NEW PETITION SEEN SEEKING SUSPENSION

Of Prohibition Pending Final Ruling; Hill May Get Contest Case Soon

It was indicated this week that, before the suit of Bill Hill, Prestonsburg liquor dealer, contesting the countywide local option election, reaches Circuit Judge E. P. Hill, Jr., attorneys for Hill will submit a petition asking that the judge suspend prohibition until a final decision is reached.

Judge Hill recently ruled that effective date of prohibition be suspended until he decides the contest action but the proposed move would ask a suspension until the Court of Appeals reviews the case in the event that Judge Hill's decision adversely affects the plaintiff.

Dry testimony was concluded Dec. 26 and last of rebuttal evidence for the Wets was being heard today. Judge Hill may hear arguments in the case next week.

SCUTCHFIELD IN NEW POST

Leaves Inland Steel For Medical College Bacteriology Chair

Resigning the post of x-ray medical technician for the Inland Steel Company at Wheelwright, a position he held for the last eight years, Beecher L. Scutchfield on Jan. 1 assumed his duties at the Medical College of Virginia, Richmond, Va., as instructor in bacteriology and chief bacteriologist in the Medical College hospital.

Mr. Scutchfield, a son of Frank Scutchfield, of Water Gap, is a graduate of Berea College and did graduate work at the University of Kentucky. He is a frequent contributor to technical journals and during his years at Wheelwright acquired an enviable reputation in his field.

His wife, the former Ann Osborne, of Martin, and two children, accompanied him to Richmond.

HENRY GIBSON TRUCK VICTIM

Coal Company Employe Pinned Under Wreckage Hour, Death Is Instant

Henry Gibson, 30 years old, tippleshopper for the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, was instantly killed early Wednesday evening when a coal truck he was driving left the Middle Creek highway at Blue Ridge, dropped over a three-foot embankment and toppled onto him as he was thrown from the cab.

The body remained pinned beneath the dump bed of the truck for an hour until a wrecker arrived from here. Gibson was crushed in the truck, gasoline poured from the tank over the lifeless victim but the danger of fire was prevented when Edgar Hale, who resides in the vicinity, cut off the ignition.

The victim was a son of Mr. and Mrs. Lincoln Gibson, of Goodloe. His parents and several brothers and sisters survive. Funeral arrangements were not complete Thursday afternoon, it was said at the Arnold Funeral Home.

PROGRAM SEEN AS YULE GIFT

Truman Relaxes Housing Restrictions Dec. 24th, Eliminating Priorities

The President's relaxed housing program, effective Dec. 24, came as a Christmas gift to thousands in Kentucky.

Under this program, however, it was stated that all limitations as to sale prices and rentals on all housing construction remain in effect, Roscoe R. Dalton, director of the Federal Housing Administration in Louisville, said.

All construction started on and after December 24 will be subject to the new rules which eliminate priorities, sale prices, inspections and property standards.

The new structures may not exceed 1,500 square feet of floor area exclusive of basements, garages, open porches, terraces and unfinished attics. Luxury housing is not possible under this limitation. Only one bath per living unit is permissible, for example.

Permits for all residential construction—farm and non-farm—will be secured through the Federal Housing Administration. Postoffice Buildings, Louisville. Permits may be secured by veterans and non-veterans who desire to build for their own occupancy. Building contractors may secure permits to build for sale or rent using the for-sale units and 30 days on rental units.

Priority holders who have not started construction may return their applications and secure permits under the relaxed rules.

Permits for alterations and additions may also be secured where additional rooms or living units are being provided.

Mrs. Ben Webb Dies At Martin Hospital After Brief Illness

Funeral rites for Mrs. Nellie Martin Webb, 68 years old, wife of Ben Webb, prominent Allen man, who died at the Gearheart hospital, Martin, on Dec. 24, were conducted last Thursday morning from the home.

Mrs. Webb, one of the section's best women, had been in ill health for some time but became critically ill only a few hours preceding her death when pneumonia developed. She died two hours after having been admitted to the hospital. News of her death was received with deep regret by many relatives and friends.

She was a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Marion F. Martin, early residents of what is now the town of Wayland, and was a member of one of the county's oldest and best-known families. She had been a member of the Methodist Church for 40 years.

Surviving, besides her husband, are four brothers and two sisters: Walter, Earl and Lee Martin, all of Wayland; L. P. Martin, Lexington; Mrs. James Flaney, of Allen, and Mrs. Ballard Martin, of Eastern.

The funeral was conducted by her former pastors, the Revs. O. P. Smith and J. E. Hahn, and burial was made in the Mayo cemetery under direction of the Arnold Funeral Home.

