EVEN YOUR CHURCHES ARE CRITICISED

The Red Cross shares with every other organization, even with the churches, a burden of criticism. Some of this criticism is honest, some is downright malicious. This criticism cannot be ignored.

That the people of Floyd county, in particular, may know the important role the Red Cross plays and that they may understand its purpose, we publish these uncontroverted facts:

First of all, the Red Cross has as its ex-officio head the President of the United States. Republican or Democrat, that is an honor and a duty no President has ever shunned. And in its Central committee are such personages as these: the Secretary of State, the Secretary of War, the Secretary of the Navy, the Secretary of the Treasury, etcetera.

Under its charter, which is granted by Congress, the Red Cross is the official American agency responsible for the relief of disaster-stricken people.

Under the same charter, the Red Cross is the official medium of communication between the people of the United States and their army and navy.

With its myriad activities over the nation and the world, under every conceivable circumstance, working with individuals whose urgent requirements may cause them to expect miracles on the moment, it is natural that the Red Cross receives some criticism. But none of this, nor all of it, should cause any good American citizen to forget the great over-all service to which the organization is dedicated, and to refuse to give it his financial support.

In this county, those who have been stricken by flood will surely remember with gratitude the work of the Red Cross. And isolated individual cases, deprived of home and belongings by fire or other disaster—these, surely, cannot forget.

Just for the record, let us recall the 1939 Ohio valley flood. Between Feb. 3 and Feb. 20 of that year, not only residents of the Ohio river section were helpless in the grip of an unfriendly force of Nature; in this county, particularly in the upper Right Beaver section, many were hard-hit. And for the relief of the flood victims in this county alone that year, the Red Cross expended \$1,545.72.

That was the county's greatest flood disaster. But in July, 1942 Floyd county again suffered, and the Red Cross gave help which, in dollars and cents, totaled \$6,497.30. The Beaver Creeks were hit again in January, 1946, but not so hard. Again the Red Cross gave aid—\$2,401.91 worth.

And so it goes. In Floyd county, in every county of Kentucky, in every county of every state in the nation—and on over the world.

Let us, please, not permit a few isolated cases from which criticism has arisen to deny the Red Cross our full and ungrudging support.

WAYLAND FIVE FLOYD'S HOPE TO LICK INEZ Crippled P'burg Team Loses to Pikeville 5; Draws Held Here

An injury-and-flu-ridden Prestonsburg team lost to Pikeville Wednesday night in the opening round at Inez, 38-26.

If the Inez Indians are to be defeated their annual trip to the state basketball tournament, the Floyd county district winners and runners-up, Wayland and Prestonsburg, respectively, will be the teams to deny them the honor, the majority of fans held as the regional tournament began Wednesday night at Inez.

The Wayland team won the district title at McDowell Saturday night, 42-30, over Prestonsburg, with Ed DeCoursey sparking the Wasps to victory. These two teams dominated their respective brackets in the tournament and were never threatened before reaching the finals.

Representatives of the eight district championship and runner-up teams met at the grade school auditorium here Sunday afternoon to arrange for the regional tournament. A 4-4 vote between Inez and West Liberty was polled, with Inez Russell Williamson's luck continuing in the toss of a coin.

The draw lined up the teams thuswise: Wednesday night, March 12—Oil Springs vs. Wayland at 7:30, Prestonsburg vs. Pikeville at 9.

Thursday night—Cumberland vs. Frenchburg at 7:30, Paintsville vs. Inez at 9.

The semi-finals will be played Friday night and the finals at 8:30 Saturday night. There will be no afternoon games.

Dick Looney, of Elkhorn City, and Bill Sturull, of Prestonsburg, were the almost unanimous choices of the coaches to referee the tourney. Adrian Collins and George Belcher, Jr., both of Prestonsburg, were named timer and scorer, respectively. In addition to the usual trophies, the cheerleader voted best at the tourney will receive an award.

FINAL 'RECAP' SHOWS DROP

From Commissioner's Initial Assessment; Total, \$12,985,312

The \$16,005,050 total assessment figure established by Tax Commissioner Clive Akers in his first assessment recapitulation for the county no longer stands.

