Names of more than 9,000 Kentuckians known to have died in World War II will be placed on a large roster in the University of Kentucky's new Memorial Auditorium-Fieldhouse when it is completed, according to H. L. Donovan, president of the University.

Floyd county is no longer as once described, "the bloodiest soil in the western hemisphere"—nor is it even the bloodiest in Kentucky.

The number of murders in this county increased by four last year from the 1945 total of seven. The state as a whole had an increase of one in the first year after the war with 93 killed.

The FBI reports that offenses known to police increased from 14,964 in 1945 to 15,254 in 1946. Murders increased from 92 to 93, robberies from 742 to 936, aggravated assault from 850 to 906, burglaries from 3,829 to 3,923, and larceny from 5567 to 6,819.

Tax Commissioner Clive Akers, the suit stated, increased the assessment to \$289,170 and the Board of Supervisors finally set the figure at \$158,370.

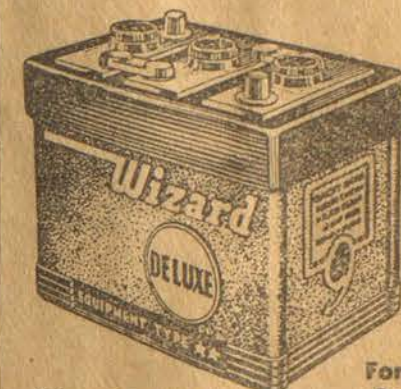