National Magazine Tells Story of Mountain Farmer Who Discovered 'Wonder Crop'

The sharp eyes and natural curiosity of a Kentucky mountain farmer more than 50 years ago are today benefiting livestock raisers all over the state.

That farmer, the late William M. Suiter, first noticed the possibilities of a new variety of grass now hailed by agronomists as a "wonder crop"—Kentucky 31 fescue.

"It is really a remarkable grass—as astonishing as lespedeza was," according to E. N. Fergus, agronomist in charge of pasture and forage crops at the Kentucky Experiment Station. "It is going to make Kentucky green in winter—as well as summer."

Nation-wide attention was focused on the new crop in an article entitled "Kentucky's All-Year Wonder Grass" in the January issue of The Country Gentleman.

Its discoverer, Suiter, bought a farm on the steep slopes near Frenchburg, Ky., toward the close of the last century. When he was doing his first plowing on his farm in the early spring, he noticed a few clumps of a green grass, the only thing green on the hills. And he noticed that his team nibbled on the grass whenever they got a chance.

So he carefully plowed around the grass and that summer he gathered some of the seed by hand. That fall he sowed the seed on the hillside. Year after year he repeated the process, until the whole slope, which rises at a 45 degree angle, was covered by a thick light green sod. His livestock grazed there the year around.

In 1931 Suiter happened to meet Professor Fergus, of the experiment station, at a sorghum show in Menifee county. Suiter told him

about the grass, and Fergus went out to the farm to see for himself. It was easy for the agronomist to identify it as meadow fescue, but he was amazed to see it doing so well in the hills so late in the season—it was November. He obtained some of the seed from Suiter and back in Lexington he purified that seed sample and planted it in plots at the experiment station.

Exhaustive experiments have been conducted with the new grass since that time. Professor Fergus said they have found it to be an all-year grass that will give grazing every month of the year. And he summed up some of the other capabilities of this new variety: Easy to get started and easy to plow up, nutritious and palatable to livestock; adapted to good or poor, wet or dry land; controls erosion on steep slopes; highly drought-resistant; can take a lot of punishment in grazing.

Here's what William C. Johnston, extension field agent in agronomy, one of the experimenters, says about it: "We have around five million acres in this state which don't have adequate cover. Kentucky 31 can help provide that cover and yield good grazing at the same time. We have needed, for a long time, a grass that can be started quickly, which grows well on a wide range of soil types, provides good pasture, and grows well in combination with legumes and other grasses. It looks like Kentucky 31 fescue is going to fill the bill."

Kentucky crop- and livestock-men are quick to point out that Kentucky 31 fescue is not expected to replace their other grasses, such as the famous Kentucky bluegrass, but rather to supplement these, filling out the grassland farming program.

DR. LESLIE, 57, HEART VICTIM

Former Emma Man Passes Suddenly At Olive Hill, Ky.

Dr. Thomas Everett Leslie, 57 years old, native Floyd countian, died suddenly Christmas morning at his home in Olive Hill, victim of a heart attack.

Dr. Leslie had suffered an attack of influenza during the week preceding his death but his condition had not been regarded as serious. His passing came as a severe shock to many relatives and friends in Floyd and Carter counties.

A son of the late T. J. and Ellen Allen Leslie, he was born and reared at Emma. After receiving his early education in the Floyd county schools, he received his M.D. degree from the University of Arkansas. He had practiced his profession in Olive Hill since 1927.

Dr. Leslie was married to Miss Sybil Sherman, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Marion Sherman, of Emma, and she and one son, Thomas Gamble Leslie, of the army, survive. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. Sam Porter, of Lexington, two half-brothers and one half-sister, Sammy and Billy Leslie, both of Emma, and Mrs. Robert Goble, Prestonsburg.

Funeral rites were conducted at Olive Hill last Thursday, the Revs. Henry Murrill and Calvin Smith officiating, after which the body was taken to Emma where brief services were conducted Friday. Burial was made in the family cemetery there.

Mrs. Corbett Bentley Succumbs at Wayland

Funeral of Mrs. Mary Patton Bentley, 40 years old, wife of Corbett Bentley, who died Dec. 20 at her home at Wayland of tuberculosis, were conducted Dec. 22 from the Martin Branch Church and burial was made in the Lucy Hall cemetery at McDowell.

A daughter of Jack and Elizabeth Reynolds Patton, Mrs. Bentley was a native of Knott county. She was married to Mr. Bentley in November, 1919 and since that time had resided at Wayland where she was highly regarded by all who knew her. She was a member of the Holiness Church.