When the Board of Supervisors adjourned here, 10 days ago, that figure had shrunk to \$12,985,312, which is still a million and a half dollars above last year's assessment.

Mr. Akers' first recap placed mineral and timber rights at \$5,787,235, a raise of almost \$3,000,000 over the 1946 assessment, and therein was reported a "boon of contention" between board members. The board was reported as equally divided on the mineral rights raise question, but THE TIMES was told last week by one member he had not been aware of any differences.

Anyway, when the board adjourned the valuation of mineral rights had dropped to \$3,213,747 as compared with a 1946 valuation of \$2,807,602.

The final assessment figures on other major tax items:

Town lots and improvements, \$2,193,830; farm lands and improvements, \$3,600,381; 2047 automobiles and trucks, \$716,290; tangible property, \$2,657,470.

The report to the Department of Revenue was returned Tuesday for alteration or correction.

BLASTS HOPES OF TEACHERS

For Salary Increase; Governor Tells Group No Help During Term

Governor Simeon Willis blasted the hopes of Kentucky teachers Monday when he told a group of them they could not expect any financial aid from the state before the end of his term in December.

Governor Willis was quoted by the press as having told them:

1. The state is paying 62 cents of every \$1 for education and cannot pay more.
2. None of the state's estimated \$25,000,000 surplus could be used to relieve the emergency now.
3. Teachers wouldn't get the \$10,500,000 they have requested even if a special session of the Legislature were called.
4. He disapproves of any proposals to establish state wage floors under teachers' salaries.
5. They should strive for professional improvement, especially in their leadership.
6. That wartime inflation will be over in three years and teachers who have left the profession will be able to come back to it because they'll have to.
7. They should go back home, pay their debts, and live within their means, no matter what they are paid.
8. They should elect a Governor and a Legislature sympathetic to their needs—send men to Frankfort to study the over-all picture.
9. Mrs. Fugett, who acted as spokesman for the group of 13 before the Governor, based her appeal for more state aid for teachers on the need of children for trained teachers. To get these trained teachers, she said, they must be relieved from financial worries and paid a reasonable professional wage.
10. "Teachers in Kentucky are forced to live on oxtail soup and tongue sandwiches to make both ends meet," Mrs. Fugett told Willis.

She outlined the following actual budget of a teacher in a second-grade Kentucky city who has two dependents and earns \$1,767.50 a year.

Rent, \$360; food, \$728; clothes, \$75; taxes, pension fund, professional organization dues, \$141.50; utilities, \$250, and incidentals, \$50.

"This leaves her only \$123 a year for recreation and personal improvement," Mrs. Fugett said. "Around \$10 a month!"

Mrs. Fugett then offered to let the other 12 teachers outline similar personal facts, but she reported the Governor said that wasn't "necessary," he had all the information he needed on teachers' salaries, pupil loads, training, and taxation.

The Governor told the group the

Local Group Drills 'Big Six' Gas Well On Middle-Cr. Lease

What is believed to be the first gas well drilled in the "Big Six" formation in this county was shut in last week on the Elk Horn Coal Corporation lease, near the mouth of Rough and Tough on Middle Creek. Volume of the well is 250,000 cubic feet.

The strike was made in a "wildcat" experiment headed by G. C. Spradlin, Johnny Hall and others, with a number of Floyd county men interested in the well. The lease of 1,400 acres will be thoroughly tested.

COURT OKEHS NEW BUDGET

For Floyd Education Work During 1947-48; Levy of \$1.50 Stands

The \$1.50 per \$100 valuation levy asked by the Floyd County Board of Education last week in its budget for 1947-48 was approved by the fiscal court Monday, as was a per capita tax of \$1 on all male citizens of voting age.

On the basis of the \$12,985,312 assessment as reported by the Department of Revenue after the Floyd County Board of Supervisors had adjourned, the \$1.50 levy on each \$100 worth of taxable property will gross the schools \$194,779 in county school taxes, aside from whatever amount of poll taxes that may be collected.

Magistrate John May said, after the court had approved the budget and levies sought, that the court wants the people to understand that the levy is not the fiscal court's idea but that of the board of education in budgeting its needs for the next year.

