have a similar system, ranging in size from Billings, Montana, to Chicago.

Some states and cities make their inspection service self-sustaining, entirely independent of general tax funds, by charging car owners an average of fifty cents per inspection.

In Kentucky a sustained publicity program to support a statutory semi-annual inspection program would be necessary to get cooperation from the car-owning public.

The present inspection program in Kentucky, which the Governor's office promises to carry through to complete fulfillment, is going to need all the newspaper support possible. The Highway Patrol is operating without a special periodic inspection law. The state police have a right under the law to inspect all cars and trucks and order the owners to have the necessary repairs made, but the public must be urged to do its part by taking motor vehicles to the Highway Patrol for inspection.

The program offers every car or truck owner an opportunity to find out free of charge if anything is wrong with his vehicle.

I would be glad if I could have my car inspected gratis every month or two.

CONTACT REPRESENTATIVE IS HARD-WORKING

One of the hardest working veterans returned from service is the Contact Representative for the Veterans Administration, the public relations office of the Veterans Administration declared recently in a review of its activities.

No sinecure, this job of the Contact Representative; his job of re-adjustment is that of helping toward the re-adjustment of others.

One of these contact representatives—there are 36 of them at full-time service points, with others covering 58 itinerant points—is Estel L. McKinney, whose office here at the U.S. Employment Service serves veterans of Floyd, Johnson, Magoffin and Martin counties. The services he and other contact representatives render include:

Assisting and advising veterans, dependents and beneficiaries of their rights and benefits established by law, providing a direct link between the Veterans Administration and the public; covering the entire veterans program and many other related activities; serving where needed on various interested community, county and state committees and they work in close co-operation with civic groups, service organizations and the Red Cross; handling veterans' affairs in and near the communities in which they work; meeting veterans and their families at specified times in fire houses, church halls, school buildings, general stores, city halls, or wherever there is desk space in a convenient location.

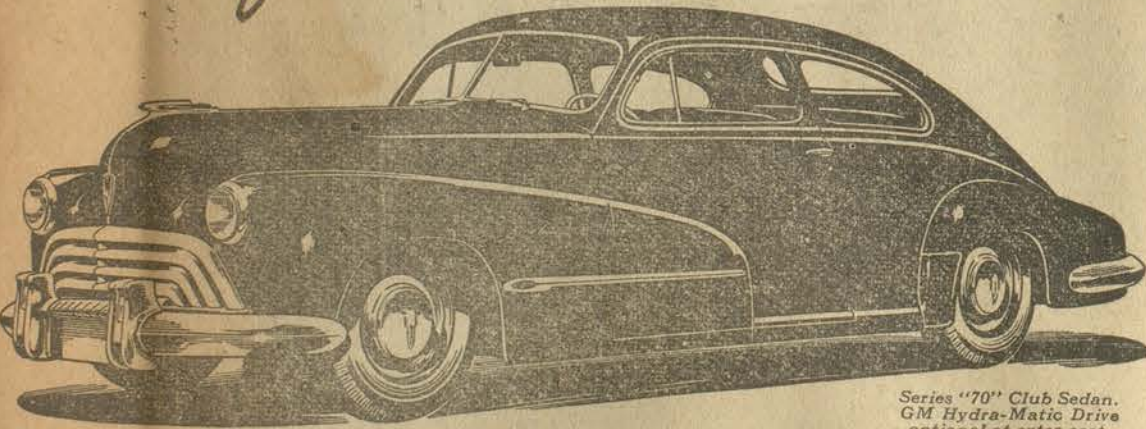

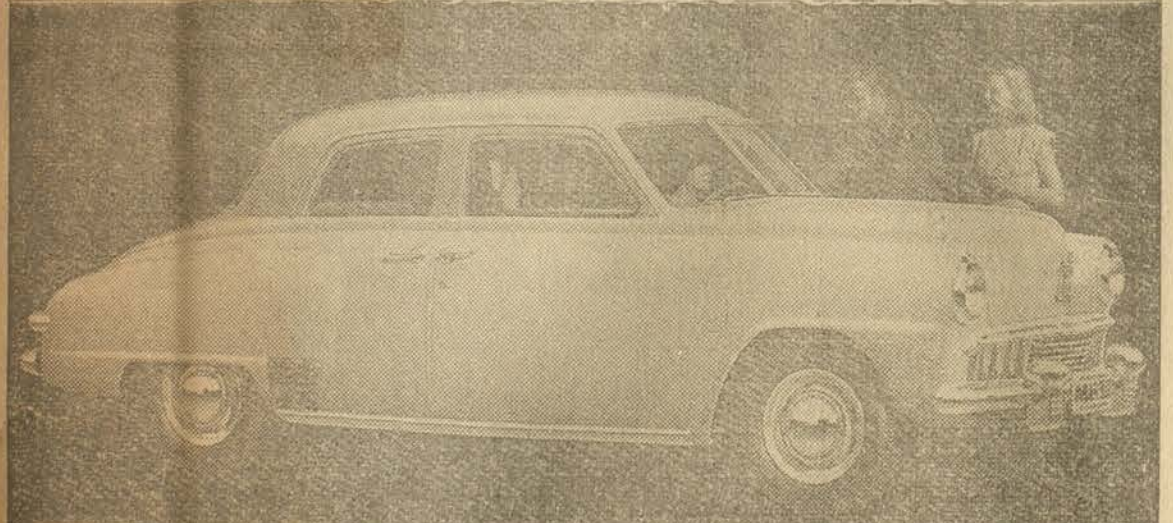

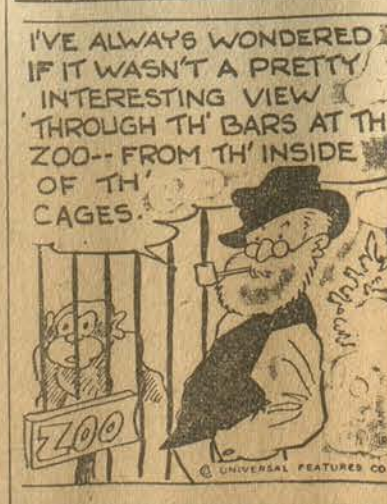

An increase of 155 arrests for drunkenness, although Scott County was dry.

These figures were taken from Scott County Court records in May of 1946.