Surviving, besides her husband, are four sons and two daughters, Charles Ira, Johnny, Jackie, Herbert, Eileen and Patricia Bentley, all of Wayland; three brothers and three sisters, Pete Patton and Miss Ida Patton, both of McDowell, Mrs. Martha Mosely and Mrs. Virgie Burchett, both of Wayland, Charlie Patton, Panther, W. Va., Frank Patton, Hindman.

Officiating ministers were the Revs. Bill Sparks, John Marshall, Green Boyd and the Reverend Burkett. Burial was directed by the Baker & Preston Funeral Home.

Stargill Re-Elected Sheriffs' Association President for 2nd Year

For the second consecutive year Floyd county's Sheriff Troy B. Stargill will serve the Kentucky Sheriffs' Association as its president.

Mr. Stargill was re-elected without opposition at the recent meeting of the Association in Louisville.

The meeting saw Stargill of the state go on record as favoring a new Constitution for Kentucky. The officers were described by Attorney General Eldon S. Dummit, guest-speaker, as holding the "highest responsibility of any county officials" and were praised for their work.

SCALDS FATAL TO DEROSSETT

Floyd Countian Falls Into Boiling Water At Michigan Plant

Body of Edward A. Derossett, 25 years old, and a native of Sloan, who was fatally scalded when he fell Dec. 20 into a tank of boiling water at Battle Creek, Mich., was buried Dec. 24 in Congregational cemetery, Leroy Twp., Michigan.

Derossett, an employe of the Battle Creek Plating Company, died in a Battle Creek hospital as 10 volunteers stood by to give blood transfusions.

Mr. Derossett slipped and plunged headlong into the tank as he was immersing wire shelving. A fellow workman pulled him from the tank immediately and was joined by other workers in stripping off the man's steaming clothing.

When Mr. Derossett was placed in an ambulance he was still conscious, but was burned so severely that he lapsed into a semi-coma before reaching the hospital.

At the hospital Mr. Derossett developed internal hemorrhages, indicating that he had swallowed some boiling water. Blood plasma was used and volunteers were called for blood transfusions. Mr. Derossett suffered first and second degree burns over his entire body except his legs and feet. Derossett had worked at the plant for the last six months and was a capable and efficient workman.

Surviving the victim are his widow, Mrs. Peggy Derossett, his son, David Allen, his mother, Mrs. Lunata Derossett, three sisters and two brothers, Mrs. John Hammans, Alleen, Willie, James and Merlin Derossett, all of Sloan.

FIGURES TELL THE STORY—P'BURG MODEL TOWN FOR FIRE UNDERWRITERS

Insurance companies, take notice: Prestonsburg is a good fire risk. The figures tell the story: With upwards of ten millions of dollars' fire insurance in force in Prestonsburg last year, fire losses were only \$7,270, it was estimated by Fire Chief Arthur Blackburn in a review this week of fire department activities during 1946.

The community had seven fires during the year and of these only two resulted in total losses. Since last April, there have been only two fires in Prestonsburg, Mr. Blackburn said.

Cost of the volunteer fire department to the town for the year was \$156, as compared with \$668 in 1945, it was said.

As a matter of comparison, Mr. Blackburn said Prestonsburg suffered 17 fires in 1945 with an estimated loss of \$29,000 resulting.

First Member-Club Of NAF in Section Chartered at David

The Pecco Club, Eastern Kentucky's first member of the National Association of Foremen, received its charter recently at the David Community Church from C. C. Akridge, executive vice-president of the national organization and vice-president of Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp., Nashville, Tennessee.

Preceding presentation of the charter, a buffet dinner was served supervisory employes of the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company, their wives and guests. Mr. Akridge addressed the gathering on the subject, "Leadership." His address was preceded by a brief talk by David L. Francis, Princess Elkhorn president. Speakers were introduced by Richard Dixon, master of ceremonies.

"No company or man can live alone," Mr. Akridge declared, urging co-operation between management and labor. "As an individual worker you die."

"In this club idea," he continued, "men's thinking is brought together. It embraces all levels of management. The spirit of the thing is expressed in this notice appearing above one clubroom door: 'When you enter, check your title with your hat.'"

Following Mr. Akridge's address the following officers were formally installed: George Burke, president; Lon Hill, vice-president; Stanley Crain, treasurer; and Virgil Howard, secretary.

The 57 persons attending the charter meeting later were guests of Virgil Warrick at a theater party.