Superintendent Palmer L. Hall said last week the Board of Education budget for 1947-48 will provide approximately \$50,000 more in teachers' salaries, regardless of what the state does to remedy the present situation. recently raised permissive local school levy ceiling of \$1.50 had given local school districts an opportunity to do something for teachers.

When he took office, Willis told them, the state's per capita distribution to local districts was only a little more than \$13. Today it is \$24.40. "The state has done its share," they quoted him as saying.

Willis said the state was paying 62 cents of every tax dollar for education and couldn't pay any more. "He said he thought the teachers would be fortunate if we could hold on to this amount during the next Legislature," Mrs. Morgan said.

Miss Clark said that since the West Virginia Assembly recently increased the state's guaranteed salary for teachers, Kentucky teachers in neighboring Pike county could travel the "four or five miles into West Virginia and get twice as high a salary as they are receiving now."

Mrs. Pugett asked the Governor if he thought the state could guarantee a minimum \$2,400 salary for all teachers?

"He said he was opposed to the state fixing any minimum salary for teachers, that they should be paid on a merit basis alone. Any other course, he thought, would be bad psychology," Miss Travelstead said.

Willis told the teachers they should first strive for "professional improvement, especially in their leadership," before asking more pay. The group construed this as a direct slap at the K.E.A. and its officials.

The Governor recalled that when he was a teacher the profession was highly respected and teachers were looked upon as local heroes.

Mrs. Morgan replied that one of her high school pupils works from 3 to 11 p.m. each day "and makes more than I do. He has told me he thinks I am foolish to continue teaching for so little money." She makes \$1,800 a year, she said.

"Well, this is a highly industrialized world and everything is upset following the war," she quoted the Governor's reply.

None of the state's surplus could be used to relieve the teacher-salary emergency now, the group said. Willis told them. He said institutions and colleges needed more money and that veterans were clamoring for additional professional educational opportunities. Any surplus has to serve as a backlog for the next Legislature, he added.