15,000 KENTUCKY MINERS ASSAIL U.S. OVER FINES

A statement drafted at Martin high school at a meeting of District 30, U.M.W.A. representatives headed by Carson Hibbitts, of Pikeville, was released recently as a "protest against President Truman, the Democratic Administration and other government agencies which collaborated" to procure the federal injunction preceding the recent coal strike.

The statement purported to express the sentiments of 200 locals representing 15,000 miners.

"The order nullified and prevented freedom of speech and the pursuit of happiness through better and improved working conditions," the resolution said, adding: "We further express our protest at the high-handed action of Federal Judge Alan Goldsborough and the unheard-of fines of \$3,500,000 imposed against U.M.W.A. President John L. Lewis and the union), designed to break the treasury of the U.M.W.A., which is being built at the expense of sweat and blood of the miners."

The resolution spoke critically of what it called "newspaper comment" on the miners' strike, saying it "boosted the presidential chances of Mr. Truman in 1948."

COAL MERCHANTS' ASSOCIATION BOND IS \$10,000 AT \$10,000

Sparlock Damron As Slayer of Step Newman Shot Dec. 23

Sparlock Damron, Pittsburgh merchant and coal operator whose shotgun blast instantly killed his step-son, Arthur Damron, 33-year-old miner, Dec. 24 and ended a four-month period during which Floyd county had enjoyed an unspoiled homicide record, was released from jail here Monday afternoon after he had executed \$10,000 bond to answer to action of the grand jury convening here next Monday.

Damron waived examining trial and amount of the bond was reached by agreement.

Day before Christmas saw sudden outbreaks of violence in at least three communities of the county. On Jack's Creek a shotgun charge said to have been fired by Troy Isaacs through a window partially blinded George Newman, while on Abner Fork Tommy Hall, 30, and Ernest Hall, 29, brothers, were slashed by a razor said to have been wielded by Tommy Harris, 24.

Except for statements of two witnesses, Cecil Halbert and Charles Robinson, details of the Damron shooting are singularly lacking. Acquaintances of Sparlock Damron said it was incredible to them that he had slain his step-son. They described him as one of his community's best citizens.

Halbert and Robinson told County Attorney W. W. Burchett that they, Arthur Damron and others were in Sparlock Damron's store, drinking beer, when Damron entered, armed with a shotgun, and ordered all outside. All left, their statements related, except Arthur Damron who had taken refuge in a back room.

Surviving the victim are his widow, Mrs. Peggy Derossett, his son, David Allen, his mother, Mrs. Lunata Derossett, three sisters and two brothers, Mrs. John Hammans, Alleen, Willie, James and Merlin Derossett, all of Sloan.

The charge of shot blow away a part of Damron's head.

The accused man declined to make a statement Monday when queried as to details. He surrendered to Deputy Sheriff Otto Fannin, soon after the shooting.

The victim, a native of Pike county, was a son of Hibbard Damron, of Esco, Ky., and Mrs. Annie Damron, whose second marriage was to Sparlock Damron. Besides his father and mother, he is survived by his widow, Mrs. Hattie Damron, two children, Wilson and Elizabeth, four brothers and three sisters: Ellis, Earl and John R. Damron, of Esco; Clement Damron, of the navy; Misses Pearl, Ruth and Maude Damron, of Esco.

The body was taken to the home of Hibbard Damron at Esco, where funeral rites were conducted Friday, the Rev. Charles Roberts officiating. Burial was under direction of the Ryan Funeral Home.

Authorities here were told that George Newman was shot while sitting in his home on Christmas eve and that Isaacs fired through a window without warning. Isaacs was permitted liberty under \$3,000 bond.

Deputy Sheriff Andy Little, who with Deputies Albert Hall and Cain Blackburn arrested Harris following the Abner Fork cutting, said cause of the slaying is obscure. He described Ernest Hall as having been badly cut and as suffering serious loss of blood. Ernest Hall was taken to the Martin General Hospital where it was said he was recovering.

Preceding all this was the slaying and wounding of Ernest Stone and John Martin on the night of Dec. 23. Letts alleged to have been a Vernon Flaney, son of the late Vernon Tavis Flaney, was inflicted arm flesh wounds. Flaney had been arrested in connection with the slaying.

TRAGEDY MARS YULE SEASON

As Four Meet Death In Mine-Connected Accidents in Area

Accidents connected with the coal mining industry brought tragedy to four Floyd county homes at Christmas time.

The dead are: Edgar Arthur Byrd, 44, Inland Steel Company electrician, Wheelwright, victim of an electric charge Dec. 23.

James Lee Burchett, 30, Auxier, killed in the Princess Elkhorn Coal Company mine at David, Dec. 21.

Willard Johnson, 37, Melvin, Inland Steel Company miner, instantly killed in a slatefall Dec. 26.

Joe Gibson, 26, of Wales, formerly of Estill, killed by slatefall in Little Coal Company mine on Indian Creek, Pike county, Dec. 27.

Burchett died in the Paintsville hospital, five hours after his injury at 3:40 a. m. in the David mine. He was substituting as motor brakeman and lifted his head to look over a trip of cars without observing a header he was approaching. The timber struck his head, knocking him onto the tracks where cars passed over his body. His legs were broken and he suffered internal injuries. Surviving him are his widow, Mrs. Ola Hatfield Burchett, and three children, of Auxier, his mother, Mrs. Anna Burchett, of Lancer, and five sisters, Mrs. Hazel Welis, Mrs. Thelma Hunt, Mrs. Nancy Pitts, Mrs. Josie Fannin and Miss Edith Burchett, all of Lancer. Burial was made at Auxier, Dec. 23.

Byrd was instantly killed when 40,000 volts of electricity passed through his body. The tragedy occurred near Topmost, Knott county, as he was tightening a guy line which had been loosened by a rolling log. The victim, a native of West Virginia, is survived by his widow, Mrs. Naomi Byrd, one son, Richard, three daughters, Charloette, Frances and Doris, five brothers and three sisters. The body was taken to Pikeville where burial was made.

Willard Johnson died of a crushed chest. He was a son of Caleb and Betty Tackett Johnson and a native of this county. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Lela Adams Johnson, one son, Willis, and two daughters, Misses Loretta and Patricia Sue Johnson, all of Melvin; and 13 brothers and sisters, Mrs. Rosiana Thompson, Prestonsburg, E. V.

George England, 72 years old, for many years a well-known figure here, died at the Methodist hospital, Pikeville, Monday after an illness of a few days. Although he had suffered from a kidney ailment, heart disease was given as the direct cause of death.

Mr. England, never married, is survived by one brother, Sam England, of Michigan. The body is at the Arnold Funeral Home, pending funeral arrangements.

### Attention, Truckers

There is a new law becoming effective Jan. 1, 1947, which completely changes the method of licensing your truck. Heretofore you have been licensing them according to manufacturers' capacity rating as 1/2-ton, 1-ton, or 1 1/2-ton. You must now completely forget the old method and your 1947 license will be issued according to gross weights which includes the weight of your truck plus the maximum load you expect to haul. Have your truck weighed so you will know what gross weight you will need to license it for. Your license receipt will show your gross weights and if the State Patrol should check you and you are hauling a greater load than you license your truck for, then you will be fined.

Any private owner of a truck who uses it in his own business only and not for hire and who hauls a gross weight exceeding 18,000 pounds must purchase weight tags in addition to his license. This weight tag will be sold only in this office.

Common and contract carriers must secure a weight tag from the Department of Motor Vehicle Transportation before we can license them in this office.

Anyone who owns a truck and hauls for hire must buy a weight tag as they are classed as common or contract carriers, regardless of weight. For example, if you own a pick-up truck and haul groceries for some one who pays you, this makes you a contract carrier. But if you haul different types of material for anyone you then become a common carrier.

In order to license either of the above two types you must first secure your weight tags from Lexington and then present them to us before we can license your vehicle.

I feel sure this law will cause quite a lot of trouble in licensing a number of vehicles, but I am ready to explain any phase of the law you may wish to ask and I will license your truck on the weight you state and either as a private, contract or common carrier as you wish and have the proper papers for; then, if your license is wrong it will be between you and the State Patrol. So I urge you all to begin thinking now and be prepared to tell us just what gross weight you expect to haul and whether you expect to operate for hire, and if so, you should apply now to Frankfort for your weight permit so you can present it here for license.

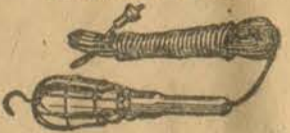

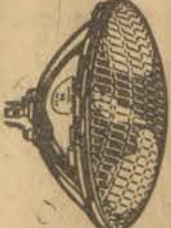

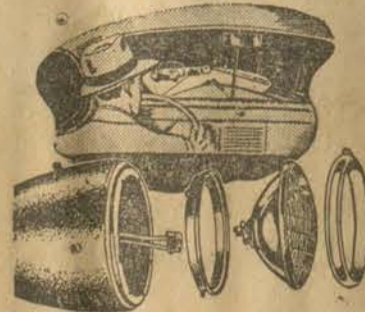