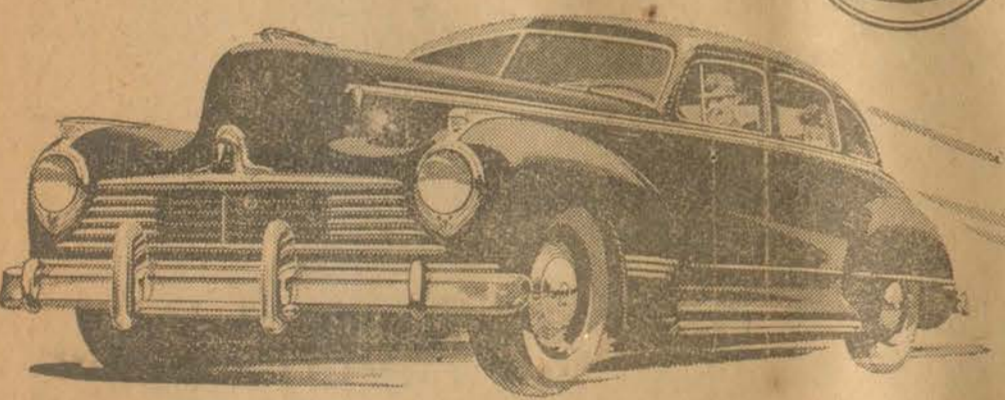

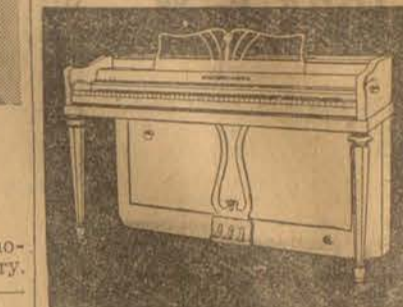

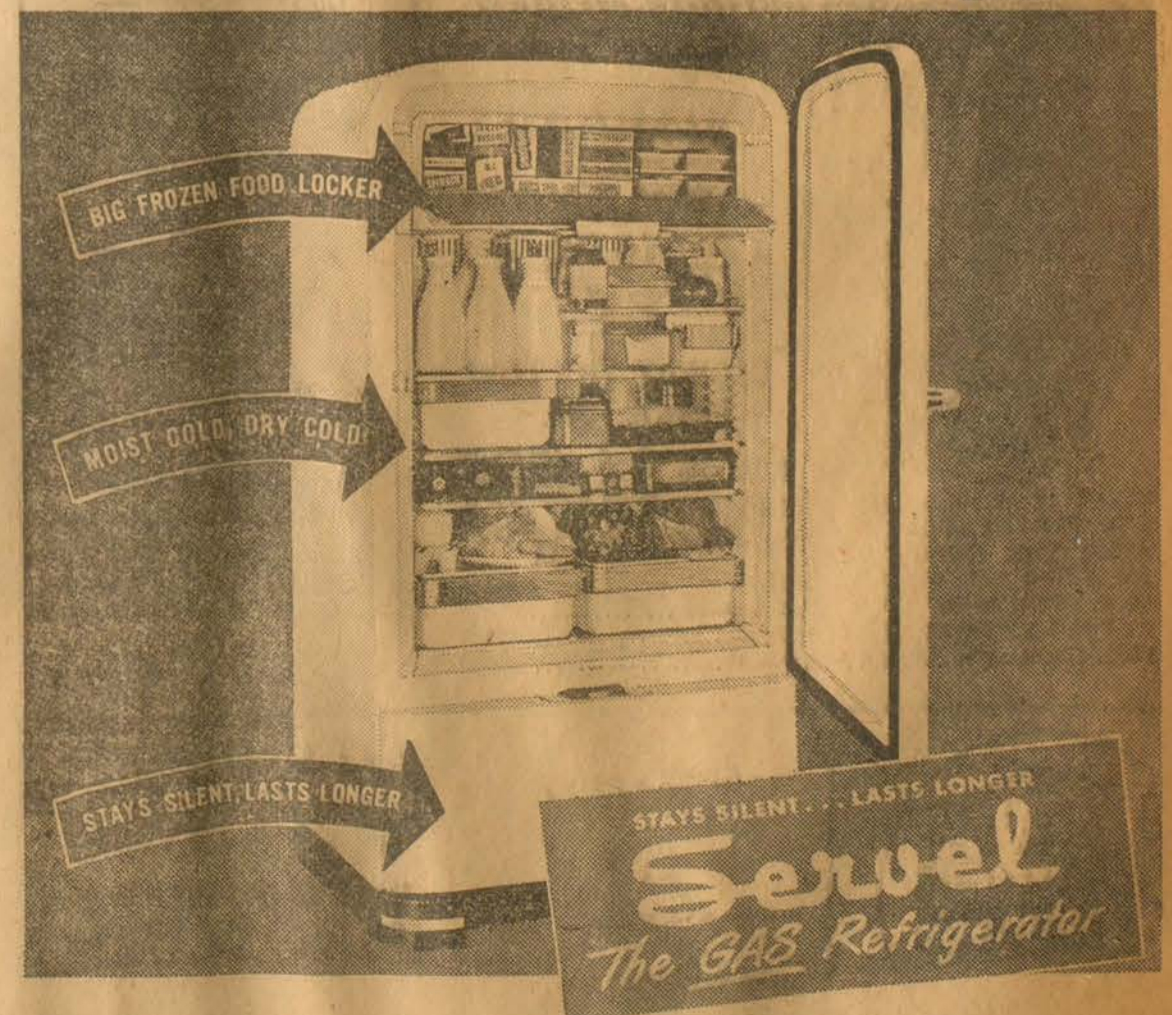

location of the Clinchfield Coke Corporation on Meade Fork. This operation is expected to yield more than 1,000,000 tons of bituminous coal yearly when fully developed.
Tunnel work is being done by the Western Construction Company, of St. Louis, and Codel Construction Company handled the grade work at the Jenkins end.

Although installation of large coal operations along the Floyd county sector of the new railway is problematical, rail facilities supplied are considered almost a guarantee of coal development in a small scale above Wayland in the form of numerous truck mines.
